Braves Dump Giants Twice

Freely translated, as any German-bred, jumpin' for joy Milwaukee burgher will tell you, it means the San Francisco Giants have probably had it as a National League challenger.
By combining a six-game winning streak of their own with a six-game Giants losing streak, Milwaukee's champion Braves have opened up a five-game lead in the NL.
The 4-3 and 6-0 victories yesterday at County Stadium gave Milwaukee a four-game weekend sweep of the Giants.
The Giants now lead third place Pittsburgh by only two games after the Pirates' third successive shutout victory over the hapless St. Louis Cardinals, 2-0, in the first of two scheduled games at Pittsburgh. The Pirates led 2-0 in the fifth inning when the second game collided with Pennsylvania's 7 p.m. curfew.
Chicago and Philadelphia split, the Cubs outscoring the Phils 12-10 after the Phils had won the opener 8-2 behind Ray Semproch. Los Angeles and Cincinnati also split, enabling the Dodgers to vacate last place in favor of the Cards. Los Angeles won the first game, 8-5 in 10 innings, and dropped the nightcap 3-1.
In the American League, Dick Donovan and Ray Moore pitched the Chicago White Sox to a 3-1

Hungary To Host Oval Meet

WARSAW (UPI) — The touring U. S. track and field team, which has scored victories in men's events over Russia and Poland, was scheduled to leave today for Budapest for a two-day meet against Hungary's top athletes on Tuesday and Wednesday.
The Americans, traveling in three special Polish planes, will compete in a 90,000 seat stadium against Hungary.
As in the meets at Moscow last weekend and here this weekend, the American men's team will be favored.
In the two-day meet concluding here Saturday, the Americans won the men's events, 115-97, while the Polish women defeated the U. S. women, 54-52.
The meet, which drew capacity crowds of 100,000 each day, was hailed as a great success by Warsaw Sunday papers.
Top performance was a world record of 8:32.0 by Poland's Jerzy Chomik in the 3,000 meter steeplechase. Phil Coleman of Champaign, Ill., ran the fastest time ever clocked by an American, 8:40.8, but finished third.

Manager Irv Whitt's Klamath Falls Kubs notched a very important victory at Gem Stadium Sunday afternoon as they whipped the Weed Sons 13-2 in one of three Northern California League baseball games scheduled yesterday.
The Kubs climbed into a tie for the league leadership by their convincing triumph over the Sons with three games left to play. Mount Shasta took over third place in the six-team race by edging Yreka 8-7 in a game played at Mount Shasta. Dunsmuir sank lower in the cellar after taking a 15-2 drubbing from Scott Valley.
Klamath failed to act the part of a good host to Weed starting pitcher Bob Simmons Sunday as the Kubs rapped him for five hits and six runs in the first inning.
Simmons was unable to get a Klamath batter out and Weed rushed Gene Hilliard to the mound to try and save the game, but the damage was already done.
Klamath pitcher Gerry Burcher made his first start of the Northern California League season and turned back the Sons on six hits while giving up two runs. Burcher walked one and faced only 33 batters, six away from a perfect game.
Klamath started things off in quick fashion as leadoff batter Ron Conner walked to open the bottom of the first inning. Fran Miller lashed out a long triple scoring Conner then crossed home plate himself on a follow-up triple by Dorm Martin. Whitt singled Martin home with the third Klamath score and another triple—the third of the inning—by Floyd Linderman scored Whitt home. Linderman chased on George Hanson's single and that was all for Simmons. Hilliard came on to get Jerry Burke on a fly to shortstop Ray Brown and Bob Kelly on strikes. But Burcher singled scoring Hanson with the sixth run of the inning. Klamath had the bases loaded after Hilliard hit Conner and walked Miller, but Martin grounded out to end the rally.
The Kubs scored twice in the second and fifth innings, then came on with a single run in the seventh and two more in the eighth to clinch the "big game" victory.
Miller collected three hits in three official trips to the plate for the Kubs while Martin added a three-for-five day to his average. Whitt had three hits in four trips while Linderman and Kelly each batted out a pair of hits. Burcher didn't give up more than one hit to any Weed batter with Ray Brown's double the longest blow for the visitors.
At Mount Shasta, the host Seals scored three runs in the last of the seventh to come from behind and win the game. Doubles by Bob Lawary and Dick Berensen, a single by Gene English, one walk and two sacrifices broke Yreka's 7-4 lead down. Hollie Brooks had three hits for Mount Shasta.
Dunsmuir's Larry Moulton was well on his way to a shutout victory over Scott Valley at Dunsmuir in the third game, but the roof and everything failed to it fell on him in the last two innings. Scott Valley trailed 1-0 going into the top of the eighth when the Stars sent 15 men to the plate and scored 12 runs. In the ninth, Scott Valley tallied three more times as Dunsmuir's win was turned into a lopsided defeat.
Ed Fisher had a three-run homer in the eighth for Scott Valley and teammate clouted a grand slam homer in the same inning.

It's there in black and white, a 10-12 record with four doubleheaders flops to show for the Sunday efforts of the big, bad New Yorkers who make a farce of the American League Monday through Saturday.
Even Manager Casey Stengel, when he isn't cracking wise about the National League, says: "Don't know what it maybe I oughta just manage on weekdays and take Sunday off."
Chicago's climbing White Sox, now only a half game out of second place, had yesterday's Sunday outing against the runaway AL leaders. They cut the Yanks' margin to 15½ games with 3-1 and 4-0 victories behind right-handers Dick Donovan and Ray Moore.
Boston's Red Sox took advantage of the Yankee losses to pull back into second place, shattering Cleveland's seven-game winning streak 3-2 and 4-2. The sweep dumped the Indians from second to fifth. Detroit, running its win streak to six, moved up to fourth with 3-1, 4-1 victories over Baltimore. Kansas City split with Washington, dropping a 15-inning nightcap 4-3 after romping home 12-0 in the opener.

Moore blanked the American League leaders 4-0 on five hits after teammate Dick Donovan whipped them 3-1 in the first game on only three hits.
"All five hits they got off me were on fast balls," groined Moore. "Hey, Dick, what they hit off'n you?"
"Curve ball, slider, fast ball," answered Donovan.
"Well, guess they do get hits on other pitchers," said Moore, whom the Yankees haven't beaten yet this season.
What's the reason for this success?
"Guess, I'm just lucky," said Moore, who has a 7-3 record and only three complete games — all against New York.
"I've been pitching good, but against these other teams something always seems to happen," Sox Manager Al Lopez had a different explanation.
"He's a good pitcher with real good stuff," said Lopez. "I guess he's one of those guys who does better against tougher competition."
Moore, a 32-year-old from Upper Marlboro, Md., came to the Sox in a multi-player deal with Baltimore last winter. When the Sox made the deal, Lopez admitted Moore was the man he wanted because "he can beat the Yankees."
