China To Get Russian Aid

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Times said today the Soviet Union reportedly has decided to supply atomic weapons and ballistic missiles to Communist China plus more economic development aid.

A Times dispatch from Warsaw said reports reaching the Polish capital indicated the Soviets also have decided to help Red China launch an earth satellite and to build four more nuclear reactors there. China claims one reactor now.

The reports were said to come from sources that had first reported a recent military and political agreement between Moscow and Peiping.

The reported agreements came out of a meeting in Peiping three weeks ago between Soviet Premier Khrushchev and Chinese Communist boss Mao Tse-tung, the dispatch said. Reports on them apparently were being allowed to circulate with at least tacit Soviet approval.

The agreements are believed in Warsaw to be aimed at least partly "to give a major psychological lift to Peiping's place in world affairs," the Times said. It noted that information available in Warsaw made it impossible to determine the full military significance of any nuclear weapon aid the Soviet Union might offer Red China.

More Women Enter Law

LOS ANGELES (AP) — More and more women are turning to law, says the president of the International Federation of Women Lawyers.

"The result," says Dr. Luisa A. Perez Peroza, of Caracas, Venezuela, "is a more humanitarian approach to the law."

"Women bring in the important element of justice—because they know what injustice was when they did not have equal rights." The federation opened its 10th conference yesterday.

Latin America Feud Ending

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Argentina and Chile have agreed to quit feuding over a bleak little island near the tip of South America and leave it to the birds.

Both nations have held unseated claims to Snipe Island since 1881. Chile recently began building a lighthouse there. Argentine Marines destroyed it Aug. 9 and stationed a detachment there. Chile angrily withdrew her ambassador from Buenos Aires.

A communique issued in both nations' capitals last night said they had agreed to leave the island unoccupied and without lights.

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King Hussein's Chauffeur Likes His Work 'Very Much'

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — How does it feel to pilot a king across the scorching deserts of Jordan in a bullet-proof limousine? "I like my work very much," says 40-year-old Maurice Rayner. "I think it's a grand experience."

Rayner has been chief driver for Jordan's King Hussein for five years. They got to know each other while Hussein was attending Harrow School in England. Rayner managed a garage which Hussein, a sports car enthusiast, used to frequent.

"One day he asked me to come to Jordan and I came," Rayner explains. There is constant fear that somebody may try to assassinate Hussein. The fear was heightened by the killing of his cousin King Faisal of Iraq on July 14.

Before that Hussein generally traveled with a small armed escort. Now he appears with 60 fierce, heavily armed Arab Legion troops riding on open patrol cars and motorcycles.

In the middle of the column is Hussein's black 1956 air-conditioned Cadillac, its springs sagging under the weight of armor plating. The thick bulletproof windows are always rolled up and

Hussein can hardly be seen in the back seat. Up front, sitting stiffly, is Rayner, wearing his tan chauffeur's uniform and British military ribbons. Doesn't he worry about getting shot? "I must confess I used to think about things like that. But after a while you stop worrying and decide you must live life as it comes."
