# Klamath Falls, Idaho, Oregon Win BR Openers

## KF Humbles Montana 26-2

Victories before 700 fans in the opening round Wednesday of the Babe Ruth Regional Tournament now in progress at Gem Stadium boosted Klamath Falls, Idaho and Oregon a step farther along the championship trail toward the right to represent the Northwest in the Babe Ruth World Series set for August 19, in Vancouver, B.C.  
In the second round, which opened this afternoon at 2 o'clock with a contest between Wyoming and Montana, Oregon will take on Washington at 7 p.m., and Klamath Falls will meet Idaho at 9 o'clock. Washington rated their slot in the second round against Oregon because of the fact that they drew a bye in Wednesday's action.  
North Vancouver, the British Columbia entry which lost its first game to the vaunted Oregon champions 9-2, will sit out the second round because it also drew a bye. Idaho turned back an outfit Wyoming team 14-2, on Wednesday while Klamath Falls racked up a 26-2 scoring fiasco over the luckless Montana nine.

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## Rookie Tennis Ace Topples "Champs"

The 21-year-old southpaw from San Marino, Calif., who almost wrecked the Eastern grass court tennis tourney by eliminating world champion Ashley Cooper of Australia on Tuesday and eighth-

seeded Giammalva Wednesday, said, "Naturally, I was pretty grim."  
"But I'm not bitter about it now—not even about the absence of club officials during my match with Giammalva," he added.  
If this senior finance student from UCLA had the flaring temperament of many former court stars, he might have stalked off the court when given the absent treatment—a treatment he could neither understand nor appreciate.  
On Tuesday the hard-hitting Californian with the twisting serve went out and eliminated Cooper, 6-3, 6-3. Cooper, Wimbledon and Australian singles champ, generally is recognized as "world" champion. Cranston, rated only 29th among U. S. players, wasn't even seeded here.  
If an obscure performer in any other sport had beaten a world champion, he doubtlessly would have been deluged with congratulations from everyone connected with the contest.  
But not in this instance. Instead of glorifying Cranston, the club officials concentrated on blasting Cooper for permitting Cranston to beat him. They were upset because they had contributed expense money to bring Cooper to the tourney and he had let them down by being eliminated early, they said.  
In the moment of his greatest triumph, young Cranston must have felt like a rookie hurler who had just pitched a no-hit game but was flabbergasted by hearing everyone condemn the opposing batsman for letting him get away with it.  
No wonder he was fighting his temper when he went out on the courts against Davis Cup player Giammalva of Houston, Tex.  
"I said to myself, 'I've just got to win this one or else they'll continue to regard Tuesday's result as a Cooper loss and not a Cranston victory,'" he said.  
He downed Giammalva, 6-3, 6-6, 6-4. When John saw the Texan was getting to him at 3-0 in the second set, he coasted the set out and then over-powered him in the third.  
And he doesn't feel bitter today.

## K. Falls Rampant

The feature game of the first day's play became a parade of base-runners as Klamath Falls, the host team of the tourney, proved anything but cordial in handing a disconcerted Montana team a 26-2 bombing. The local nine was helped considerably by 12 Montana errors.  
A two run first inning lead gave the Klamath boosters a shred of false hope that quickly dwindled as Klamath Falls retaliated in their half of the opening frame by score 12 runs. From here on the Montanans were never in contention.  
The winning pitcher, righthander Johnny Webb, who went the full distance, gave up a pair of walks and two singles that accounted for the Montana tallies in the first, but settled down to allow only three more hits, three more free passes, and let just two Montana runners get as far as third base for the rest of the game. Webb struck out five batters.

## Oregon Victor

In the first game of the day, the Oregon state champions, Atlas Sheet Metal of Portland, took command of the situation in the second inning with a 3-0 bulge, then to whip North Vancouver, the B.C. entrant 9-2.  
Oregon registered eight hits to three for the Canadians and both squads committed four errors.  
Credited with Oregon victory was slim Jim Warren, who proved the nemesis of the Klamath County All-Stars in last week's state tourney. Warren delivered only three BC hits, walked one batter and fanned six in going the full distance for the Portlanders.  
Charged with the loss was Ian Dixon who also went the route and walked only three men, gave up eight hits and struck out six.  
Steve Jones, the Oregon left fielder, led his mates at the plate as he smashed a triple in the second stanza and then came back in the third with an awesome grand-slam homer to right center. The Oregon second-sacker, Sonny Payne, also notched a triple in the second inning and picked up a confusing infield-double in the fourth.  
Other Oregon safeties were counted off by catcher Red Phillips, both singles, and 2-4 by pitcher Warren.

## Idaho Moves Up

In the 7 o'clock game, the second of the opening round, Idaho moved ahead by breaking a tight ball game wide open in the last two innings as they scored five runs in the sixth and seventh cantos to bust Wyoming 14-2.  
The contest took on all the aspects of a pitcher's battle until the top of the third stanza when Idaho broke the scoring ice on a solid double by Jack Morbeck, second base, a single by Dave Braun, center field, and a towering home run by right fielder Barclay Poole which netted them three markers.  
Wyoming swung back into the game in the last of the fourth as they scored twice on three errors, a hit batter, a wild pitch and a sharp single by left fielder, Larry Aheyta. From here on they were blanked however, despite a pair of singles by Shelby Sharp, first base, and Jim McIntosh, third-sacker, both of which came in the fifth inning. Some smooth fielding on the part of the Idahoans stopped the threat. Catcher Pat Braden bagged the other Wyoming single.  
Gaining credit for the Idaho win was starter Dale DeJanovich, who, although he worked only three-plus innings before being replaced by Bob Callahan, gave up only one hit, walked two and whiffed three Wyoming batters. In his relief role Callahan allowed the other three hits, walked two and fanned one.  
Jim Jackson, the loser, worked 5 2/3 innings and was tagged for seven of the 10 Idaho hits. He walked four and struck out seven. His relief, fireman Jim Jessen, gave up a double, a walk and fanned one before putting out the sixth inning Idaho fire. Jessen's troubles were not over, however, despite the fact that he collected three strikeouts in the seventh. A hit batter, two errors, a brace of walks and a pair of singles piled down five more runs on his head.  
Poole, the hardy Idaho right fielder, added a double and two singles to his early home run to show his teammates the way. Collecting three hits in five trips was Gary Amos, first base, who picked up a double and two singles. Morbeck and Braun each picked up a single, to round out the Idaho

## Herb Elliott Ready For Another Record

DUBLIN, Ireland (UPI)—Without any time off to celebrate his astounding new mile record of 3:55.5, Australian running machine Herb Elliott heads right back to the track tonight for another race, this time at either a half-mile or two miles.  
Elliott's statement to meet officials that he's ready for another top-flight race flabbergasted them almost as much as his "miracle mile" Wednesday night amazed a crowd that came to root for Ron Delany and stayed to cheer Elliott to the echo.  
Changes were good that Elliott would hook up in another duel with Delany tonight, especially if the Aussie elected to run the half-mile.  
Elliott's triumph goes into the books as the most amazing mile race in history since five runners all broke the four-minute barrier. Four of them were under the accepted mile mark of 3:58.0 held by Australian John Landy. Elliott said today the record was due to "perfect conditions."  
He listed: (1) the track, which was firm and springy after a light rain; (2) the pace — "just terrific"; (3) the competition; (4) "The wonderful enthusiasm of the Irish crowd for their terrific applause on my last lap."  
Officials of the Clonliffe Harriers and Crusaders Meet confirmed there was no reason why Elliott's performance would be denied recognition as a new world mark by the International Amateur Athletic Federation. There was no following wind or any other questionable factor, such as pacing, involved.  
Aussie Merv Lincoln was second in 3:55.9, trailing Elliott by about 15 yards, and Delany was third in 3:57.5, barely nipping Murray Halberg of New Zealand who was clocked in the same time. Aussie Albert Thomas suffered the strange fate of running a 3:58.6 mile and finishing 1-1/4-h.  
Elliott's fractional times were: 58 seconds for the first quarter; 1:58.0 for the half; 2:59.0 for the three-quarters. He ran the last quarter in 55.5 seconds.
