Oregon Technical Institute just received a complete truck engine transmission and differential assembly worth over \$5,000 as a gift of the Chevrolet Division of General Motors. The engine and power train are a hand outway instructional assembly showing mechanical and engineering features for students in automotive technology.

Each section of the assembly has been opened to view by removing parts of the enclosing castings. Chrome plating has been applied to functional parts throughout. Every feature has been outlined in colors for ease of instruction.

Impressive Ritual Marks Opening Of New SV Bridge

FORT JONES — An impressive ceremony marked the dedication of a new bridge over Spring Flat in Scott Valley in memory of John F. Williams, who lost his life 18 years ago while saving the life of a 13-year-old girl near the bridge.

The new structure is the replacement of a bridge that was destroyed by a flood in December, 1955, and is a concrete bridge with a 250-foot span, costing \$130,374. It was opened to the public on July 22, 1958, and is one of a series of improvements on a future highway that will find its beginning at Redding, skirt the Trinity Reservoir, and continue on to Grants Pass.

The structure was named the John F. Williams Bridge in commemoration of the 44-year-old forest ranger who died June 28, 1940, while rescuing Marilyn Madison, a swimming hole just downstream from the site. She was a visitor from Sacramento. No one in the Scott Valley area was able to recall what had happened to the girl at that time.

Opening the ceremony was a eulogy based on the theme of a poem, "Give Me Men to Match My Mountains," written by Sam Walter Foss, read by A. K. (Al) Crebbin, Klamath National Forest ranger, who concluded by saying, "such a man was John F. Williams, who was posthumously awarded a Carnegie medal for his heroism,

which was received by his widow, Clara Williams, in 1941." Crebbin then introduced Sen. Randolph Collier who was in charge of the program. Julie Ann Smith, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Smith of Fort Jones, cut the ribbon across the bridge. Smith headed the committee in charge of the dedication ceremonies.

Capt. Floyd Winchell of the California Highway Patrol of Yreka escorted Mrs. Williams to the bridge, and Senator Collier introduced her to the assembly. Mrs. Williams is now the Hungry Creek lookout for the U.S. Forest Service, and for many years has been the mail carrier between Fort Jones and Scott Bar on the road

for which the bridge creates a link.

Other members of the family of the late John F. Williams present for the ceremony included three of his daughters, Mrs. Julia Erickson of Fort Jones; Mrs. Virginia Church of Seiad Valley; and Mrs. Marie Basham of Pittsburgh. Three other children, unable to be present for the event, are John F. Williams Jr., and David Williams, both of Bakersfield, and a

fourth daughter, Mrs. Hazel Gedaly of French Morocco, Africa. The six children, at the time of Mr. Williams' death, ranged in age from 9 to 19.

Also present for the ceremony was a brother, E. J. Williams of Crescent City; and a half-brother, E. A. Jerome of Grants Pass.

Approximately 200 persons attended the event, and in addition to the previously mentioned officials there were present supervisors,

ors, W. C. Ealy, Samuel C. Jackson, and W. A. Barr; Road Commissioner Al Powers and Charles Yates, Klamath National Forest supervisor.

The ceremony, which took place Saturday, July 26, was concluded with a picnic at the site.

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
