Braves Bounce Phillies Twice

It will be a long time before the season's largest crowd (32,117) at Philadelphia's Connie Mack Stadium will forget the Sunday fireworks display staged by the Milwaukee Braves.

The Braves made 33 hits in their 2-7 and 14-3 double-header sweep over the Phillies.

Only two of them were home runs, both by catcher Del Crandall. But there were five triples and ten doubles. Hank Aaron, who had five hits and scored five runs, had a pair of triples and a double. Eddie Mathews, with seven

hits and six runs, had a double and triple. Frank Torre, who drove in five runs, had a double and triple.

The Chicago Cubs split a double-header with the St. Louis Cardinals in a comedy of errors. The Cubs won the opener 9-4 as the Cardinals committed four errors.

St. Louis scored five unearned runs on as many Chicago errors to win the second game 6-2.

In Los Angeles, seven home runs were hit at the Coliseum, five over the chummy left field screen. San Francisco batters rapped five of them, as the Giants outslug the Dodgers 12-8.

Pittsburgh's fast-moving Pirates completed a four-game sweep of Cincinnati, winning both ends of a double-header 3-2 and 4-3. The Pirates took the opener on Dick Stuart's 10th-inning sacrifice fly, and the second game on an eighth-inning force play.

In the American League, Boston came back to defeat New York 9-3 after the Yankees had won the opener 7-5. Kansas City took a 4-2, 10-inning decision from Cleveland after the Indians had walked off with an 11-2 triumph in the first game. Baltimore beat

NEW YORK (UPI)—Two "we wuz-robbed" disputes will be settled by return bouts this week. Both will be televised nationally.

Welterweight contenders Gaspar Ortega and Mickey Crawford tangled again at Madison Square Garden, Wednesday night, and heavyweight aspirants Nino Valdez and Mike Dejohn again match giant swings at Rochester, N.Y., Friday night.

Mexican Ortega, top-ranked welterweight contender, won a split 10-round decision over blondie Crawford of Saginaw, Mich., at the Garden on July 11. Crawford and his handlers disputed the verdict, but the defeat dropped Mickey from fifth to ninth among 147-pound contenders.

That July bout was so close that the betting on Wednesday's return is at "even money." It will be televised nationally by ABC at 10 p.m. e.d.t.

Neither fought since their July tilt. Ortega of Tijuana, Mex., won 47 of his 59 bouts, 20 by knockouts. Commercial artist Crawford registered only two kayoes while winning 22 of his 25 starts. He is fast and clever.

Friday's 10-rounder at the Rochester Auditorium will give Rocky Dejohn of Syracuse, N.Y., a chance to prove he was bilked out of victory in his own home city on April 23, when he dropped a split verdict to Valdes of Havana.
