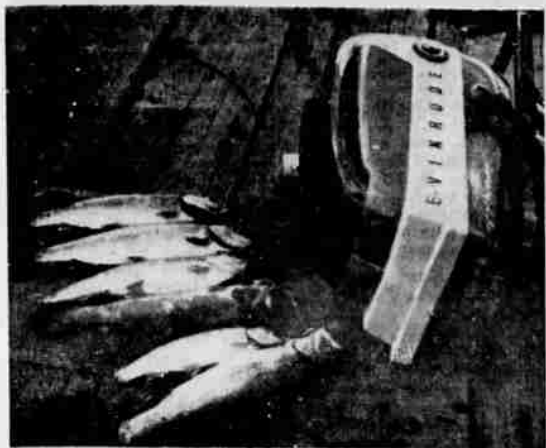

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Spahn Beats Bums; Ex-Yankee Victor

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"They aren't the team of old, but I feel good anyway," said the great Milwaukee Braves left-hander after beating Los Angeles, 4-3, Wednesday night for the first time in seven years. "A good pitcher is supposed to beat 'em all."

That, of course, had been a sore point with Spahn over the years. Eight times a 20-game winner and a strong Hall of Fame candidate, he nevertheless had to listen to the whispers that the Braves were afraid to start him against the Dodgers. The theory was logical enough—why expose even a great left-hander to the Dodgers' right-handed power when there was a reasonable alternative? — but it hurt Spahn's pride, nevertheless.

So, Wednesday night, the 37-year-old Spahn "proved his point," at least to a degree, against a Dodger lineup packed with eight right-handed batters. He pitched a six-hitter, struck out six, yielded only two earned runs and wound up with a perfect night when his victory knocked the San Francisco Giants out of first place. The Giants dipped a point behind the Braves when they lost to Bob Purkey and the Cincinnati Redlegs, 5-1.

Polish sports fans were promised today they'll get a glimpse of the "world's greatest athlete," Rafer Johnson in Friday's U. S. - Poland track and field meet, even if his performance won't count in the final score.
U. S. head coach George Eastman of Manhattan College said Johnson had not been entered as a competitor here since there is no decathlon event. But he will appear as an added, unofficial entry in at least one event so Polish fans can see him.

Johnson, who set a new world record of 8,302 points at Moscow as the U. S. men's team defeated Russia, has been one of the most popular team members among enthusiastic Polish fans who have been cheering the U. S. team since its arrival Wednesday.
The Poles went all out to make the Yanks welcome, even loading up on gallons of orange and lemon juice, which sell at prohibitive prices here, for the U. S. training table. And the 80,000-seat "Tenth Anniversary" Stadium on the banks of the Vistula River is expected to be sold out for the two days of competition which start Friday.

The Poles also had something for Eastman—a promise that the meet would be scored as two separate dual meets, one for men and one for women. At Moscow the Russians had promised the same thing but wound up lumping together both point totals and claiming a 172-107 overall victory.

Eastman announced that Al Oerter, of New Hyde Park, N. Y., who placed second in the discus event in Moscow with 134 feet, 10.7 inches, has returned home. He gave no further details of Oerter's departure.

General Manager Bing Devine said Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick and National League president Warren Giles approved the trip Wednesday. The tour will extend from mid-October to Nov. 13.

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OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

The usual summer slack has hit the fishing interest around the state and the trend to do as little fishing as possible seems to be taking over the local outdoor sport. Most of the angling being done now seems to be lake fishing where the family can make a weekend outing include such things as swimming, picnicking and just plain loafing.

With only a month of summer left before school begins for most people, many of these "family plans" are scheduled at close-by resorts and camping areas. Two of the most popular spots for such family outings are Lake of the Woods and Diamond Lake. There are many others such as Fish and Four-Mile lakes, Crescent and Odell lakes and camping spots on several streams, but the two previously mentioned spots get the big play.

For those of you who prefer a short trip and longer time to fish, swim or loaf around, Lake of the Woods is ideal. Fishermen should expect to do better during the week or early in the day before the water is loaded with speed boats and water skiers.

Fishing at the Lake of the Woods has been very good as we can attest. Last Thursday, this writer and wife, Jackie, spent four hours on the lake trolling and picked up six real nice rainbows, ranging from 10 to 15 inches. We used single trolling silver flashers with nightcrawlers.

Resort owner Tom Neeley, who has boats, motors, water, fishing poles, skis and what-have-you to rent, has been slipping away from his work a few hours at a time and with young son Ronnie has been doing very well trolling. Neeley has found silver flashers trailed by either a Triple-Teaser or small flat-fish goby along with worms or nightcrawlers.

There is plenty of camping space at the lake as well as the one-day picnic spots. For those interested in making the Labor Day Weekend trip to the lake, Neeley urges you to get your boat and cabin reservations in early. Things are already beginning to move for the big three-day weekend, August 30 and 31 and September 1.

The same can be said for Diamond Lake. There are several different types of cabin rentals at Diamond ranging from just a roof, four walls and a bed to a plush cabin that's fit for a king. Some Diamond Lake cabins have hot and cold running water, some are equipped with stoves and refrigerators and others include all the cooking utensils.

Lake Lake of the Woods, resort owners at Diamond have boats and motors—over a hundred to be exact. But the lake is one of the most popular spots in the state and sportsmen wanting to fish the lake over the Labor Day holidays would be wise to make their arrangements far ahead of time.

Boaters planning to hit the waters of Diamond Lake should remember that a 10-mile-an-hour speed limit prevails. All boats speeding over the limit set by the game commission for the protection of anglers will be ticketed the same as any motorist violating a posted speed limit on the highways.

Upper Klamath Lake has a couple of spots popular to sportsmen. Rocky Point and Harrison Lodge on the west side of the lake, while Neptune's Beach is on the east side of Agency Lake, just south of the mouth of Wood River. The Williamson River Store, located on the old highway that leaves U.S. Highway 97 at Modoc Point, has boats and motors for rent for those interested in trolling down to the mouth of the stream and into the lake.

Crescent and Odell lakes both have fine camping and resort spots. Fish Lake has some good camping grounds and a few cabins. Four-Mile Lake Fish Lake has a good supply of boat rentals for fishermen. Farther to the north, good camping and resort accommodations can be found at East and Paulina lakes, just south of Bend.
