

# Award Schedule Outlined For Klamath Junior Fair

A complete supplement of awards for the Klamath Junior Fair of August 17, 18 and 19 at the Klamath County Fairgrounds was announced today by 4-H headquarters. Special awards to be made include the Rotary Club sweepstakes award to the best all-around livestock club, a revolving cup, the livestock judging team award, the dairy judging team and the horse judging team awards which are trips to the State Fair by the fair board.

Other awards and their categories follow:

**Beef Cattle** — Champion Hereford steer, \$25 bond by Flowers by Bill and Rita; champion Angus steer, \$25 savings account by U.S. National Bank, Klamath Falls Branch; champion Shorthorn steer, \$25 bond by Ricky's Jewellers; grand champion steer, \$25 bond by T. B. Watters; reserve grand champion steer, show halter by Charlie Head Saddlery; champion Hereford female, \$25 bond by Herald and News; champion Hereford female, summer school scholarship by Dan Liskey Memorial.

**Reserve champion Hereford female**, \$15 cash by the Landry Company; champion Angus female, \$25 bond by Ganong's Variety; champion Angus female, summer school scholarship by Dan Liskey Memorial; reserve champion Angus female, \$15 credit at Claude H. Davis Floor Coverings.

**Marshall Cornett Award**: To the 4-H beef club member making the best year around record in caring for and in keeping an accurate record of his livestock project, a \$25 Savings Bond will be awarded by Marshall Cornett Award.

**The Claudette Shuck Memorial Fund** Committee will award 4-H Club Summer School scholarship to the exhibitor of the grand champion steer. The scholarship must be used the following year. In the event the winner is unable to attend the 4-H Club Summer School, the first alternate will be the exhibitor of the reserve grand champion steer.

**The American Shorthorn Breeders' Association**, Alton C. Atlasson, Secretary, Chicago 9, Illinois, will add 20 per cent to cash premiums of \$5 or more paid on Shorthorn steers, breeding heifers and cows. Also, cash premiums on trophy to grand champion or reserve grand champion if a shorthorn.

**The American Hereford Association**, Hereford Drive, Kansas City, Missouri, pays 20 per cent of all premiums of \$5, or more, in the 4-H and FFA divisions in the individual Hereford fat steer classes and individual Hereford breeding heifer classes.

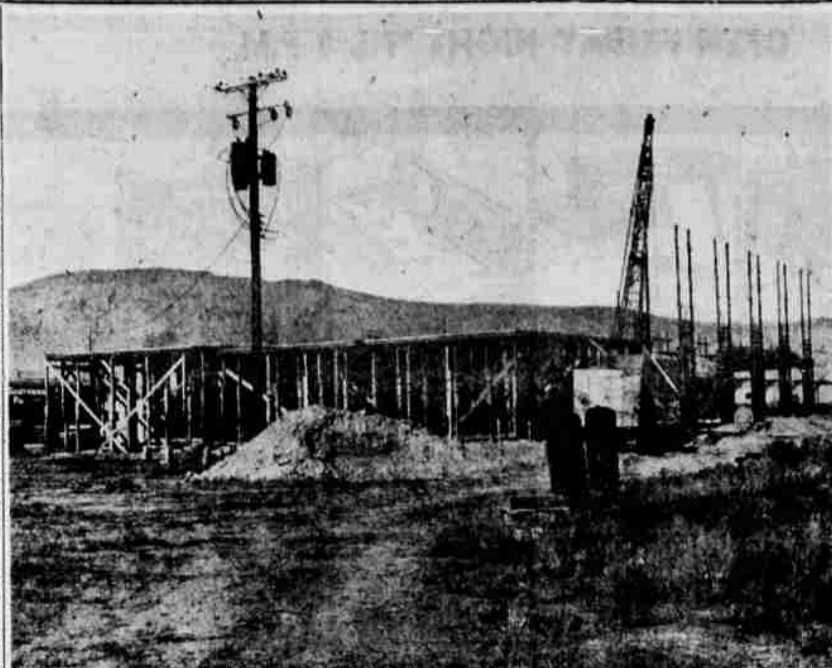

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## Russian Rocket To Be Visible

PORTLAND (AP) — Delta I, the rocket which pushed Russia's Sputnik III into orbit in outer space, is scheduled for a series of passes over the Northwest.

Robert Boardwell, director of the Portland Moonwatch team, released this timetable:

Aug. 17—8:35 p.m., 44 degrees, southwest sky.

Aug. 18—9:20 p.m., 44 degrees, southwest sky.

Aug. 19—8:05 p.m., 44 degrees, southwest sky.

Aug. 20—8:49 p.m., 45 degrees, southwest sky.

Aug. 21—8:33 p.m., 47 degrees, southwest sky.

Boardwell said the passes will be from northwest to southeast. He suggested to those watching for the sky traveler's rocket to start looking from five to 10 minutes before the scheduled arrival time because times are not adjusted for northern Oregon.
