Aaron Leads Braves; Thomas Blasts 3 HRs

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Hank Aaron singled home the deciding run in the eighth Saturday as the Milwaukee Braves eked out a 2-1 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies for their fifth straight decision.

Warren Spahn, the Braves' 37-year-old left-hander, registered his 15th victory of the campaign and 240th of his career after a shaky start. He shut out the Phils after they scored a run in the first.

A crowd of 31,869 watched Spahn and southpaw Curt Simmons duel at County Stadium. Simmons gave up only three hits through the first seven innings, only to weaken in the eighth and surrender three

COOS BAY—Klamath Falls lost one of the toughest games ever to go into the Oregon State Softball Association record books here Saturday afternoon when a Salem nipped the Market Basket team from Southern Oregon 1-0 in the bottom of the 11th inning of a scheduled seven-inning fray.

The game, one in the annual state men's softball tournament, was finally broken up by a home run off the bat of Salem infielder Don Bassett. The blow, which cleared the left-center field wall about 255-feet from home plate, ended a perfectly mated contest.

Klamath Falls pitcher Woody Wood hurled spotless ball and received outstanding support from his fielders, but he grooved a fast ball to Bassett who cut short the pitchers' battle between himself and Salem hurler Marion Craft. Bassett's blow came with one out in the last of the 11th inning.

Wood struck out 14 Salem batters. Craft set down 12 Market Basket hitters. Both pitchers gave up four hits and other than Bassett, no base runner on either team advanced past second base in the first 10 and a half innings of play.

Klamath's Jimmy Derrah bounced a first-inning, ground-rule double over the left field fence but died on second. Other Klamath hits were singles by Jerry Johnson in the sixth, Roy Harris in the 10th and Dale Cunningham in the 11th.

Market Basket was scheduled to meet the winner of the Hermiston-Corvallis game Saturday afternoon in the final game of Saturday night's schedule. The loser would be eliminated from further tournament competition.

The winner of the Saturday night game would advance into Sunday's play towards the state title and a chance to represent the state in the Northwest regional playoffs billed later this month. Falkenstein's Meat Company of Eugene is the defending state champion.

Snead Moves Ahead Of St. Paul Tourney

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Sam Snead, winner of the St. Paul Open 21 years ago, eagled the 18th hole of the third round Saturday for a 66 and bolted into the lead of the silver anniversary tournament.

With 197 for 54 holes the aging slammer was 19 under par at the sitting duck Keller, course, one stroke in front of big Mike Souchak of Grossingers, N. Y.

The two came down the 18th fairway deadlocked for the lead. Snead hit the green on the 462-yard par 5 hole and the ball stopped 18 feet from the pin. Souchak hit his second shot to the edge of the green 45 feet away.

He putted six feet short and then watched Sam drop his putt for an eagle three. Souchak holed out for a birdie and a four-under par 68. Ken Venturi of San Francisco, the defending champion, and Ernie Vossler of Midland, Tex., who was tied with Snead one shot off the pace at the end of 36, were three strokes away at 200. At 201 was Lionel Hebert, 1957 PGA champion from Lafayette, La.

The West Coast and American football world lost one of its greatest names with the death of Henry "Red" Sanders, UCLA football coach. Sanders died Thursday afternoon following a heart attack.

Although we — and many others didn't like the ideas of UCLA and the other southern "rebels," we looked upon Sanders as one of the game's greatest coaches. A glance at his record while at UCLA will more than back Sanders' tribute.

Sanders was undoubtedly the No. 1 college football coach on the Pacific Coast the past several years, and for the matter, he ranked high across the nation. Very few college coaches in the country could claim Sanders' record, whether it be with or without illegal athletic help.

With the death of Sanders, there is a lot of speculation as to who will replace the famed redhead as chief of UCLA's mighty gridiron staff. And heading the list of nominees is Oregon State's southern gentleman Tommy Prothro.

Prothro is a Sanders' product. Tommy served under Sanders at UCLA before taking the OSC post. Another top name in the "talk" is George Dickerson, now Sanders' righthand assistant.

We doubt very much if Prothro is interested enough in returning to Los Angeles to take over the lofty chair at the top of UCLA's football world. Here are our reasons:

1. Prothro is happy in Corvallis. 2. He has a very happy and "generous" alumni. 3. There is very little pressure at Oregon State compared to the hotbeds of Los Angeles.

4. Prothro's wife seems happy to live in the smaller city of Corvallis. 5. He has a fine program, under his direction, going for him at Corvallis.

6. The only thing Prothro would get at UCLA over Oregon State — other than more money — is national recognition, and from our meetings with Tommy, he doesn't seem interested in things of this sort.

Although anything is possible, we'll go down against Prothro's leaving Oregon State this year to replace Sanders at UCLA.

Monday night, American boxing fans get their world's heavyweight champion into action again. For the first time in 1958 and the first outing since August 22, 1957, Floyd Patterson will be defending his heavyweight belt when he faces an unknown and untested Roy Harris of Cut and Shoot, Texas.

15-3 Cleared By Vault Star

PORTLAND (AP) — Bob Gutowski, with an ankle taped heavily, soared 15 feet, 3 inches to win the pole vault in the Northwest All-Corners track meet here Saturday.

Gutowski's performance, the greatest in Oregon history, was short of his world record of 15 feet 9 3/4 inches.

The slender Los Angeles ace still appeared somewhat handicapped from an earlier sprain and wore heavy tape around his right ankle.

Gutowski twice failed to clear 15 feet, 5 inches. It still was the most spectacular performance of the meet.

The Far Western Regional Women's meet also was held in conjunction with the All-Corners competition, and Sharon Shepherd of Mapleton, Ore., topped the field with two triumphs.

Miss Shepherd, who recently toured with a United States team in Europe, won the javelin with a throw of 132 feet, 11 inches and then hurled the discus a winning 114 feet, 3 1/2 inches.

Another outstanding performance was turned in by Jim Bailey, a former University of Oregon competitor who was the first to run a mile under four minutes in this country.

Bailey captured the 880 here Saturday in 1:58.7 and then finishes second in the 3,000-meter steeplechase. The steeplechase winner was Mark Robbins of Roseburg, who also attends the university.

Dave Edstrom of the U of O captured the high hurdles in :15.0. Jim Grellie, his teammate on a recent European tour, entered the two-mile but became sick to the stomach and had to quit midway through the race.

Steve Anderson of Tacoma, Wash., placed well in five events. The University of Oregon senior captured the 100-yard dash in :10.4, placed second in the broad jump and captured third in the hop, step and jump, low hurdles and 220.

Two Gridders Share Honors

CHICAGO (AP) — The forward pass combination of Bobby Mitchell of Illinois and Jim Ninowski of Michigan State Saturday won unprecedented honor as co-winners of the most valuable college player award in Friday night's 25th All Star football game.

The two former Big Ten rivals each collected 39 votes in a poll of "working" sports writers, who covered the All Stars' surprising 35-19 upset of the Detroit Lions in Soldier Field.

Runnerup with 29 votes was Texas A&M's Bobby Conrad, who kicked a record — matching four field goals and three extra points, and played a brilliant defensive halfback game.

Only other player named in the balloting was Lou Michaels, Kentucky's 235-pound tackle, who collected three votes.

Klamath Falls and Weed enter this last regular week of league play all tied with 9-4 records. A win and loss combination for either team would all but clinch the outright championship for one of the two clubs. Both Klamath

and Weed have a single makeup game left to play before the playoffs, but no time or site for the rained out meetings has been set by league officials.

Whitt will have righthander Gerry Burcher ready to throw this afternoon as the Seals moved into Gem Stadium. Mount Shasta could hold the key to who will be the eventual winner of the Northern California League. The Seals have hexed the Kubs in both games played by the two clubs. In the first meeting of the season at Gem, Mount Shasta won a 30-0 decision from the Kubs.

Should Burcher need any help, Whitt will probably call on big Dave D'Olive who came on in the last inning of last weekend's game at Yreka to save the win for Burcher. Klamath won that game 9-6.

Besides Burcher, Whitt will have Bob Kelly behind the plate, George Hanson and Ron Conner at first and second, Dorm Martin at shortstop and either Scott Hartley or Jerry Burke at third. In the outfield will probably be Donn Taucher, Floyd Linderman and Fran Miller.

Whitt has hopes that Hanson, the heavy-hitting first sacker, has shaken off a slump that rocked him during the mid-season games. Last week at Yreka, Hanson broke loose for four home hits, one a triple. The addition of Hanson's big bat to the already heavy hitting turned in recently by Taucher, Linderman, Martin and Miller would greatly add to the Kubs stock.

Scott Valley has already assured themselves of no lower than a fifth place finish and could not help their own cause by beating the Sons from Weed. But the Stars would also like to play a roll in deciding which of the two teams — Klamath or Weed — will rule the final league standings. Regardless of the outcome of the Yreka-Dunsmuir game at Dunsmuir, the Merchants will not be able to leave the cellar and the Indians can not climb any higher than second.

In the first game, Dave Garcia triggered Phoenix to victory with a two-run homer in the first inning.

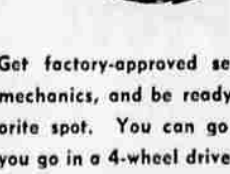
