

Phoenix Extends PC Lead Over Mounties

Lefty Pete Burnside blanked Vancouver on three hits as the Phoenix Giants moved three full games ahead of the second-place Mounties in the Pacific Coast League race Sunday with a 1-0 victory.

San Diego, which took two from Seattle 4-3 and 4-2, is breathing down the Mounties' necks now, too. The double win brought the Pads to third place to within a game of Vancouver.

In other games, Portland twinned Salt Lake 9-3 and 7-3 and Spokane beat Sacramento 3-1.

The five-game series at Vancouver which opened Sunday could tell the tale in this year's pennant chase. Thus, Sunday's loss was a bitter pill for the Canucks to swallow.

It was Burnside's second straight shutout victory over Vancouver. Mountie pitcher George Bamberger also pitched brilliantly but to no avail. The Vancouver club couldn't get a man past second base.

Bamberger, displaying his usual brilliant control, extended his walkless innings to 6 2/3—just two short of the PCL record. Burnside, incidentally, also gave up no walks.

Phoenix scored its winning run in the sixth inning when, with one out, Dusty Rhodes singled, Willie McCovey then lined a double deep to the rightfield corner, allowing Rhodes to score all the way from first.

At San Diego, Larry Raines hoisted a fly in the tenth inning to score Fred Hatfield for 4-3 win over Seattle in the second game. In the opener Hatfield and Dave Pope homered in the 4-2 Padre win. Al Jones hit a two-run homer for San Diego in the second inning of the nightcap.

Spokane used three pitchers in its 3-1 victory over Sacramento in a series opener there. Larry Sherry got credit for his sixth victory but he needed help from Ed Palquist and Dick Scott in the eighth inning.

Marshall Bridges went all the way for Sacramento. His down-fall, it turned out, came in the first and eighth innings. Maurice Willis walked, stole second and scored as Jim Baxes tripled to split in the first. In the eighth, Jim Williams singled, stole second after being caught off first base and scored on Baxes' double against the left field fence.

Portland batters hit eight home runs—five in the first game and three in the second—to beat Salt Lake twice.

In the second game, a grand slammer by Nini Tornay put Portland ahead in the first inning. He hit another round-tripper in the sixth.

George Freese, Ed Winceniak, Len Neal, Luis Marquez and Frank Kellert really made the homebats happy by each pounding out four-basers in the opening game.

Salt Lake also scored its two runs in the opener on a home run—one by R. C. Stevens in the sixth inning.

Two games are scheduled for Monday. The Phoenix-Vancouver battle continues at Vancouver and Spokane and Sacramento also will play.

Giants Holding Win Skein

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Wow, the Giants are on a two-game winning streak!
And they were given a rousing welcome by 2,500 people at the airport Sunday night when they checked in from Los Angeles at the end of a disastrous road trip in which they won seven games and lost 14 to drop 6 1/2 games behind Milwaukee.

Manager Bill Rigney's battered troops get a rest today then open a long home stand Tuesday night with the St. Louis Cardinals in town first for a night game. Southpaw Mike McCormick, (8-4) is scheduled to start for the Giants.

After losing 11 out of 12 games, San Francisco regained its winning ways in the Los Angeles Coliseum by defeating the Dodgers 6-3 Saturday night and out-slugging the Dodgers, 12-8, Sunday.

Old Hank Sauer drove in four runs Saturday with a pair of homers; then Jim Davenport, the rookie third baseman, clubbed two more circuit clouts Sunday to pace San Francisco to its second straight win.

Davenport had a hot day at the plate, also getting a double and two singles while collecting five hits in six trips. The victory went to Gordon Jones, the third of four Giant hurlers to toil, while veteran Clem Labine was the loser in relief.

Leon Wagner put the Giants ahead, 9-7, in the seventh inning with a two-run pinch single after Davenport had tied the game in the previous frame with his second blast of the day.

A total of seven home runs were recorded, five by the Giants who now lead Los Angeles in the season's series. Danny O'Connell, pinch-hitter Bob Speake and Daryl Spencer also hit four-baggers for the Giants.

Gil Hodges of Los Angeles, battling to get off a seasonlong slump, whacked a three-run homer over the left field screen in the third inning to give the last-place Dodgers a 6-4 lead.

The big blow of the game was provided by Duke Snider who smashed a 410-foot homer into the center field seats in the third with nobody around.

Jones, recently brought up from the Giants' Phoenix farm club, got the win after pitching only one inning the sixth.

NW Youths, Romack Top Golf Choices

NEWTON, Mass. (UPI)—A stunning silver bludge from California and two college girls from Washington appeared today to hold the best chances in the forthcoming U.S. Women's Amateur on the basis of their Curtis Cup performances.

They are Barbara Romack, Anne Quast and JoAnne Gunderson, who won their singles matches Saturday despite the British Isles gaining a tie with the United States in the 10th biennial Curtis Cup at Brae Burn Country Club.

Miss Gunderson, a strawberry blonde coed at Arizona State, is defending women's amateur champ, winning the title last year at the age of 18. Miss Romack, who wears her striking platinum hair in a fluffy close cut, won the crown in 1954. Miss Quast, with the friendly dimples, was a semifinalist in the amateur two years ago.

The U.S. women needed victories in four of the six singles after dropping two of three foursomes matches Saturday. But it was too much to expect from the inexperienced U.S. team, with only Miss Romack and Miss Polly Riley, being Curtis veterans, competing against the tourney-wise British and Scottish women.

Possession of the huge silver bowl wasn't decided until the final hole of the sixth match, between Miss Riley and two-time British champion Mrs. Frances Smith.

They were all even midway through the 18-hole afternoon round. But Mrs. Smith, the former Bunty Stephens, 1-up as they teed off on the 360-yard 18th, which she parred for two.

Miss Riley's second shot into a sand trap and drew a bogey. That enabled the British Isles to tie it, 4-4, and retain possession of the cup for at least another two years. It was the second tie in the history of the cup. The U.S. has won it six times to the Britains' two.

PORTLAND (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals and the Portland Beavers Monday night will meet in an exhibition baseball game that is expected to draw 28,000 fans here.

In their other exhibition game here this season, the Beavers drew 28,107 fans against the San Francisco Giants. That was an all-time high for a Northwest baseball crowd.

Because a full house is expected in Multnomah Stadium, the game will be televised in the Portland area.

The Beavers said Monday that their starting pitcher probably will be Bill Brenner—the club's assistant general manager.
