### Nasser Said Suspicious Of Middle East Peace Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The man with real power of decision in the Middle East, Arab leader Gamal Abdel Nasser, was reported Saturday to be extremely suspicious of President Eisenhower's six-point Mideast peace plan. Diplomatic officials said reports from Cairo show that Nasser is very wary of the whole idea although he has not turned it down. His reaction is being watched with intense interest here because almost independently of the back-room negotiations now under way at United Nations headquarters, Nasser's decision can make or break the project. At the same time it is believed in official quarters here that Eisenhower's move has put the ambitious president of the United Arab Republic in a very difficult spot. Eisenhower has confronted Nasser with the necessity for making a choice which in the long run may be vital to the Cairo leader's own success. The President offered through his speech at the United Nations Wednesday to throw American support and backing behind a great new Middle East economic program. Although details of the program were deliberately left vague, the President was quite specific on one point. The point is that the Arabs themselves would run the operation. State Department officials privately point out that Nasser is the only figure in the Arab world whose influence now reaches powerfully across national boundaries. Nasser therefore is the dominant figure among Middle East personalities who would be involved in making the President's development program work. But U. S. support for the economic project has conditions attached, even though Eisenhower did not specifically spell them out in his U. N. appearance. State Department officials say these come from the way in which the economic proposal was put forth as one point in a total of six. The five other points all deal with measures to be taken through the United Nations to put an end to subversion, radio agitation, assassination, and other manifestations of what the U. S. government means by the term indirect aggression. The offer that Eisenhower has put before Nasser thus can be summed up in these terms: If Nasser is willing to renounce the use of indirect aggression to achieve his aim of a unified Arab world, the U. S. President is willing to back an economic agency which would get large supplies of American dollars to build up the economies and raise the living standards of the Arab peoples. If Nasser is determined to persist in a course which the United States considers reckless and a threat to world peace, then Eisenhower sees no prospects of dealing with the Middle East other than by trying to marshal the resources of the U. N. to thwart indirect aggression. U. S. officials say Nasser necessarily will make his decision in terms of what he thinks will advance most his dream of a united Arab world under his leadership.

Goodnough, mayor of Lakeview, has issued the following "solemn" proclamation: "Whereas, the 39th annual Lakeview Roundup, will come to pass shortly, to-wit: Saturday, Sunday and Monday, August 30, 31 and Labor Day; and "Whereas, the same weekend will bring to Lake County the 1958 editions of many related events and occurrences, including the county fair, the historical pageant, the Labor Day parade, the Rotary livestock auction, the queen's dances; and "Whereas, the said weekend is one of importance to every person in the county and all of Goose Lake Valley, being entertaining, edifying and economic; and "Whereas, everyone therefore should countenance and support the Labor Day weekend events to the largest of his ability; and "Whereas, one important way in which all persons can support and promote the said events is by the wearing of Western type clothes, such as hats, neckerchiefs, shirts, steers or saddles; "Now therefore, I, Howard M. Goodnough, Mayor of the Town of Lakeview, Lake County, Oregon, do hereby name that period from August 18, 1958, as Lake County Days, and proclaim through the land that all persons should lend support to the major coming events by wearing Western clothes during and throughout Lake County Days."
