The 1/20th-size replica was built at the Naval Air Station, San Diego, out of scrap materials. It is designed so that all the equipment can be operated by one sailor; he can fire the guns, revolve the radar antennae, make smoke pour from the stack, and adjust the water splashing on both sides of the bow.

The Recruit, 48 feet long with a beam of 10 feet, six inches, is 13 feet, eight inches high and weighs 15,000 pounds. It is normally transported on a 40-foot low-boy, but it also has a self-propelled unit, powered by a truck engine. When the self-propelled unit is used, which occurs only for parades and over short distances, it is driven as if it were a large truck.

During the past two years, the USS Recruit has been displayed by Navy recruiters at parades, fairs and other civic events, mostly in Arizona and Southern California. It is estimated that over three million people have seen it.

Hand Milking Saves Man's Life

BELLEFONTAINE, Ohio (AP)—Donald Draught, 73, has electric milking machines on his nearby farm. But he milked a cow by the old-fashioned hand method yesterday and it probably saved his life.

One of the machines short-circuited and killed a cow. The cow fell over dead on the machine and set off a chain reaction through metal stanchions.

Draught was thrown away from the cow he was milking and was able to turn off the current before a fire started.

But the short circuit had already done its damage. Seven cows lay dead in the barn. Draught said their value was \$1,500.

FOREST TREE FARM

McCLOUD—Karl Landquist, Mount Shasta forest tree farm silviculturist, located east of McCloud, announced that the tree growing area of the nursery will be increased by 10 acres soon. The present acreage under irrigation is 32. Tree plants will be increased by about 30 per cent. Over five million trees are grown annually there. Timber on the expansion site will be cruised and sold in the near future. Landquist was recently granted a patent on a seed cone dry kiln he designed and has used at the nursery for several years.



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
