YREKA — Approximately 5,000 persons packed the grandstand at the Siskiyou County Fairgrounds each night to witness the various rodeo events staged by Dick Hemsted's Championship Rodeos.

The rodeo, going on both Friday and Saturday nights, was one of the many featured events of the annual Siskiyou County Fair, and both evenings found the grandstand filled to overflowing. Ed Matthews, fair manager, who had anticipated a crowd of 20,000 for the three days, stated that the crowds thronging the fairgrounds more than exceeded his expectations.

During the horse show, "Jessie Parks" owned and ridden by Mary Harbison of Sacramento, president of the Pacific Coast Cutting Horse Association, emerged from the cutting horses as champion.

Quake Death Toll Mounts

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—The officially confirmed death toll from continuing earthquakes in mountainous western Iran is nearing 100, a relief agency spokesman said last night.

The spokesman, Dr. Hussein Khatibi, was flying today to the area that has been shaken by repeated tremors since last Friday. Unofficial estimates said about 300 persons have been killed.

Khatibi said at least 24 groups were on the way to remote villages to give first aid and check on casualties. Quakes in the same area last year killed more than 1,500.



Adlai's Aunt Beaten, Robbed

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Adlai Stevenson's 67-year-old aunt, Mrs. Anabel East, was beaten and robbed of \$40 Monday by an intruder who broke into her home and hit her on the head, police reported.

Mrs. East told officers she lay unconscious on her bed for about an hour after the attack, then called friends who notified police. She was treated for head cuts at a hospital.

City Appoints Meter Maids

Councilman Walter Fleet, chairman of the Police Committee, announced Tuesday that appointments had been made for the three "meter maids" expected to begin patrolling Klamath Falls parking meters about September 15.

The three new "meter maids" are Mrs. Betty Daniel, Mrs. Betty Schultheisz and Mrs. Doris York. The appointments are effective Monday, August 25.

Fleet reported that these officers, along with the earlier appointed police women will be given intensive first aid, public relations and law enforcement before they take over parking enforcement and other assigned duties in mid-September.
