

Youth Held In Rape Case

DORRIS — An 18-year-old Klamath Falls youth whose driver's license gave his name as Richard Howard Leone, is in Siskiyou County Jail at Yreka in lieu of \$1,500 bail after his hearing before Judge Les Chase in Dorris on Monday.

The youth is charged with statutory rape involving a 15-year-old Dorris girl whose father filed the complaint. He is specifically charged with forcing the girl into his car after the Saturday night dance at the Red Barn, driving some distance from the hall and attacking her. The girl told officers she threatened to "get her" if he didn't get her, that his pals would. He added that he would return on Sunday afternoon to find out.

When he put in an appearance at her home on Sunday, he was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Bill Miller of Tulelake and Clarence Houston and C. M. Shoemaker of the Dorris police force. The men were waiting to see if he would show up.

Tavern Plans To Reopen

Cal-Ore Tavern, once colorful night spot just across the California state line, about 18 miles south of Klamath Falls and three miles north of Dorris on Highway 97, is expected to reopen on August 29 as a sporting goods specialty shop.

The property was purchased last winter from French E. Johnson of Tulelake by Lloyd and Rosalie Rivette, formerly of Portland and more recently of Eureka. They will operate the business under the firm name of The Cal-Ore Sports Center.

Rivette said this week that they are starting to make eight and 10-foot prams and will have boats, motors and trailers for sale or rent. A full line of sporting goods, guns and ammunition will be put in, he said. In addition, the shop will carry marine paint, fiberglass cloth and resins. Boat repairing will be a feature of the new business and plans call for inclusion of ski and snow equipment in the near future.

Mrs. Rivette will operate the restaurant which will feature "flame-burgers" and choice steaks, she announces.

The public is invited to come in and inspect the boat factory at any time, Rivette said.

Soviet Premier Launches Diplomatic Offensive

LONDON (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev has launched a new-type diplomatic offensive to win back the initiative lost by his backing-out of the summit, diplomatic sources said today.

On the eve of the United Nations General Assembly emergency session on the Middle East, he has embarked on an unprecedented all-out "vote-for-Khrushchev" campaign among small Western U.N. nations.

The essence of the new propaganda offensive is "lobbying by diplomatic note," its purpose to disrupt and undermine Western alliances, in the view of Soviet affairs experts today.

Khrushchev, personally credited with the new strategy, was held desperately anxious to obtain the widest possible support in the United Nations against the U.S. and British Middle Eastern policies.

Some experts believed the Soviet leader was fighting a battle for survival.

The opening shot of the Soviet diplomatic offensive came last weekend with the dispatch of a new-type note to the Greek gov-

ernment urging it bluntly to support Soviet policy in the Middle East against Anglo-American "aggression."

Almost immediately afterwards, Moscow dispatched a similar letter to Stockholm asking the neutral Swedes for backing.

More notes of a similar nature were believed in preparation in the Kremlin's diplomatic workshop.

In the past, Moscow has sent notes of intimidation to smaller nations on the eve of major military developments in the West.

It had been Khrushchev's strategy to threaten smaller NATO nations on the eve of a NATO council meeting, or to warn members of the Baghdad and SEATO alliances just before they met in special conference on military and political decisions.

The new Khrushchev line seeks instead the support of Western-minded U.N. members with a mild-manner "please - vote - for - me - because - the - Anglo - Americans - are - bad - boys" appeal, the sources said.

The full implications of the new strategy have not yet sufficiently emerged.

But both Soviet affairs experts and British diplomatic officials believed that Khrushchev was building up for a major propaganda show "with a difference."

The Soviet leader was believed himself.

badly in need of a diversion of Soviet and world public attention from the loss of prestige he suffered at the hands of Red Chinese leader Mao Tse-Tung at their recent meeting in Peking.

The proposal for a U.N. special assembly on the Middle East was held a poor second choice for which the Soviet leader was not desperately anxious to rally the widest possible support to justify himself.
