July Rainfall Increase Noted

Klamath Falls July weather was chiefly distinguished from that of an average year by the amount of rainfall, the monthly statistical report of the Bureau of Reclamation shows.

Total precipitation for the month, .89 inch, was nearly three times the average figure of .30, and over six times that of July, 1957: .14. As of the end of July, the total precipitation since the beginning of the "stream year," October 1, 1957, was 19.47 inches; the normal figure is 12.66 inches.

July's mean monthly temperature was somewhat lower than the mean monthly temperature for the month, based on all available records. The latter figure is 68.3 degrees, the 1958 figure 66.8 (only .4 degree higher than in 1957). Temperatures last month varied from 39 to 95 degrees, the former on July 2, the latter on July 28. There were 21 clear, seven partly cloudy, and two cloudy days during July.

This data is drawn from the U.S. Weather Bureau station at the Copco substation near Klamath Falls.

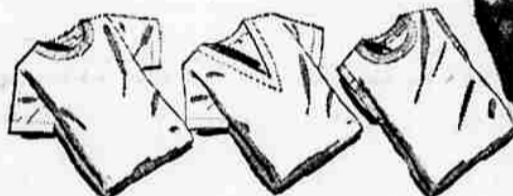
