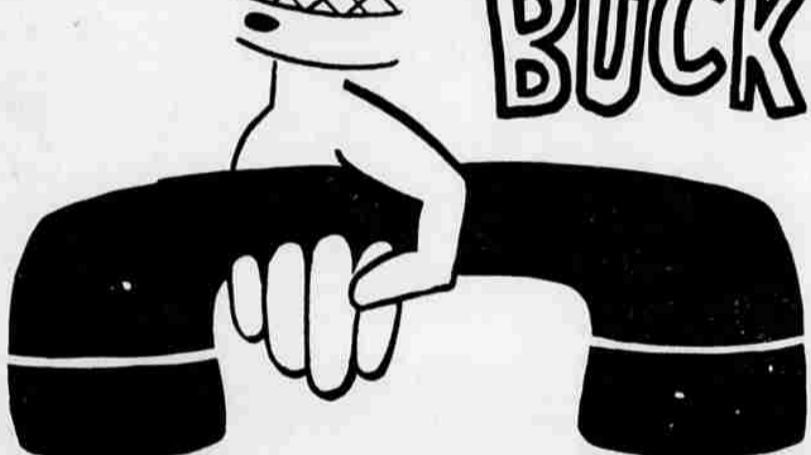

Sealed bids in duplicate to forms provided therefor, marked outside "Bid Economic Unit 30 Logging Unit," addressed to the Superintendent, Klamath Indian Agency, Klamath Falls, Oregon, will be received until 1:00 P.M. Pacific Standard Time August 8, 1953, for the purchase of timber on the Economic Unit 30 Logging Unit. The Unit includes approximately 11,200 acres of timber lands with a total estimated stand to be cut, which estimates are based on approximately 92,240 M. ft. B.M. of Ponderosa Pine 1,500 M. ft. B.M. of Sugar Pine and an undetermined volume of Lodgepole Pine and other species which will enter into the determination of the unit value bill. Each bidder must state the price per thousand feet 10 M. Scribner Decimal B.M. for Ponderosa Pine, \$27.00 per thousand feet B.M. for Sugar Pine, and \$6.00 per thousand feet B.M. for Lodgepole Pine and other species. A certified check for one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars, or a similar bank payable to the Bureau of Indian Affairs, must accompany each bid. Persons bidding for or on behalf of companies, corporations, or partnerships, must at the time of bidding submit in writing satisfactory evidence of their ability to pay the purchase price of unsuccessful bidders will be returned after the successful bidder will be applied as part of the purchase price against any liquidated damages if the bidder fails to execute the contract and furnish satisfactory bond for fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars within sixty days of the date of his bid. WASHINGTON (AP)—A major House fight over an employee pension-welfare fund bill centered today around efforts to exempt those plans financed by management.

The fight moves to the House floor tomorrow with consideration of a bill to require public reporting on all such plans—both those run by labor unions and those run by management.

Legislation along somewhat similar lines already has been passed by the Senate. It grew out of hearings by the Senate Rackets Committee, which developed testimony regarding gross misuse of some employee funds.

Labor unions have endorsed the principle of the legislation, provided it applies to management as well as labor-operated funds. Business groups have opposed inclusion of the funds they finance, contending these have not been involved in any charges of misuse.

Many of the management funds are handled by commercial insurance companies, some of which have joined in the fight against the bill.

Building activity in Klamath Falls, as well as over the state, rose significantly during June, the University of Oregon reported today.

Building permits for June in Klamath Falls amounted to \$194,490, compared with permit totals of \$176,751 during May and totals of \$144,656 for June, 1952. Of the June 1953 total, \$126,190 was spent for new homes, \$51,000 for non-residence building, and \$17,300 for alterations and repairs.

Over the state, June building permits totaled \$20,856,626, an increase of 54.2 per cent over June, 1952.
