NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market snapped out of irregularity and moved generally higher Monday. Turnover was heavy. The moderate gain put the average at another new high for 1958. The Associated Press average of 50 stocks rose 40 cents to its new '58 peak of \$183.10 with the industrials up 70 cents, the rails up 40 cents (both up to new highs for the year) and the utilities down 10 cents.

Administration Doubtful Over Reaching Accord With Russia On Mideast

DDE Pleads For More Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower made a new plea Tuesday for more foreign aid money, pegging it to the Middle East crisis. He laid particular stress on the suddenly increased needs of Turkey and Iran in urging restoration of more than half a billion dollars chopped out of his program of help for friendly nations.

Assessment Level Reached

11 Californians Die In Traffic

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Traffic accidents took the lives of at least 11 persons in Northern California over the weekend. At least five of the victims died in San Joaquin Valley. Other fatalities were: Clyde Brantley, 38, El Sobrante, died of a heart attack Sunday after his auto smashed into a light standard in Oakland.

Two Fires Reported Over The Weekend

Only two fires were reported in the Klamath Falls area over the weekend, but one of them cost Don O'Connor of the O'Connor ranch at the end of Spring Lake Road a considerable amount of hay. This call was answered by the county fire department Sunday afternoon when O'Connor reported that two of his haystacks were on fire. The firemen saved over 1,000 tons of O'Connor's hay, but he lost 120 tons of barley hay and some clover hay too.

CRIMINAL CAPTURED

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — City Sheriff Pound Master Jay Hibert charged police where a screen door had been ripped out and a door damaged. Officers rounded up four-footed suspects from the pond and pinned the crime on a watchdog with flecks of paint on its legs and teeth.

Complaints, Paving, Bids, Occupy Council's Time
