

Tigers Steal 10-9 Victory Joey Jay Hurls Win For Braves

BoSox Blasted By Yanks

Because the Detroit Tigers miss the improbable for the impossible, Cleveland's Vic Power stands alone today as the only man in American League history to steal home twice in one game. No one had done it in the majors in 47 years and only two National Leaguers before that. Power hadn't stolen even one base through 106 games this season, and had managed just seven steals in 636 games in the majors. Yet he slipped in for Cleveland's last two runs yesterday, scooting home with the winner in the 10th inning as the Indians beat the Tigers 10-9.

Joe Tinker of the Chicago Cubs set the record by stealing home twice June 28, 1910. The only other man to do it was Larry Doyle of the old New York Giants, Sept. 18, 1911.

Tom Morgan was pitching when Power's first steal capped a five-run eighth that overcame a 7-4 lead. Frank Lary was caught by the second steal.

The Tigers were left in a third-place tie with the Boston Red Sox, who were belted 8-2 by the league-leading New York Yankees. The Chicago White Sox, 14 1/2 games behind, strengthened their hold on second by beating Kansas City 5-2 in the only other AL game. In the National League, a joint one-hitter by Joey Jay and Warren Spahn gave the Milwaukee Braves a 3-0 victory at Cincinnati. San Francisco defeated St. Louis 4-3 and Los Angeles rapped the Chicago Cubs 7-3.

Clev 10, Tigers 9

The Indians blew a 3-0 first-inning lead, falling behind when Harvey Kuenn's three-run seventh homer capped a four-run Tiger sixth. Rocky Colavito's 26th homer, his second of the game, got the Indians rolling in the eighth and the long-injured Vic Wertz added a two-run, pinch-hit homer, his first of the year, for a 7-7 tie. Power singled home the tie-breaking run and moved around on an error and wild pitch for his dash home.

The Tigers scored two in the ninth for another tie before winner Gary Bell (7-6) came on for two perfect innings of relief. Singles by Power and Russ Nixon and a walk loaded the bases and set up Powers' payoff steal. (10 innings)

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI)—Tommy Jacobs, a youngster pinned with the "can't miss" tag in professional golf, and Lionel Hebert, 1957 PGA champion, took one stroke leads into the second round of the St. Paul Open today with a host of stars hot on their heels. Jacobs, 23, and Hebert, 30, fashioned eight-under-par 64s Thursday as more than half the starting field in the \$25,000 tournament smashed par at Keller golf course. Cary Middlecoff was tied at 65 with Sam Snead, Frank Stranahan and Doug Ford. Ken Venturi, the defending champion, Mike Souchak, Jay Hebert and Dow Finsterwald were four of 30 players grouped at 66. Arnold Palmer, the year's leading money winner, was one of several bunched at 67.

Have a sneaking suspicion, however, that there are others who may share the feeling. Of course, the early morning air packs a heady odor of pigskin even now . . . and that's good too. A scant three weeks will pass before Klamath Union and OTI plunge head-long into interesting 1958 grid schedules . . . and by that time everyone will be all ready for them.

What with the way things are changing in our time . . . how about changing the names of the seasons from winter, summer, spring and fall to Basketball, Baseball, Football and Track. So someone says, "Okay—what do we do with boxing?" . . . for my part that is one season that can be closed . . . the way it is as we know it today, anyhow. But then, let's not go into that.

A pause calls for refreshment . . . and what is more refreshing than the flowery praises (and justly deserved, too) that have been heaped on Klamath Falls, the tremendous summer athletic program and the many, many people who made possible the success of the season just past.

The plaudits came from many sides . . . neighboring states, foreign countries, people who have devoted their adult lives to working with youngsters and from many, who in the past, paid little or no attention to what kids did in the summertime . . . as long as they weren't under foot.

A few of the "outsiders" that were lavish in their praise of what has been accomplished in Klamath Falls over the past three years were Les Timothé, the Montana state Babe Ruth director, Joe Tucker from Idaho, R. H. Dutcher, a kindly gentleman who directs Wyoming's Babe Ruthers, George Wyse, who brought the Regional Championship Washington club to town, Floyd Markham, the Oregon Babe Ruth director and genial Bill Wells who represented the Pacific Northwest Babe Ruth Regional heads.

Among the comments heard were: "Klamath Falls can have the State Babe Ruth Tournament any time they want it" (Portland please note) and "What a reception—they treated us like kings." The Klamath theaters, the swimming pool, the people who housed players and even the police department, who adopted a lenient attitude toward overtime parking for our Babe Ruth visitors, all received a big vote of thanks.

What prompts all the praise—the combination of cooperation, coordination and ability displayed by everyone connected with the summer baseball program, from the Little League and Babe Ruth players right on to the mayor of the town. This combination pushed Klamath Falls to the front in the first season they entered Babe Ruth competition, a short three years ago.

This season Klamath Falls became an accredited member of the National Association of Little Leagues—next year a Klamath Falls Little League club will be eligible for state and national competition. And from the response registered at the Little League All-Star game Wednesday night in the League Finale, I miss my guess if the local 10-12-year-olds don't move right into the top of the state heap next summer.

If they don't, it won't be because everyone didn't work at it. The afternoon mail just following the writing of the above brought another word of praise, which we reprint in its entirety: "Dear Sir, Would there be any chance of your sending us any of your newspapers printed during the Babe Ruth games August 8 through 10 played in your city. Am wondering if you could send all papers with any writeups concerning Cheyenne, Wyoming?"

Our son, Pat Braden, was one of the lucky boys who visited your city last week with the Cheyenne team. He bought all of your papers and was bringing them home as he has a sports scrapbook and the papers were either stolen or lost on the train coming home. Everyone said your paper had such thorough write-ups and the tournament had wonderful coverage by your newspaper. As I don't know the price of your paper and postage would you send them COD, if you have any available.

Would also like to take this opportunity to thank all the wonderful people of Klamath Falls for being so hospitable to all the Cheyenne team. Especially the people who kept our boys in their homes and treated them so royally. We really do appreciate it.

Giants, Dodgers Both Win

A very conservative guy, this Fred Haney who manages the world champion Milwaukee Braves.

He went into the last of the ninth leading 3-0 at Cincinnati last night with young Joey Jay pitching a one-hitter. But when Joey gave up his eighth walk to his leadoff man, Haney, up to the tobacco pocket in pitching, pulled no less than 15-game winner Warren Spahn out of the bullpen for a mopup job against the last-place Reds.

Spahn did just that, completing the one-hit shutout and padding the Braves' National League lead to six games over Pittsburgh's idle second-place Pirates.

The third-place San Francisco Giants defeated St. Louis 4-3, and Los Angeles rapped the Chicago Cubs 7-3 in the only other NL games scheduled.

In the American League, the New York Yankees belted Boston 8-2, the Chicago White Sox defeated Kansas City 5-2 and Cleveland, with Vic Power becoming the first major leaguer in 47 years to steal home twice in one game, slipped past Detroit 10-9 in 10 innings.

Jay walked the Cincinnati lead-off man in six innings. But the Braves backed him up with two double plays. The only hit he allowed was a leadoff single by Jerry Lynch in the sixth inning. Billy Bruton homered for the Braves off Don Newcombe in the first and Wes Covington scored on a triple and error for a 2-0 edge in the second.

Tebbetts Sees Reds Beaten With One Hit

CINCINNATI (AP)—A solemn-faced man and his wife sat in a box at Crosley Field last night and watched the Cincinnati Reds leg hit a season low in batting futility.

It was Birdie Tebbetts who earlier in the day had quit as manager of the Reds saying "I believe that it is better for Cincinnati baseball that someone succeed me."

Last night he watched the Reds lose chance after chance to get something going for the lack of a few base hits. It was the same problem he had been fighting all season. Only it was worse for Jimmy Dykes, who had taken over as acting manager.

The Reds got only one hit off Joey Jay in eight innings and none off Warren Spahn in one in a 3-0 victory by the Milwaukee Braves.

Tebbetts and his wife sat with Redleg general manager Gabe Paul at last night's game. Earlier, Paul had said, "I certainly would recommend him to another organization. I have never worked with a manager who was more cooperative."

Down in the Redleg clubhouse, the retiring manager also got a big boost from several of his players. "It's a lousy shame," said pitcher Joe Nuxhall. "He's a great guy."

Outfielder Gus Bell said, "players made the mistakes — who doesn't—but they (the fans) took it out on Birdie." A chorus of boos has greeted Tebbetts of late as the Reds legged sagged and finally dropped into last place.

Catcher Smoky Burgess said Tebbetts is "a great manager, and I mean it." Tebbetts reportedly was being paid \$35,000 to \$40,000 a year. He will be paid off for the rest of this season but the 1959 portion of his contract will be canceled. He says this will be his first summer vacation since he entered baseball. He and his family plan to go to their home at Nashua, N. H.

"I want to stay in baseball as a manager," Tebbetts said.

Faulk Leads Women Golfers

KANSAS CITY (UPI)—Mary Lena Faulk, fresh from a triumph at Rockford, Ill., returned to the scene of her first professional victory today to try to make it two in a row at the \$5,000 Heart of America women's invitational golf tournament.

Miss Faulk, some 19 other sister pros and about 50 amateurs tee off today over the rugged, 6,013-yard Blue Hills Country Club course in 90-degree temperatures. The 54-hole tournament will see the champion crowned Sunday.

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Heart Ailment Claims Sanders

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Death apparently from a heart attack Thursday ended the career of one of America's great football coaches, Henry (Red) Sanders of UCLA. He was 53.

Sanders, who came here from Vanderbilt in 1949 and developed UCLA Bruin teams of powerful pre-eminence, died in a second-floor room of a small hotel near the downtown area.

A blonde woman, about 30, who identified herself as Ernestine Drake, was sitting in a chair a few feet from Sanders' body when police arrived. She said she was with him when he died. He was wearing pants, shoes and socks but no shirt.

"He complained of the heat," Miss Drake said. "He ordered two soft drinks brought to the room."

She told a reporter she is a clothes model, born in Vienna. "I didn't know he was a famous football coach," she said. Sanders had no record of a heart ailment, but homicide detective R. T. Reid said a heart attack apparently caused death. An autopsy will be performed.

Sanders was a progressive, imaginative, inventive coach who had a 27-year coaching record of 102 wins, 41 defeats and 3 ties. Fellow coaches across the nation voted him coach of the year in 1954. That was the year the Bruins won nine games and became UCLA's first undefeated and untied team.

He gave the Bruins nine top-flight teams and took them to the Pasadena Rose Bowl after the 1953 and 1955 seasons, but lost both games to Michigan State. UCLA Chancellor Raymond B. Allen said: "Red was a master of his difficult craft, but more than that, he was a master of human relations. He had the affection and respect of his players, fellow coaches and friends. He will long be revered at UCLA."

UCLA tore up a long-term contract with Red last year and signed him to a 10-year agreement at \$20,000 a year.

Kubs Meet Mt. Shasta Here Sunday

The Klamath Falls Kubs close out their regularly scheduled Northern California League baseball season at Gem Stadium Sunday afternoon in a game against Mount Shasta.

Game time is 2 o'clock. Friday night the Kubs are in Drain to meet the Drain Black Sox, winners of the state NBC championship and one of the finest semi-pro clubs to play in Oregon in several years. Drain is bolstered by several University of Oregon and Washington State College standouts.

Here at home Sunday, manager Irv Whit's Northern California League club will play host to the Seals of Mount Shasta. This is the final regularly scheduled league game for both clubs, but the Kubs and Seals both have a rain-out to make up, at a time and site to be picked later.

Klamath will be fighting to keep at least a share of the league lead, and possibly move into sole possession of the top spot. Going into Sunday's game, the Kubs have won nine and lost four.

The Weed Sons, tied with Klamath for the lead, also play Sunday. The Sons try to protect their co-lead in a game billed for Fort Jones against the Scott Valley Stars. The other Northern California League fray Sunday afternoon sends Yreka to Dunsmuir.

The MB nine now meets National Guard next week in the final game. Should Market Basket win this meeting, a deciding game would be needed to crown a play-off winner.

Thursday night, Market Basket scored four times in the sixth and seventh innings to break open a tight pitchers battle between Dick Hafar of Market Basket and Larry Young of Mouldingcraft.

After three innings of play, Market Basket led 2-1 on the strength of a third inning home run by Max Revis. Market Basket chased Young in the fifth with a rash of hits, but their rally was stopped by the relief pitching of Gus Gestvang.

Revis had three hits in four at-bats for Market Basket. Dean Michaels had a home run for Mouldingcraft. The other hit given up by Hafar was a single in the second inning to Norm Glyder.
