America has been the home since 1892 of Mrs. Frances Lavenik who will be 100 years old on September 2 of this year. She was born in Posen, Poland, in 1858, the town in which she was educated and later married to the late Frank Lavenik.

In honor of the century mark, members of her family and a host of friends called at 908 North Ninth Street recently to honor Mrs. Lavenik and to offer congratulations on her long life. The occasion was moved up a few days to permit members of her family, including a granddaughter, Sister M. Felician, head of the music department of St. Joseph's Academy, Pendleton, to be present and to return to her duties when school opens.

Mrs. Lavenik is the mother of six children. Michael Lavenik, this city, is the only one living.

Mr. and Mrs. Lavenik and their three children, born in Poland, Mary, Michael and Martin, settled in Iron River, Michigan, upon their return arrival from Europe, living there until 1906. Mary remained in Iron River when her parents and two brothers moved west to locate in Klamath Falls. In 1914 the family moved to Oakland, California where they lived until 1922, then returned here where they have lived since.

Mrs. Lavenik heads five generations, including her son, Michael, 19 grandchildren, 47 great-grandchildren, one great-great-grandchild. Four generations now live in Klamath Falls. Grandchildren living here include A. C. Lavenik, Mrs. Martin Conlin, Mrs. Clifton Molatore, Mrs. Harry Baldwin, Mrs. William Federhart, and Edward Javoroski.

One hundred years has not diminished Grandma Lavenik's skill in homemaking. She still bakes light and crusty loaves of bread on festive occasions. Her memory of past events is phenomenal and members of her large family rely on her for accurate dates of happenings.

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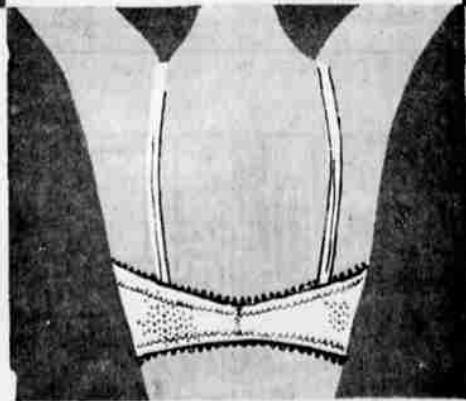
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
