

Mounties, Beavers Notch PCL Triumphs

With George Bamberger, their control artist, paving the way, the Vancouver Mounties regained a full game Thursday night in their bid to overtake the Pacific Coast League's leading team, the Phoenix Giants.

The Mounties whacked the Giants 3-1 and climbed to within three games of the leaders. Vancouver is in third place, one percentage point behind the San Diego Padres, who, along with Seattle, were not scheduled last night.

In other league action, the Sacramento Solons slapped down the Spokane Indians 3-2 and Portland's

Beavers climbed into a fourth-place tie with Salt Lake City by trouncing the Bees 6-4.

Bamberger set a new record for consecutive innings without issuing a walk as he gained credit for the Vancouver victory over Phoenix. He went 6 2/3 innings without giving up a base on balls before Phoenix's Bill Wilson drew a free pass in the seventh frame of last night's game. Julio Bonetti of Los Angeles set the old record of 6 1/3 in 1939.

Owen Friend's 10th homer of the year with Rube Bresser on base gave the Mounties all the runs they needed in the second inning although they added an insurance tally in the sixth. Phoenix's lone run came in the ninth on Bobby Prescott's double, a groundout and Tom Haller's single.

The Indians got both of their runs in the fourth. Jim Baxes doubled after two men were out and he was chased in on Bob Jenkins' ninth home run of the season. The Solons got singletons in the third and seventh and won in the eighth with one run on a single, a fielder's choice, a stolen base and Jim Greengrass' single.

Mike Kume, who came in for starter Marshall Bridges in the eighth, picked up the victory, his fifth in nine decisions. Larry Sherry, who worked the distance for Spokane, lost it.

The Beavers got five runs in the first inning of their game with Salt Lake City and then coasted in to the victory, credited to Al Lary, who struck out seven and gave up only eight hits in going the route.

The five runs came on three singles, a walk, a sacrifice fly and Nini Torney's solo homer. Dave Melton's solo homer in the fifth gave the Bees their final run. Sam Miley doubled in Salt Lake City's first two runs in the first inning.

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Lindy McDaniel, who teamed with his brother, Von, last year as the "modern day Deans" of the St. Louis Cardinals, today was on his way to Omaha of the American Association. Von was sent to Winston-Salem, N.C., earlier this year.

Lindy was optioned by the Cardinals Thursday. He had a 5-7 record, further blighted by an earned run average close to 6. Between them last year the brothers won 22 games while losing 14.

The disappointing twosome, on whom the Cardinals had pinned their pennant hopes this year, may be back before the end of the season.

"They ought to get the polish they need in the minors," a Cardinal spokesman said. "We know Lindy will be back in September and there is a strong possibility Von will be with him."

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Calif. Senior Sweeps Lead In Golf Play

SPOKANE (AP)—Mike Demassey, a comparative youngster from Stockton, Calif., who just made the 50-year age limit, put on a short game exhibition for the old timers and carried a two stroke lead into Friday's second round of the \$15,000 National Senior Open Golf championship.

With accurate iron work and ear perfect putting, Demassey put together nines of 32-32 Thursday for a record-tying 6 under par 64 on the Esmeralda Course. Next best was the 34-32-66 effort of Gene Sarazen, 65-year-old golfing dean from Germantown, N.Y.

Willie Goggin, San Jose, Calif., had a 67, seven players were bunched at 69 and only two others managed to equal par 70.

Demassey had the answer for the slightly rolling 6,077-yard course. He picked up six birdies and no bogies as he landed on every green.

Sarazen, who has won nearly every major golfing title in the world during his long career, also treated the gallery to a bit of the spectacular.

On the 16th, his tee shot landed in the rough at the gravelly base of an uprooted tree. His second was short and to the left of the green. Sarazen pitched a wedge shot 20 yards to a grassy bank off the green. The ball bounced off the bank, took three hops and was in the cup for a birdie three.

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Collegians Underdog In Grid Fray Tonight

CHICAGO (AP)—The All-Stars start Operation Ozone tonight. They are expected to make a daring effort to beat the Detroit Lions, champions of the National Football League.

The 25th All-Star promises to draw 70,000 spectators to Soldier Field. It will be televised and broadcast nationally by ABC starting at 8:30 p. m. EST.

The Lions rule a solid 13½ point favorite to gain a 16th decision for the pros in the rivalry. The All-Stars have won seven times, the last being 30-27 over the Cleveland Browns in 1955, and have held the pro champs to two standstills.

In two other appearances in the classic the Lions have treated the All-Stars as morsels. They beat them 24-10 in 1953 and 31-6 in 1954.

With Tobin Rote and Bobby Layne giving a powerful one-two punch at quarterback, the Lions again are preparing for a feast.

Probably their two busiest men will be Darrin McCord and Gene Cronin, defensive ends. They are assigned to barge into the All-Stars backfield in an attempt to smear passing plans.

But don't get the idea the collegiate sensations of 1957—many of whom already are under contract to NHL clubs—are lambs being led to slaughter. They have the passers, speedy receivers and break-away runners to make the Lions pant.

And they have Otto Graham as head coach with a staff of former pros who know what to expect.

Perhaps their offense will be keyed by a series of flat passes from King Hill of Rice or Jim Ninowski of Michigan State to such quick-footed halfbacks as
