

# Morse Cites Fish Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) insists his desire is to protect fish and wildlife despite a statement by his fellow Oregon Democrat, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, that Morse's opposition probably will kill Neuberger's fisheries protection bill.

Neuberger told the Senate that he was sorry Morse had not voiced objections to his measure until the bill was ready for final action.

Morse said the bill would set a dangerous precedent by giving the Interior Secretary veto over Federal Power Commission licensing of dams where fish and wildlife resources are involved.

"The bill is on the Senate calendar," Morse said in reply to Neuberger. "It can be motioned up for debate whenever a pending bill has been disposed of. I hope that it will be motioned up before Congress adjourns."

Morse said he felt sure the bill in its present form would be defeated.

He said he felt his substitute measure, which would require the FPC to consider but not necessarily follow the Interior Department recommendations, has a good chance for adoption.

Morse added, "I do not yield to Sen. Neuberger nor to anyone else in my desire to protect fish and wildlife interests."

"It is clear," Morse said, "that the Neuberger bill will organize many groups whose cooperation with fish and wildlife groups is essential if we are going to promote the best river development possible in the Pacific Northwest."

# Peach Theft End Sought

PORTLAND (AP)—Lloyd Yeoman is going to harvest his own peaches or bust a picket in the 20-foot fence he built to insure his crop.

Neighborhood children and others walking by the 40-year-old tree, conveniently near the sidewalk, have snatched peaches from his tree the past two years.

Yeoman said he tried to stop the theft of his peaches last year by sleeping on his front porch. He gained nothing but trouble.

This year he hammered together a high board fence from 20-foot-lengths of old lumber and erected it around his tree.

The fence will stay up until the crop is ripe. He told neighbors he would take it down after picking his peaches, which are not yet ripe.

If this remedy works, Yeoman said he plans to build a portable plywood fence to put up and remove each season.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Election to Congress really isn't the same as dying. At least, Rep. Winfield K. Denton (D-Ind) is trying to convince his ex-classmates that it isn't.

Denton was glancing over a copy of the 33th reunion report of the Harvard Law School Class of 1922 when "I was very much surprised to note that I was listed among those who had passed away."

So Denton, a hearty 61, fired off a letter to Morris E. Dry of New York, secretary of the class reunion committee, to tell him it isn't so.

He noted he has been elected to Congress four times, and speculated that "maybe some feel that when one enters on those duties he is no longer among the living."

The acid hurler was among about 200 persons who tried to break up a parade by the candidate and his supporters. Police drove off the attackers and arrested two of them.

The acid hit some of Alessandri's aides, burning their clothing.

# Two Men Listed Dead As Result Of Sierra Floods

TRUCKEE, Calif. (UPI)—Two men were listed dead today as a result of flash floods that roared through the Sierra Nevada.

The floods, touched off late Monday by thunderstorms, forced the closing of U.S. highways 40 and 395.

Killed in the flood were Frederick Johnson Jr., 32, Reno, and Joseph Thompson, 23, Redwood City, Calif.

Thompson was a passenger in an automobile driven by James Olinger, 23, Palo Alto, Calif.

Olinger said he was driving on the new freeway section of Highway 40 near Parad, 16 miles east of Truckee, when a torrent of sludge, big rocks, tree limbs and brush washed down the highway at 7:10 p.m.

Olinger said he saw the torrent coming and jumped from the car.

Thompson stayed in it. The water swept the car off the road into the rampaging Truckee River, which runs alongside the highway.

Olinger said he thought he saw Thompson leap from the car about 150 feet downstream, only to be hit by a floating log.

The debris came down in such quantity that no vehicle could move on Highway 40 for two hours.

Later, Johnson was killed while trying to clean debris from the highway with a scoop shovel. The vehicle fell off the shoulder of the highway.

highway into the Truckee River. Eventually, the road was reopened to one-way traffic, but the work of clearing away the debris continued throughout the night.

U.S. 395, the main route from Los Angeles to Reno, was blocked by a mudslide 22 miles north of Bridgeport at 5 p.m. No one was hurt in that storm.

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
