

Phoenix Grabs Full Game Lead In PCL

The Phoenix Giants stepped in to a full game lead in the Pacific Coast League pennant race Thursday night, beating the Seattle Rainiers while the second-place Vancouver Mounties had to settle for a split with Portland.

The Giants won it big over the Rainiers, 9-4. The Mounties shelved the Beavers 5-1 in the opener and then dropped the nightcap 6-3.

In other league action, Salt Lake City's Bees tipped Sacramento 6-3 and the San Diego Padres whitewashed Spokane's Indians 5-0.

The Giants rattled Seattle pitching for 12 hits, including homers by George Prescott, Andre Rodgers and Willie McCovey and tacked the loss on Marty Kutyna. Phoenix had nine runs up on the scoreboard before Seattle got its first man around.

The Giants whipped up five

double plays to keep winner Curt Barclay's head above water. Barclay had to have help from Joe Margoneri in the ninth after giving up two Seattle runs in the eighth; and two hits to start the ninth.

George Bamberger choked the Beavers off on six hits in the first game of the Vancouver-Portland bargain bill. He struck out two and failed to give up a walk. Vic Lombardi, who gave up eight hits, absorbed the loss.

Portland's lone run came on George Freese's solo homer in the fourth.

In the nightcap, Portland reliever Eddie Mayer pitched seven innings of four-hit ball to pick up his first victory in six decisions while his mates were banging out nine hits. The Beavers spotted Vancouver two runs in the first inning and then won it with three-run frames, the fifth and sixth.

Jim McDaniel drove in three runs with a triple and a homer in Salt Lake City's victory over the Solons. The Bees only got three other hits, but one of them was Sam Milley's one-run triple and another was Ken Toothman's double, which set the stage for Salt Lake City's final run in the seventh.

Jack Lamabe was the victor, although he gave up nine hits and five walks in seven innings on the mound. Carl Greene, the Sacramento starter, lost it. He worked five innings, gave up four hits, five runs and three walks.

Jack Springs, who tailed for the old Spokane entry in the Northwest League, came back to haunt the Indians in a San Diego uniform as he blanked the Redskins on three hits, including two singles and Tony Roig's double.

Doubles by Larry Raines and Hal Naragon and a walk gave the Padres two runs, all they needed, in the third inning. Raines got another double in the game as he batted three for four.

Giants Limp Home, Hope For New Fate

LOS ANGELES (AP) - San Francisco's Giants, who ruled the National League 10 days ago limped back to California today wondering whether they could hold even the state championship.

Manager Bill Rigney, ever the optimist, told them "You've hit the bottom of the barrel, boys. The only way to bounce is up. We've got what it takes."

His brief declaration came after their 12-1 shellacking at the hands of the St. Louis Cardinals Thursday night, a game marked by four costly errors, wild pitching and a short supply of Giant hits.

Rigney, who remarked "I was just mad," had been thumbed out of that one by Umpire Al Barlick for protesting the call on a ball pitched by Ramon Montant.

That was the ninth San Francisco loss in the last 10 games and dropped the rookie laden club seven games behind the first place Milwaukee Braves. The Giants, who sometimes start as many as five rookies, are now only two games ahead of third place Pittsburgh.

Despite their collapse, they seem able to maintain their lead of the Los Angeles Dodgers and wind up with the California title, at least. They have an 8-2 edge on the Dodgers.

Ruben Gomez pitches tonight against the Dodgers' Don Drysdale. Gomez (6-9) has a 3-0 mark against Los Angeles. Drysdale (6-11) is 0-3 against the Giants.

In the two games they lost to St. Louis, San Francisco pitchers gave up a total of 20 runs and 26 hits.

Curtis Cup Action Opens

NEWTON, Mass. (UPI) - The top women amateur golfers of Britain and the United States opened a two-day tussle today for the Curtis Cup.

Yakima Nets NWL Victory

The boys played right along with the percentages in the Northwest League Thursday night. The top three clubs knocked the bottom three further down into the second division.

Yakima retained its two and a half game lead by whipping Salem, 13-7, while second place Lewiston was edging Eugene, 4-3. Wenatchee's third place Chiefs bombed Tri-City, 12-6.

The Beavers' win swept the series and gave Salem's Senators a 9-32 second-half season record, pushing them further into the cellar.

Eight runs in the sixth inning put Yakima well out of Salem's reach after the Beavers had pulled to a 3-2 lead on Dan Ganus' two-run homer in the fourth.

Bruce McIntosh proved the difference in the Lewiston-Eugene fracas. He scored the tying run in the ninth frame and drove in the winning tally for the Broncos in the 10th.

McIntosh doubled to right-center with two out in the ninth to drive in Ted Biedes. He led off the 10th with a triple and came home with the winning run on Roger Herscher's single.

Thornton Kipper, allowing no earned runs, marked up his 18th win of the season. He lost nine, three of them in extra-inning contests.

One big inning led the way for Wenatchee's triumph over Tri-City on the Chief's home field.

Scoring seven runs in the third, the Chiefs came back from a 2-0 deficit and staged off a hard fighting Tri-City comeback attempt to take the series, 2-1.

The Braves scored single unearned runs in the first and third and kept necking away at Wenatchee's lead. They trimmed it to 8-6 in the seventh when Vern Piver slammed a solo homer.

But Wenatchee quickly iceed it in the eighth with four runs on three singles and doubles by Hank Bivens and pitcher Bob Campbell.

Charlie Tulner homered in the fourth for the winners.

The switcheroo is on Friday, with Tri-City traveling to Salem, Wenatchee moving to Lewiston and Yakima taking on the Emeralds at Eugene.

Reese Rejects Job Offer

LOS ANGELES, Calif. (AP) - Manager Walter Alston had one less worry when he returned home with his Los Angeles Dodgers today after a swing through the East, where the Dodgers won eight games and lost nine.

Peeewe Reese, Dodger shortstop and captain, has scratched himself as an immediate candidate for the job Alston has "lost" off and on for the past month or so.

Asked if he was interested in a managerial job, Reese said: "Frankly I'm not sure and definitely not while I'm still able to play. All my life I have been playing about players who just couldn't wait to finish their playing careers so they could get a managerial job."

"I am not one of them. I have enjoyed playing, and I am still enjoying the game. When I come to the end of the line then there will be time to talk about my managerial possibilities. This isn't the time."

Reese, incidentally, was offered the Dodger post before Alston was promoted from the team's farm system to take command.

Discussing his views on managing Reese pointed to Alston and said: "After seeing what has happened to Walt it makes you wonder whether it's ever worth thinking about wanting to manage. When we were winning, he was everybody's hero. When we lose they start booing him with the very first step he takes out of the dugout."

"It isn't fair. He's no different manager when we are winning than he is when we are losing. I have been around this game long enough to know it's the players who make the manager, and the way they suffer when a team isn't going good is an out and out crime."

The Dodgers came home on a winning note. They defeated the Cubs 3-1 yesterday, their second straight over Chicago.

Two Golfers Lead Tourney

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI) - Paul Harney and Ernie Vossler led the field into the second round of the \$35,000 Miller Open golf tournament today with record tying 48s, but don't bet on them for the championship.

There were 13 players within three strokes of Harney and Vossler and 50 in all who equaled or bettered par in Thursday's 18-hole round. It was the most closely bunched field in the four-year history of the 72-hole medal play tournament.

Brian Charter, an unknown from Janesville, Wis., and old pro Sammy Snead were a stroke back with 49s. Bob came up with the day's low nine-hole score, five-under-par 36.

At 65 were Howie Johnson, John Pott, Jim Turnesa and Bill Johnston.

Defending champion Ken Venturi was bunched with seven others at 66. They were Chick Burke Jr., Tom Nieporte, Bob Goalby and Gil Cavanaugh.

Ty Cobb Reveals Baseball Career Marked By Bad Arm

NEW YORK (UPI) - Ty Cobb today said, "I played about half my career with a glass arm, and I guess that's one of the reasons my baseball heroes are the pitchers."

The immortal Tyros, 71, wore only a pair of dark-rimmed spectacles, blue-dotted red shorts and a pair of sandals as he sat in his hotel room and praised the pitchers, past and present.

The man from Cornelia, Ga., brought up the subject of mound-men by remarking, "It seems to me that the pitchers this season are doing about the best job since the lively ball was brought into the majors - judging by the number of close, low-hitting games."

Here to watch Saturday's old-

timers' game between the 1947 Yankees and the 1946 Red Sox, Cobb told of the off-season pitching stint that had threatened his career. "I don't believe it's ever been published," said the tall, surprisingly fit oldster.

"Although I nearly always played the outfield during my 23 years with Detroit and two with Philadelphia," Cobb said, "I got a kick out of going in at other positions in exhibition games during the off-season."

Shortly after the First World War, he took the mound for a pick-up team of major leaguers against the Bushwicks in Brooklyn in an exhibition game.

Until that particular contest, right-hander Cobb always had a fine throwing arm, he stressed.

And he was pitching well, when "suddenly I had to field a swinging bunt and had to make an off-balance throw to first."

"The instant that ball left my hand, my arm and shoulder felt on fire. I didn't know exactly what had happened, but I knew I was in a terrible jam if I had thrown my arm out. And I'd have to hit it."

"You see, I was a high-salaried star with the Tigers - and trying to get more money. And any hint of an injury would weaken my negotiating position. All this flashed through my mind."

"So, in spite of the pain, I threw one more ball to the catcher - making sure it was wide. Then I walked up to him and said I'd lost my stuff and they'd better put in another pitcher."

He never did find out what ligaments he had torn, he said, because he was afraid to go to a doctor - lest the secret leak out. A trusted friend massaged the arm and shoulder almost daily until spring training.

"Then I could throw just well enough - looping it - after I'd run in a ways from the outfield, to fool everyone. The arm improved gradually but it never was the same during the rest of my career. You might say I was playing with a glass arm."

Had he been a pitcher, instead of an outfielder, when he hurt the arm, he would have been finished, he said. And that experience taught him that pitchers have the most precarious jobs in baseball and are the real heroes of the sport.

Unit Hunting Deadline Near

Oregon hunters are advised that if they want to hunt for antlerless deer during the latter part of the general deer season they should submit their applications immediately for the unit in which they intend to hunt. Deadline for submitting applications is August 18, which is just a little more than one week away.

Hunters are also cautioned to follow the directions carefully when filling out their application blanks. The name and address of the applicant must be printed in the space provided, and signed with applicant's signature directly below. Include the hunting license number, and in case of elk, include the elk tag number. The kind of animal to be hunted—deer, elk, or antelope—must be on the card, in addition to the area applied for.

Do not fold the application cards. These cards cannot be processed if they have been folded or mutilated in any way.

Drawings for four early season big game hunts will be held at 10 a.m. Monday, August 11, at the game commission's Portland office, 1634 S. W. Alder. Drawings will be held to determine participants for the antelope hunts, the Wallowa, the Hart Mountain, and the Snake River controlled deer hunts. The public is invited to attend.

The antelope season is scheduled for August 23 through August 27 in all three antelope areas of southeastern Oregon. The Wallowa controlled deer season will be held August 30 through September 3; the Hart Mountain controlled hunt, September 27 and 28; and the Snake River pack area October 4 through 26.

Successful applicants in the drawings will be mailed their tags by August 15. In those areas where the quota was not filled by the filing deadline, no drawing will be held and all applicants will receive tags.
