The University of Oregon may have its first all-American football star since George Shaw if pre-season forecasts are correct.

The 1958 edition of the Kick-Off Football Yearbook picks end Ron Stover to its first eleven of the all-American team. Stover, a 6-3, 197-pound senior, set a Rose Bowl record last New Year's Day against Ohio State. He is expected to play a big part in the Webfoot's gridiron roll this year.

Stover is the only Far West college star to be picked to Kick-Off's mythical team. The famed "Gallop Ghost," Red Grange picked the all-American club for the football publication.

Other stars named to the pre-season A-A team included: End—Sammy Williams, Michigan State; tackle—Ken Beck, Texas A & M and Bob Reifsnnyder of Navy; guards—Rod Breedlove, Maryland and Al Ecuyer of Notre Dame. Center—Bob Harrison of Oklahoma's powerful Sooners. Backs—Don Clark, Ohio State, Bob Anderson, Army, Nick Pietrosante, Notre Dame and Frank Curci, Miami.

Of Stover and Williams, Grange says: "They are a passer's dream." Jack Crabtree, ex-Oregon quarterback now playing for the Philadelphia Eagles in the NFL, will agree with Grange on those words praising Stover, for it was his passes that Ron snagged against Ohio State for a record-breaking effort.

Kick-Off also picked the top 25 teams in the nation. Included in the 25 are UCLA (7th) and Oregon State (19th) from the Pacific Coast. Colorado of the Big Eight Conference is ranked sixth behind Ohio State, Notre Dame, Auburn, Oklahoma and Michigan State. Playing on Klamath's club this year will be tackle Jack Hillmeyer, former KUHS prep star who was a starter for the Buffs last season.

The publication also picks all-star teams for the different sections of the country. The all-Far West team named was: Stover and UCLA's Dick Wallen at end; Oregon State's Ted Bates and Bill Leeka of UCLA at tackle; Oregon's Bob Grottkau and USC's Marlin McKee at guard; California's Bob Chiappone at center; Bob Newman of WSC, Dick Bass of College of Pacific, Luther "Hit and Run" Carr of Washington and Rick McMullen of Stanford as the backs.

All these Pacific Coast gridderes were named to the "100 Best Players" section carried by Kick-Off. Others from the Far West named were Jim Dawson, UCLA tackle; Bill Steiger, WSC end; and Montana guard Stan Renning.

All in all, this should be another good year of major college football in the West.

Kubs Clash With Legion

An exhibition baseball game is scheduled tonight at Gem Stadium when Hi Hatfield's Klamath Falls Junior Legion team meets the Northern California League championship Kubs Club. Game time is 8 o'clock.

The Kubs have scheduled two games this week as warmups for the Northern California League President's Cup playoff which opens here Sunday. Friday night, Klamath hosts Scott Valley in a league makeup game that was rained out earlier this season.

Tonight's game gives the Kubs a chance to scrimmage before meeting Scott Valley Friday and opening the playoffs Sunday. For the legion, it gives Hatfield a chance to look over prospects for next season's legion club.

Hatfield plans to pick up some Babe Ruth League standouts who are prime prospects for the 1959 legion club. Most of the members of this year's legion team which won the Southern Oregon District championship will be on hand.

Pitching for the legion team will probably be either Kub hurlers Dave D'Olivo, Rod McPhail or Wayne Hironaka, while legion pitchers Blake Griggs, Dean Dunson, Keith Ferrell or a couple of Babe Ruth graduates will be tossing for the Kubs. By exchanging pitching staffs, the legion and Kubs should play on fairly even terms.

Could Be Best Season Yet

Oregon Tech Awaits '58 Football

Tough Schedule, Top Boys

Oregon Technical Institute is about ready to open what could be the finest football season in the history of the Mile High Campus.

While school administrators and the state's lawmakers were dickering over the school's future, head football coach and athletic director Rex Hunsaker was busy beating the bushes for grid talent for the 1958 season. Not only has Hunsaker come up with some first-class football material, but he has also lined the Owls up with its toughest football schedule since the Owls first started playing in 1949.

Hunsaker has undertaken the task of preparing a college team to go against three of the top service football powers in the nation this year, and for the benefit of hometown fans, all three of these games will be played at Modoc Field. Oregon Tech will play host to Hamilton Air Base, Moffitt Air Base and Malstrom Air Base before the nine-game season has been completed.

In addition to the three games against Air Force competition, Hunsaker also faces games from the four other Oregon Collegiate Conference members, Southern Oregon, Oregon College, Portland State and Eastern Oregon.

teams weren't enough, the Owls are destined to meet two of the leading "small" colleges in this section of the county when Oregon Tech travels to Salt Lake City to play Westminster College and later in the year takes on Whittier College in Whittier, California. Westminster went undefeated last year and will meet the Owls carrying an 11-game winning streak. Last year the Salt Lake City collegians were scored upon only four

times in nine games. Whittier was 6-2-1 last year. Hunsaker has given a call for all Oregon Tech footballers to report in top physical condition Monday, September 8, for the first practice. The Owl gridgers are scheduled to undergo three practice sessions a day the first week, with morning and afternoon drills on the field and evening "blackboard" sessions.

Heading the list of Owl football candidates will be 14 returning lettermen from last year's club which posted a 4-4 overall season record and a 2-2 mark in Oregon Collegiate Conference competition. Among those returning will be five backs and nine veteran linemen, two of whom—Frank Wilson and Allan Jones—were all-conference selections in 1957.

lie Ganter will be back for a third year, along with fullback Belton Ollison. Halfbacks due back are Al "Tiger" Everson, Charlie Wilson and Alan Leach.

Up front with line coach George Miller will be Wilson, Allan Jones and Gary Wirth at guard, Dick Hill, Ralph Jones and Jack Bitzer at tackle, Ralph Norgaard at center and ends Dale McCulloch and Norman Hooper.

The Owl coaching staff may make a few changes to spread their experienced footballers over the lineup. One of these changes would be to move Leach from halfback to end to make use of his speed and running ability.

Besides the returning lettermen, Hunsaker is expecting several very fine junior college transfers to report September 8. Although he has not publicly announced any newcomers, the Owls head coach indicated some of the boys he is getting drew offers from major colleges up and down the Pacific Coast, Pennsylvania, Oklahoma and other parts of the country—including Pacific Coast Conference members.

Oregon Tech's all-sports season ticket sale is underway. All home OTI athletic events—plus a reserved seat for the football season—is being sold as one ticket this year for \$12.50. This ticket includes football, basketball, baseball and track.

ChiSox Win, Yanks Beaten By Tribe; LA Captures Pair

Say now, can the New York Yankees possibly blow this American League pennant after all? Sounds fantastic, because the Yankees still have a 10½ game lead over the Chicago White Sox with just 35 games to go. But it's just an outside possibility today because the White Sox are on a winning streak that now has reached six games and the Yankees are on a four-game losing streak.

Dick Donovan's four-hit pitching kept the Sox surging Tuesday night with a 7-1 victory over Boston. At New York, homers by Rocky Colavito and Vic Wertz helped the Cleveland Indians hand the Yankees their ninth loss in the last 12 games, 8-6.

The greatest flopper of modern times was staged, of course, by the Brooklyn Dodgers of 1951. They blew a 13½-game lead in the last 44 games of the season in a tailspin that started on Aug. 11 and then lost to the New York Giants in a three-game pennant playoff on Bobby Thomson's historic homer.

Dickerson Sees Good Grid Year For Bruins

LOS ANGELES (AP)—In a profession where the evasive answer is used as often as the chalk talk, George Dickerson, UCLA's new football coach, is a rarity.

"I haven't had three hours' sleep in three days," the ruggedly handsome successor to the late Red Sanders told a reporter. "To be honest," he said, "I've been on the phone all that time trying to land this job."

Can he field a good club on such short notice, with the season starting in about a month? "I'm confident I can," he said. Probably no mentor in Bruin history is as familiar with UCLA football as Dickerson. The 45-year-old coach has spent most of his football life at UCLA.

He made varsity tackle in 1934 weighing only 175 pounds and was elected captain of the Bruins in 1936.

This will be his 13th year as a Bruin coach. He spent three years as assistant to Bert LaBrucherie and nine years with Sanders.

Sanders, who died Thursday of a heart attack, often said that keeping Dickerson was the smartest move he ever made.

Several years ago Dickerson spent a little extra time on a line prospect who didn't show rapid progress. Twice Sanders ordered Dickerson to dump the boy. Dickerson refused. The youth later became one of UCLA's outstanding linemen.

Dickerson was born in Gallion, Ohio, but has lived here since childhood.

Like Sanders, Dickerson will use the single-wing offense.

"It won more games in the Pacific Coast Conference than any other system," he says.
