

Iowa Veterans Benefits Due

Application forms for the Iowa Korean veterans bonus are now available from the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs in Salem, George E. Day, claims representative for the state agency, reported recently.

Claims must be filed by December 31, 1950, with the Korean Service Compensation Board, State House, Des Moines, Iowa.

The Iowa bonus pays \$10 per month of domestic duty and \$12.50 per month of foreign duty, for service of 120 days or more between June 27, 1950, and July 27, 1953. Maximum payment is \$500. The applicant must have been an Iowa resident for six months just prior to his active duty.

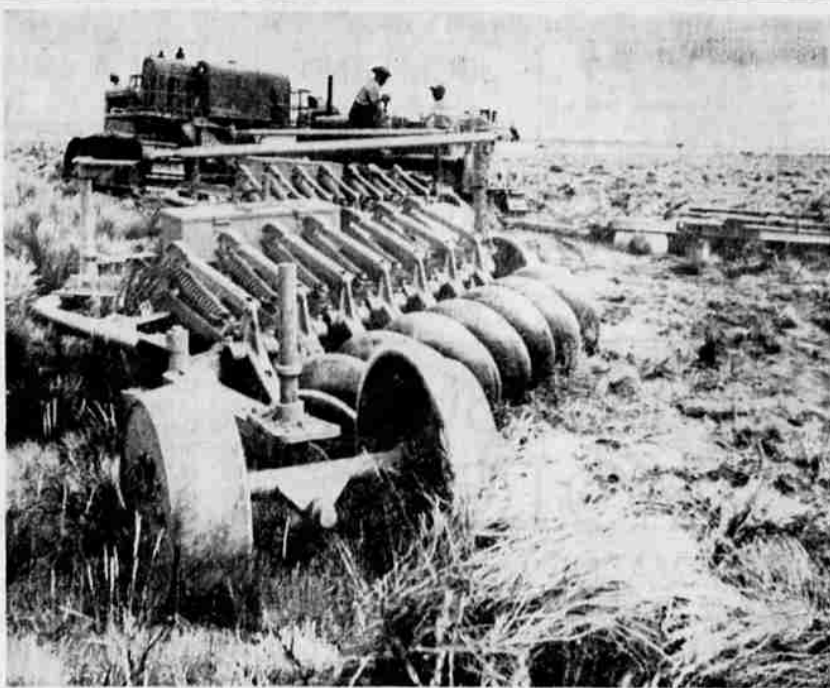
The widow, children or parents of a veteran who died in or after service of injuries or disease incurred on active duty during the war period may receive \$500.

Range Betterment Program Nears End In Fort Rock

FORT ROCK — The Bureau of Land Management's three-year program of range improvement of public domain lands in the Fort Rock grazing district is nearing completion. The program is financed largely by funds appropriated under the Federal Soil and Moisture Act.

Accomplishments here according to Pierce Morin, range management assistant and project foreman, include 10 miles of division fences between allotments. Sixteen water holes, for better range utilization, have been constructed for eight permittees.

Spraying to kill rabbit brush on 800 acres was a project this spring. Crews have plowed 1,120 acres for reseeding as well as seeding much of the amount. Currently working on the project are Floyd Morin of Roseburg and Vern Johnson, Klamath Falls.

Three cattle guards have been installed. The well being drilled on Green Mountain will serve two permittees. Two 3,000 gallon water storage tanks have also been installed.

With completion of an access road to Hayes Butte the crew will move to Silver Lake where they

will plow and reseed 700 acres of brush land. Carl McCrillis, in charge of range management, is supervisor of the work. R. C. (Bud) Burgess, district manager, Lakeview, was in Fort Rock Friday checking on the progress of the work.

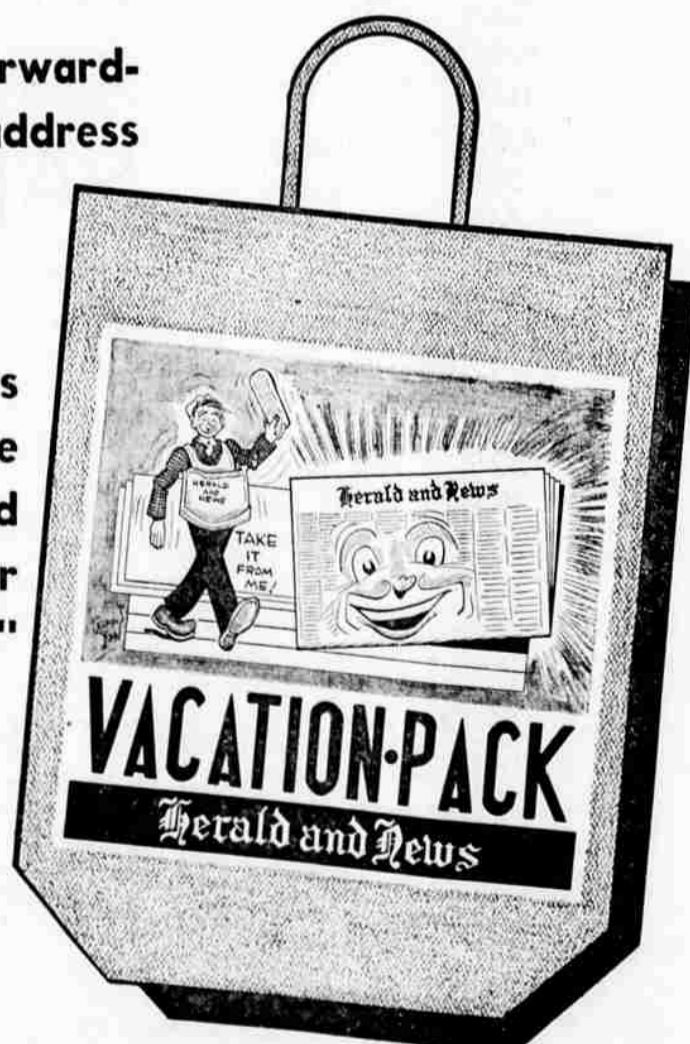

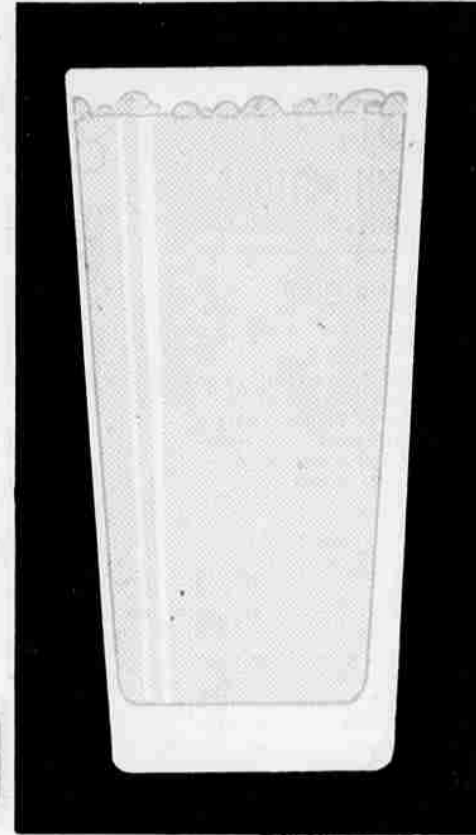

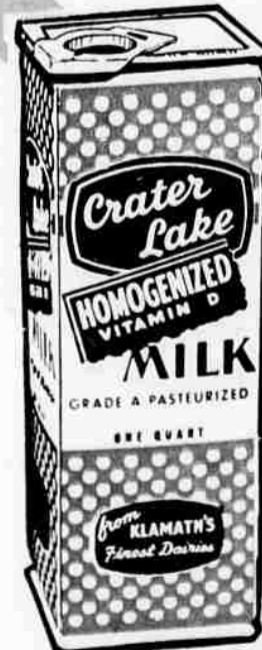
