

### Engineer Visits California On Water Resources Study

Leland R. Illingworth, supervising hydraulic engineer with the California Department of Water Resources, Sacramento, has been a visitor to Northern California this week in connection with the

water resources study which began in central and western Siskiyou County last January. These detailed investigations into water resources, present use, and ultimate water requirements, which began in central and western Siskiyou County, are now entering a new phase, Illingworth reports.

Early this year, surface water diversions in the California portion of the Klamath River Basin were located and the owners interviewed. Now, the actual quantities of water involved in these diversions are being determined, and crops mapped.

At the same time, a similar study is being started in Butte Valley, on Butte and Antelope creeks, and in the Lost River watershed in California. The preliminary location of diversions and interviews with owners will start immediately, with measurement and crop mapping activities planned for next summer.

This work is being closely coordinated with work done for the Klamath River Interstate Compact Commission.

The investigations are part of a California-wide survey to determine what amounts of surplus water, if any, would be available for export to other watersheds without depriving the watersheds of origin of any amount necessary for beneficial use in the future.

They are authorized by Section 232 of the State Water Code, enacted in 1956, and known as the "inventory of water resources and requirements."

These investigations are designed to determine:

1. Boundaries of the respective watersheds of the state, and the amount of water originating therein.
2. Quantities of water reasonably required for ultimate beneficial use in the watersheds.
3. Quantities of water, if any, available for export.
4. Areas which could be served by such exported water.

The legislation states that before any of the findings are adopted, the Department of Water Resources must hold public hearings in the area concerned.

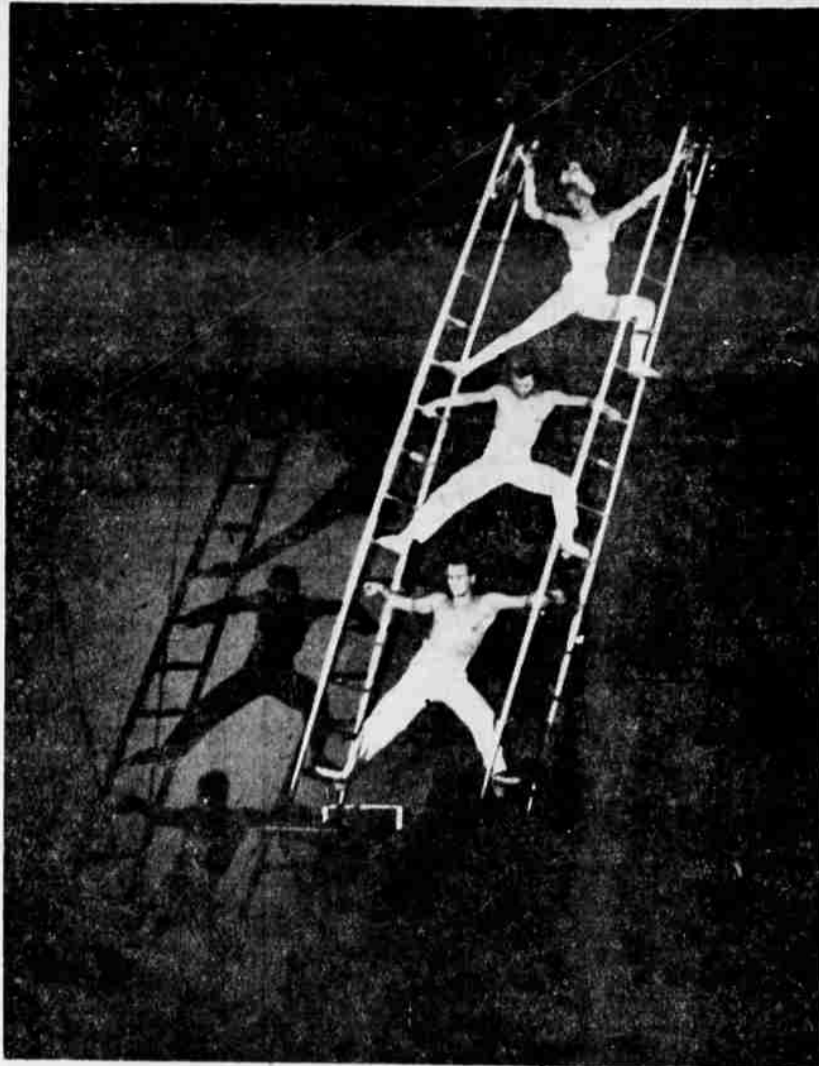

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### Mexico Eyes RR Sabotage

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—The army took charge of Mexico's nationalized railway system today, guarding it against sabotage in a wildcat strike which has stranded hundreds of travelers, including many Americans.

Roberto Amoros, general manager of the nationalized railways, was negotiating with Demetrio Vallejo, leader of the "rebel" union faction that called the unauthorized walkout. Prospects for a settlement sometime today appeared to be good.

A wildcat teachers' strike was threatened in support of the rail walkout.

Oton Salazar, leftist leader of the dissident teachers' union group which staged a sit-down strike in the Education Ministry several months ago, said Monday night his followers would not report for work today.

### Polish Government Drops Two Ministers

WARSAW, Poland (UPI)—The Polish government has dropped two vice-ministers for undisclosed reasons, the official news agency P.A.P. said today.

Edward Marzec, a Communist theoretical writer, was replaced as vice-minister of culture by Zygmunt Garsiecki. Zenon Szpiro was ousted as vice-minister of telecommunications, but no replacement was named immediately.

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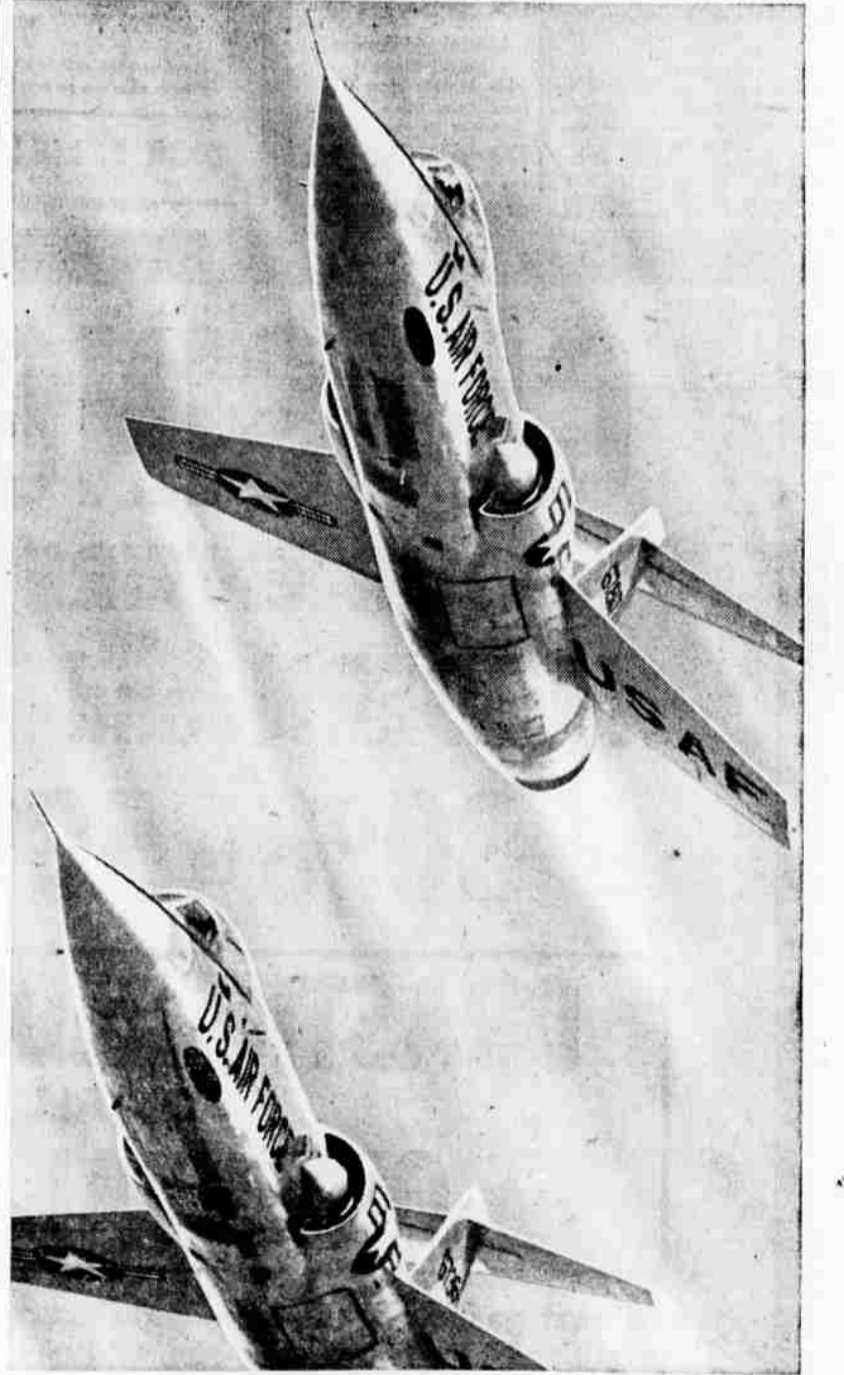
