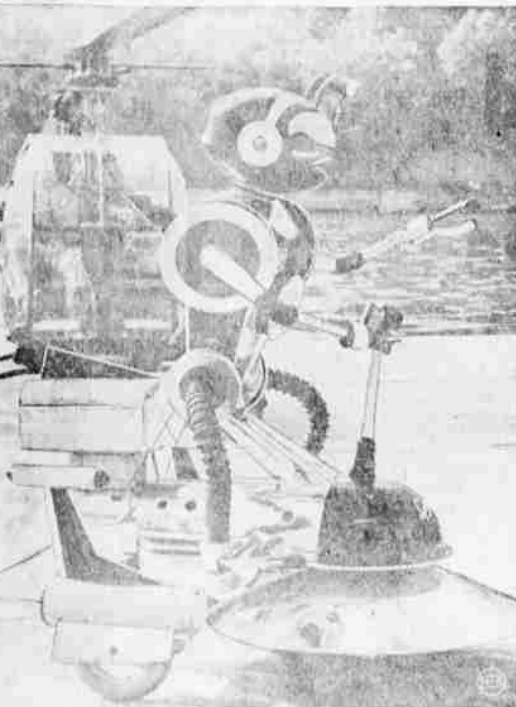

Victim of the shooting was police officer Robert J. Morey, 41. His assailant was Wilbert Murray, 22, a Negro.

The shooting took place in the Potrero District Sunday when the officer arrested Murray for sleeping in a parked car belonging to a sailor.

Trades Group Elects Heads

ROSEBURG (AP) — Oregon Building Trades Council delegates elected new candidates to the two top offices at Sunday's closing session of a two-day meeting.

Vulney Martin, secretary-treasurer of the council for 10 years, was unseated in his bid for reelection by Joe Willis, secretary of the Eugene Building Trades Council.

Martin, 60-year-old Portlander, said he intends to retire. He was defeated by a vote of 92-40 for the full-time salaried position.

Jerry McCabe of Portland, secretary of the Ironworkers Union local, was elected council president in a 99-34 vote over E. B. Weber, member of the Carpenters Union local in Portland.

Willis said he hopes to move the state headquarters of the council from Portland to Eugene.

Delegates named George Potuck, Medford, as vice president, and elected three members of the board of trustees, Joe Ross of Bend, Herb Waits Jr. of Klamath Falls, and C. P. Glass of Coos Bay.

A resolution introduced by the State Council of Carpenters, calling for a shorter work week with no pay reduction, was approved at the closing session.

Delegates instructed council officers to assist in attempts to arrange new meetings between contractors and the Hoisting and Portable Engineers Union to try to settle a 26-day construction tie-up.

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield came out against so-called right-to-work laws in a Saturday convention address.

Passage of such legislation in Oregon "would destroy our sound labor-management relations," the GOP gubernatorial nominee said. "Good labor-management relations are necessary to attract investment capital to Oregon—a step necessary to create more job opportunities," Hatfield said.

Other union councils which closed meetings preliminary to a week-long session of the Oregon State Labor Council, which opened Monday, were the Retail Clerks and the Culinary Workers, Bartenders, Hotel and Motel Service Workers.

No Licensing For 16 To 18

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — Gov. James T. Blair says he is going to try to stop people under 18 from driving automobiles in Missouri.

The governor told the Citizens Safety and Traffic Committee of Missouri yesterday that he will ask the next legislature to increase the minimum age for obtaining a driver's license from 16 to 18.

"I know this won't be popular especially with a lot of young people," Blair said, "but there is a tremendous number of accidents involving the 16 to 18 age group."

State Will Seed O&C Forest Land

PORTLAND (AP) — O&C forests will be rehabilitated by the planting of several million tree seedlings and thousands of pounds of tree seed in the current fiscal year.

The Bureau of Land Management Friday said it will plant 13,358,000 tree seedlings on 23,045 acres of O&C lands in Western Oregon and spread 8,779 pounds of tree seed on 11,861 acres.

The BLM said it also will plant 500,000 tree seedlings on 450 acres of Public Domain and Coos Bay Wagon Road timber lands.

Clearing 3,900 acres of O&C lands in a fire protection program is planned, as well as construction of 44.3 miles of access roads.

Space Probes Provide Data

MOSCOW (AP) — Space and rocket experts, mainly of the United States and the Soviet Union, today began comparing notes on the results of their earth satellites and rockets which have been probing the upper air.

For the next four days they will be presenting a series of formal reports. They also will be meeting face to face in an unusual chance to discuss problems and especially to learn more specific details of each other's work than has been exchanged so far through slower, more formal channels.

Such details can be vital in making the fullest scientific use of manned moons, U. S. scientists explained.

The sessions are one of 14 divisions of work by scientists attending the full-dress meeting of the Committee for the International Geophysical Year, which is now 13 months old.

The IGY is an 18-month cooperative study by scientists of more than 60 nations on all physical aspects of the earth and sun and their effects on human life. Other fields include studies of the weather, oceans, glaciers and earthquakes.

But space has taken the center of the stage, for the launching of the Soviet Sputniks and the U. S. satellites has been one of the most dramatic events for the public.

One report today by Dr. Fred Whipple, director of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory at Cambridge, Mass., said careful studies of the flights by Soviet and U. S. satellites showed there is much more air at higher altitudes than had been thought.

Air drag effects showed there is five times more air 140 miles above the earth and 20 times more at 250 miles.

Harness Racing Gets New Gate

YREKA — A mobile starting gate for the harness races in the afternoon of August 16 and 17 at the Siskiyou County Fair is an innovation for the area, according to E. R. Mathews, fair manager.

Before the use of the mobile gate, the trotters and pacers were sent on their way by a leather-lunged man, armed with a megaphone, and dependent on the good intentions of competing drivers. Cooperation often was sadly lacking and spectators got restless and bored, as try after try was made to get a good start. This happened at several of the races last year, but with the large entry list expected this year, a mobile gate has been ordered, and an internationally known starter, McArthur Nyland, has been contracted to assure fast and orderly starts.

Cyprus Killing Is Spreading

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Violence between Greek and Turk Cypriots spread to Kyrenia on the island's north coast for the first time when gunmen ambushed a party of Turk Cypriots today and wounded two.

The killings continued elsewhere. A group standing at a bus stop in Nicosia was sprayed with automatic weapon fire. One Greek Cypriot was killed and another wounded.

Five other Cypriots died yesterday in the two-month-old wave of bloodshed between the two groups.

In Limassol, a British army sergeant was killed. Apparently he was the victim of underground Greek Cypriot terrorists who have threatened to kill a Briton for every Greek Cypriot killed by the British.

British troops opened fire on Greek rioters last Thursday and killed two, EOKA, the Greek underground, got one Briton Friday.
