Braves Whipped By Pirates, 4-3

By FRED DOWN United Press International Those upstart Pittsburgh Pirates have "braked" the Milwaukee Braves' threatened runaway—and there may yet be a pennant race in the National League. The Pirates, battling to finish in the first division for the first time since 1948, snapped the Braves' six-game winning streak, 4-3, Monday night on a ninth-inning homer by Roberto Clemente. The San Francisco Giants, who beat the Chicago Cubs, 6-4, in an afternoon game, thus moved within four games of the Braves and the Pirates moved up to within six of the world champions. And so, all the talk of a Milwaukee runaway that started after the Braves' four-game weekend sweep of the Giants, is quieted. The Braves may go on to win another pennant but their opposition hasn't given up yet. The Pirates, now three games ahead of the fourth-place Cubs, have won four straight games and 17 of 26 (.654 pace) since July 4 when they were in seventh place. For the last week or so, they've been getting the best pitching in either league—they had a string of 34 consecutive scoreless innings when the Braves scored in the third inning Monday night—and they're getting long-ball punch from such relatively under-publicized players as Clemente, Bob Skinner and Dick Stuart.

Klamath Falls Hosts Top Babe Ruth Teams

The arrival in Klamath Falls Monday afternoon of state championship teams from Montana and Idaho precipitated a sudden jump in the already high local baseball fever as the opening round of the Regional Babe Ruth Tournament, which will start at 4 p.m. Wednesday, at Gem Stadium, nears. Babe Ruth headquarters in the Winema Hotel lobby has a beehive of activity as housing arrangements for the visiting teams were completed. Scheduled to arrive this afternoon are squads from Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia followed by the Wyoming entry who will be here late tonight. The American League All-Stars, the host team, representing Klamath Falls, won a practice game, 10-8 from a squad of County-City Stars on Conger Field Monday night. The Idaho aggregation, 1957 defending regional champs from Kellogg, is slated to meet Wyoming at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the second game of the opening day, while Klamath Falls will tangle with the Montana club, who hail from Kalispell, at 9 in the final game of the first round. At 4 p.m. the first game will see Atlas Sheet Metal of Portland, the Oregon State champions, mixing with British Columbia. The Portlanders won their right to represent Oregon by virtue of a 11-4 victory over the local County All-Stars in the State Tourney at Portland last weekend. The Washington state entrant, South King County, drew a bye for the opening round. Klamath Falls, as the American League All-Stars will be called during tournament play, got a stiff workout in the Monday evening test against the County-City pickup team. The All-Stars got off to 4-0 lead in the first three innings, only to have their rivals narrow the count to 5-4, at the end of five full innings. The County-City crew worked over five All-Star hurlers and grabbed an 8-7 lead at the end of the sixth. The All-Stars capitalized on a pair of walks, two singles and an error to count three runs in the top of the seventh to finally cement their win. Starting hurler John Webb was relieved at the end of two innings in order that Wally Palmberg might get a workout. Webb had led the County-City nine scoreless and had given up only one hit. Palmberg experienced trouble with a sore-arm and asked to be relieved in the fourth frame after walking three and allowing one hit. Dean Rhoads stayed until the sixth, allowing three hits to tie the score before being pulled in favor of Bert Albritton. Albritton gave up three more hits and walked three men to give the C-C club their temporary lead. Sherman Allen finished up the game for the All-Stars. C-C starter Kent Hunsaker was relieved in the fourth inning by Dennis Salvadori. Hunsaker allowed only two hits and walked six during his stint, Salvadori, who was charged with the loss, issued seven hits and walked three while striking out four. The power-hitter of the game was All-Star centerfielder, Rich Depew, who smashed a home-run, a triple and a single in five trips. In his other two times at bat Depew lashed a high sacrifice fly and a sacrifice grounder. Rhoads and Allen each contributed a pair of singles to the All-Star cause. Second baseman Don Willey led the C-C team with a pair of doubles, while Dean Haskins added three singles. Salvadori boomed a pair of singles in three trips. The linescore: R H E Amer. Tom Courtney Points For New 800 Record

BUDAPEST (AP)—Tom Courtney, Olympic champion and holder of the world record for 800 yards, had his sights on a new 800-meter international standard tonight as he led America's athletes into a track extravaganza against the best of Hungary and Czechoslovakia. Roger Moens of Belgium holds the world mark of 1:45.7. Courtney's world mark for the slightly longer 800 yard is 1:46.8. Assistant coach Payton Jordan said the Americans were tired after competing in the Soviet Union and Poland with the U.S. men winning both times and the women losing the two meets. "But we're going to put on a show for Budapest," he added. To spread the talent, built American good will and give everybody a look, American officials have decided to take the almost unprecedented move of breaking up the world's best 1,600-meter relay team. "We'll put Glenn Davis on one relay team and Eddie Southern on the other and they may race against each other as well as the Hungarian teams, or we will let the relay teams in different races," American group chief Dan Ferris said.
