

# By LINES from the SIDELINES

Russian sports fans heard quite a bit about Oregon earlier this week as the Soviets clashed with the United States touring track and field team in a two-day meet in Moscow.

Although the Russians claimed a two-point scoring and moral victory, they would have fared lots better if four Oregonians hadn't turned in such outstanding work for the United States team.

Oregon sports fans were thrilled when the Beaver state was represented by distance runners Bill Dellinger and Jim Grelle, decathlon star Dave Edstrom and woman shot putter Sharon Shepherd. And these four turned in brilliant showings in the meet to prove their selections right.

Miss Shepherd, remembered by Klamath Falls softball followers as the speed-balling pitcher who led Oakridge-Westfall to second place in the two state women's softball tournament held at Gem Stadium a few years back, placed a strong fourth in the women's shot put event. Sharon, who calls Mapleton her home, tossed the iron ball 44 feet 9.3 inches.

Grelle, University of Oregon miller, scored a surprise victory for the American team in the 1,500 meter run (the metric mile). His time was three minutes, 46.7 seconds. Grelle is a Portlander who still has another year of eligibility left at the Eugene school.

Dellinger, former NCAA mile champion from the University of Oregon, lost a heartbreaker to Russia's Hubert Pyranov in a near-dead heat in the 5,000 meter run. Dellinger and his Russian foe were both credited with times of 14:28.4, but the officials' nod gave first place honors to the Soviet distance star. Dellinger wasn't rated a close second to the Red great.

Edstrom, just a sophomore this past year at Oregon, is probably one of the state's greatest track prospects ever. The Sherwood cinder sensation does just about everything there is in the sport and does it so well he could eventually become the world decathlon champion. Dave finished third to Rafer Johnson, the U.S.'s greatest and Vasily Kuznetsov, Russia's finest.

Edstrom rolled up 7,397 points as he won the 110-meter hurdles and the 1,500 meter run in the 10-event marathon. Johnson set a new world's decathlon record with his winning total of 8,302 points. Kuznetsov rolled up 7,897, a mere 500 more points than the young Sherwood star from the University of Oregon.

The Soviets are planning to return the meet with the United States team in Philadelphia in July of 1959. From the showings made by the above Oregonians, it would be nice to hold another such meet at Eugene's Hayward Field. Oregon track coach Bill Bowerman would shudder to think of the work such a meet would entail, but would love to be the director of such a classic.

Harry Glickman, president of Oregon Sports Attractions in Portland, said this past week that a great deal of interest has been shown in the "local" flavor of the San Francisco 49er - Washington Redskins exhibition game at Mullomah Stadium.

Noted principals in the game will be Washington halfback Dick James - former Grants Pass high and University of Oregon star - and fullback Sam Baker - who

Leptich, the defending champion, paced the field in Tuesday's opening round of match play by defeating Joe Herron, Portland, 7 and 5, and went on to finish out a two-under-par round of 66.

Coons was pressed to eliminate A. A. Lengrew, Salem, 2 and 1, while Rosenblatt had no trouble defeating Syd Boots, Portland, 6 and 5.

In class AA, for men 60 and over, medalist Sam Cole of Portland led to a 6 and 5 win over Drew Clerin, Portland. Roseburg's Ward Cummings, the defending title holder, defeated Charlie Sumner, Portland, 6 and 5.

The class AA golfers moved into quarterfinal matches Wednesday, while eight matches were scheduled in class A. The championship matches will be Friday.

## Southeast Portland Sweeps 11-4 Triumph

PORTLAND - The Klamath County All-Stars, who had earned the name "Cinderella" team, saw their Oregon State Babe Ruth Championship carriage turn into a pumpkin a little before 12 o'clock as they became the runnerup by virtue of an 11-4 defeat at the hands of the Southeast Nationals on Portland's Lents Field Tuesday night.

The victory won the Southeast team the right to represent Oregon as state champion in the coming Babe Ruth Regionals to be held here starting August 6.

The County Stars had to be content with a plaque for the District I championship and second place honors in the state. Klamath Falls will be represented in the Regionals by the American League All-Stars, who will serve as host team. Coach Fred Taylor's County crew had battled their way into the final game by dumping Astoria in the opening round of tournament play and upsetting the powerful Mid-Portland in the second.

In the championship test the County team got off to a 4-2 lead in the first two innings which they managed to hold until the top of the sixth when the hitting strength of the Southeast nine combined with a fading on the part of County starting hurler Dennis Salvadori to let the Portlanders take command with an 8-4 count.

The top of seventh saw the SE club pick up three more tallies as relievers Chuck Cossey and Rick Carleton gave up a pair of walks and a single which were added to a pair of County miscues to clinch the affair.

The winning pitcher, Jim Warren, a tall righthander, came into the game in the third stanza after starter Gary Sanders had walked eight men and issued the only two KP hits which accounted for the County scores.

Warren, in finishing up the third and going the rest of the way, gave up no hits, struck out eight Klamath players, walked only one and struck one batter. His teammates committed only two errors, both in the first frame.

On the Klamath side of the pitching ledger, the loser, Salvadori walked four, fanned eight, and was reached for three hits. Cossey issued two walks, two hits and whiffed two. Carleton faced only one batter, who got a hit. The County squad committed five errors.

Leading the hitters were Southeast second baseman Sonny Payne who collected two singles in three trips, although he was outscored by centerfielder Steve Coon who poked a triple in the disastrous sixth.

The only other extra base rap of the game was a double by first-sacker Dwight Daniels. Cincinnati Fitzhugh and Bill Felix added single to the Southeast cause while the Klamath hits were singles by Salvadori and Wilson.

Salvadori fanned the leadoff man and the cleanup hitter in the top of the first and allowed Payne his first hit. Payne died on the sacks.

In the KF half of the inning eight straight balls off Sanders put Bucky Wilson and Don Willey on base. Each scored as Sanders walked two more and his mates made a pair of mistakes.

Southeast evened the count in the top of the second as Daniels double coupled with an error and a free pass brought in two runs. Daniels attempt to score on a squeeze was nipped in the bud as County catcher Dean Haskins nailed him at the plate.

In the last of the second, Klamath collected two more markers as Willey was granted another walk followed by Wilson's single. Again the pair scored, this time on Salvadori's single.

The third, fourth and fifth innings were relatively uneventful as the game seemingly resolved itself into a pitcher's duel, with Warren getting a slight edge.

The explosion came in the first of the sixth canto as Salvadori, obviously weakening, walked four men and gave up a hit to set the stage for the six run barrage. Coming in with the bases loaded, Cossey was rapped for a single and the screaming triple to left center by Coon, before retiring the side.

Klamath couldn't scratch in the last of the sixth as Warren fanned Willey and Bob Mobley and forced Wilson to pop up to second base.

The three Southeast insurance runs came in the seventh after two were out. Cossey walked two men and Wilson committed a fielding error and a throwing miscue on the same play. Felix blasted the bases loaded.

In the last of the seventh a faint glimmer of hope showed through as Salvadori, who had been shifted to third after his stint on the hill, got aboard with a walk. A slow roller down the first baseline resulted in Dean Haskins being called out for interfering with the pitcher's attempt to field the ball. When the argument died down Norman Jackson was handed a free pass but both Salvadori and Jackson died on base as Larry Peters struck out and Brickner grounded out to the pitcher.

## American Athletes In Poland

WARSAW (AP) - There were more signs and billboards in Warsaw today advertising the visit of 65 American athletes than there are signs on communism.

The Americans arrive today from Moscow. They will race against Poland in track and field Friday and Saturday.

In Moscow, the American men defeated Soviet men, Soviet women defeated American women and Soviet athletes, as a whole, won the meet 172-170.

Polish sports officials say they don't expect their men and women to beat the United States, but that the meeting should be a great occasion.

In European track and field, Poland probably ranks second to the Soviet Union. In several events Poland is better than the Soviet Union.

In short and middle distance running events, the Poles are considerably behind the Americans but ahead of the Soviets. Soviet women are stronger than the Polish girls, and the U.S.-Polish women's scoring should be very close.

Before leaving Moscow, Coach George Eastman of the American men's team expressed an optimistic viewpoint about American prospects in the distance events.

"I believe we will be exceptionally strong by the 1960 Olympics in Rome," he said. "We should place two among the first six at 1,500 meters. By 1964 we should have one among the first six in the 5,000 meters. We could surprise in the steeplechase any time because our runners have been training enthusiastically for the event since Horace Ashenfelter popularized it by winning in the 1932 Olympics at Helsinki.

"I am certain we are coming along very solidly in the 3,000 meters. We have improved greatly in the 10,000 meters also, but have a long way to go in development."

When the New York football Giants opened their training camp at Salem Monday, a rookie who had seen lots of Oregon football got his first look at the state.

Don Sutherland, who kicked the field goal that gave Ohio State a 10-7 win in last New Year's Day Rose Bowl game over Oregon, was among the rookies who reported to the Giants camp. Sutherland's kick prevented the highly favored Buckeyes of the Big Ten from being held to a 7-7 draw, which would have been humiliating.

Reports from Salem indicate the former Ohio State end and placekicker could stick with the Giants.

### Braves Toppled By Bums

For some reason, the cellar-ridden Los Angeles Dodgers play like champions against the Milwaukee Braves. By the same token, Fred Haney's contenders roll over and play dead before the Dodgers, especially when Don Drysdale is on the mound.

That's what happened last night again when the Dodgers defeated the Braves 4-2 to dump them out of first place, a full game behind the incredible San Francisco Giants, who again came from behind for a ninth inning 4-3 victory in Cincinnati.

The Dodgers' victory was their ninth in 13 meetings with the Braves this season. Drysdale, who now has whipped Milwaukee three times without a defeat, had a defeat, had a shutout until the ninth when Wes Covington slammed his 18th home run. Drysdale, who has lost 10 decisions, has won only two games against the rest of the league.

Pittsburgh climbed into third place, 6½ games off the pace, downing Chicago 6-4. Philadelphia gained a split with St. Louis, winning the scheduled game 3-2 in 11 innings after losing 4-3 a game that had been suspended by the Sunday curfew law a month ago.

In the American League, the Kansas City Athletics walked the New York Yankees 7-3, Cleveland drubbed Baltimore 9-4, Chicago shaded Washington 2-1 and Boston outlasted Detroit 11-8 in an 11-inning slugfest.

Drysdale struck out eight but needed help from Johnny Klippstein in the ninth. The defeat, fourth in the last six games, was a costly one for the Braves, whose

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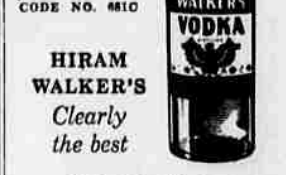
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
