Washington Moves Into BR Contention

Oregon Beaten
A powerful Washington team moved into a role as a top contender for the Regional title after resting out a bye in the first round and then dumping the highly-touted Oregon champion Atlas Sheet Metal squad 10-6, in their first appearance on the diamond.

Although they were outlasted 10-6 by their Oregon rivals the Washingtonians bunched their hits more effectively and swung into a three-run lead in the last half of the first inning and from there on were never headed.

Both Oregon and Washington counted in the second inning and Oregon brought the count to within one run of a tie in the fourth stanza, 4-3. This was as close as they were to come, however, as Washington counted one in the fifth canto and then pushed five more across in the home-half of the sixth. Oregon experienced a surge in the top of the seventh as they scored three times before some brilliant defensive play put an end to their chances.

The winning pitcher Les Kero, a smooth-working lefthander, allowed 10 hits, walked six and fanned two over the seven-inning distance.

Oregon's Gary Sanders, the loser, gave up eight safeties, walked six and struck out six for his evening's work.

Mike Crane, rightfield, Bill Felix, and catcher Paul Jackson each collected doubles for Oregon while Crane and Felix each added a single for good measure.

Heading the Washington hitters was the little leftfielder, Cloy Sykes, who pounded a double and single and was issued two free passes in four trips to the plate. Kim Morgan, first base, and Bob Woodard, second sacker, both added a pair of singles for their efforts with the bat. Kero and Sam Hicks, leftfield, collected the other two Washington hits.

The game was highlighted by three double-plays: Oregon, one, and Washington two.

Oregon came in the fifth stanza when Crane caught a high fly in right and relayed the ball to first baseman Dwight Daniels who flipped it to Bill Felix to catch their man off second.

Washington racked up their first DP in the fourth when leftfielder Sam Hicks picked off a fly then fired the ball to catcher Jack Hanson who relayed it back to third baseman Sonny Oren to catch the runner off the sack.

Their second came in the fifth canto when the play was originated by rightfielder George Levar and went from first to second.

Hope for the Montanans still gleamed in the bottom of the fifth despite the fact that the Wyoming club notched five more tallies to take an 11-10 lead. The future looked down right bright in the top of the sixth stanza when Montana tied the count 11-11.

The Montanans verified their reservations for the return trip to Kalispell in the last of the sixth inning when 10 Wyoming batters came to the plate and counted six runs off three errors, three stolen bases, a pair of walks, a single and screaming triple by first baseman Pat Braden.

Credited with the win for Wyoming was Larry Abeyta, who moved into the mound in the third inning to stop the Montana run-slide. Starter John Colligan had been in serious trouble and seemed unable to get out. Between the two pitchers the Montana nine collected 10 hits.

Three Montana hurlers allowed only seven Wyoming hits but eight errors behind them, plus 14 walks issued, proved their undoing.

The Wyoming batters were led by Abeyta and Charles Colgin, the catcher, who each collected a pair of singles to go with Braden's triple. Other Wyoming safeties were earned by Jim Jackson and Colligan.

The big stick for Montana was third baseman John Will who poked a triple. Sandy Farquhar, second base, added a double. Bobby Sible-rod, shortstop, and Frank Bain, each added a brace of singles.

The loss, Montana's second, puts them out of the tourney while Wyoming met British Columbia in this afternoon's opener.

OCEANSIDE, Calif. (UPI) — Heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson said he was so satisfied with his training program that "I could fight Roy Harris today."

It was the first time Patterson has had anything to say about his condition in training for the Harris title bout at Los Angeles Aug. 18.

After five rounds of sparring with Jose Torres and Obie (Dusty) Rhodes, Patterson said "for the first time since I came to California I'm satisfied with my condition."
