

Business-Education Day Planned By Civic Leaders

Plans for Business - Education Day, sponsored by the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce, were discussed at a meeting of participating businessmen held Monday noon at the Winema Hotel.

Guest speaker was Ron Bailey, Portland, Northwest district manager for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, who explained the significance of the annual event which will take place locally on September 4.

Business - Education Day is designed to enable business houses to tell the story of their operations

to school teachers. Participating firms host groups of teachers, who tour their businesses, learning of their problems, objectives and modes of operation.

Bailey, in pointing out the importance for businessmen of familiarizing teachers with their operations, cited opinion surveys taken by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. He said that these teachers showed lack of understanding of many aspects of business operation, particularly profit margins.

Nearly 30 local firms have agreed to participate in this year's B-E Day, in which teachers in the city schools will take part.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Alan Ladd looked quite natural — he was a mess.

His clothes were ripped, his face scratched and stained with makeup blood. He had engaged in yet another film fight, this time for his latest movie, "Man in the Net."

Unfortunately, statistics are not available. But if the publicists were on their toes, they'd come up with some figures. For instance, they could hazard that Ladd has thrown 10,000 punches for the screen, has bested 150 opponents with no significant defeats and has expended 100 pints of Max Factor's No. 5 blood.

Far be it from me to tell them how to run their business.

At any rate, I sat down for a chat with Ladd on film fisticuffs. Did he ever make a movie without a fight?

Pacts, Bids Meet Subject

Consideration of bids and of contracts for new teachers made up the bulk of the business at Monday evening's regular monthly meetings of the high and elementary school boards.

The high school board offered contracts to Nolan Chamberlin, who will teach mathematics, and to Roland Macomber an English teacher. It also awarded a contract to the Swan Lake Moulding Company for the supply of lumber for woodworking classes; the company was low bidder at \$824.

The high school board also heard a progress report on an architectural study being made for remodeling the high school's old cafeteria into class and physical education rooms.

The elementary school board decided to offer teacher contracts to Carol Biggs, Dorothy Duncan and Virginia Scheerer; it accepted the resignation of Mrs. Mary Barry. Still needed for the coming school year were two full-time primary teachers, one special education teacher, and a half-time library teacher.

The board referred the two bids received for the remodeling of Fremont School to a committee. One bid from the Henris Roofing Company was for \$3,887; the other from C. Fitzgerald was for \$3,798.50. A low bid of \$978 from the K. C. Painting Company for painting Roosevelt School was accepted, as was another of \$960 from Roper and Roper for painting Fremont School.

Both boards discussed the consequences of a new Oregon law which charges the state department of motor vehicles with the supervision of school buses. This change has resulted in drivers being subjected to very complete and thorough physical examinations which are also costly. Each board considered various means of meeting these examination requirements but no final action was taken.

Both boards also passed resolutions to close their meetings at as close to 10:30 p.m. as possible.

The next school board meetings will be held August 11 at 7:30 p.m.
