Life Of Christ Slated For Depiction Sunday

DUNSMUIR — The life of Christ in colorful pageantry will be presented in the I AM amphitheater, one mile east of Mount Shasta, on Sunday morning.

Delegates of the I AM youth convave now in session will portray the inspirational Biblical events for their own members and anyone else who cares to attend. There is no admission charge.

The blessing of the Christ child, Jesus at the temple, His baptism, the sermon on the Mount, the rising of Lazarus and the resurrection will be among the many scenes of this four-hour production. Special staging and artistry will be used to create the effect of Jesus' ascension. The angels of the Lord will then descend, also as if on wings.

"This is not a play," Mrs. G. W. Ballard, leader of the I AM Ascended Master movement, stated. "Each participant is charged with expressing the message of God for their own divine growth and for those who witness the production."

Work on the amphitheater, lighting, music, costuming and special effects has progressed since the initial pageant, first presented eight years ago. Rocks and greenery have been constructed to blend with the surroundings. Dressing rooms, property rooms and dining facilities are underneath the massive stage.

Many principals in the production have returned each year to perfect their roles, Mrs. Ballard said. The part of Jesus will be played by Gerald Craig of Chicago. Mother Mary's part will be taken by Susan Elkins of Muncie, Indiana. George Bennet of Philadelphia will be Joseph. The young Jesus will be played by Howard Fowler of Shasta Springs. All are veterans in their roles.

There has been an increase in the number of supporting players this year, Mrs. Ballard said. Great stress has been placed on the use

of color, and light in costuming and staging, much of it done by professionals in their field who have volunteered these services, she continued. Mrs. Ballard said she was amazed each year at the talent working on this authentic presentation.

The pageant begins at 8 o'clock Sunday morning and there is seating capacity for 3,000 people. Hats or sunshades are almost a must for those in the audience. Plans are being made to shade the amphitheater seating but it cannot be done this year, Mrs. Ballard said.

The participants, numbering about 400, have been rehearsing the scenes in which they appear this week and then return to painting, hammering or arranging greenery according to their assignments. Mrs. Ballard, an energetic woman in her 60s, directs the production with meticulous attention to detail.

For many the convave is a family affair. Mrs. Ernest Rowe is assistant director. Her husband, a Pasadena dentist, is narrator. Children of other delegates appear with their parents or in special roles. Delegates come from many parts of the United States and several foreign countries.

Mrs. Ballard pointed out delegates from Hawaii and Canada in the course of the interview. Frederick Landwehr of Los Angeles is organist and has done special musical arrangements for the pageant. Mrs. Ballard's son, Don Ballard, is in charge of sound projection. Hidden microphones pick up sound from any section of the huge amphitheater.

Mrs. Ballard is carrying on the leadership of a religious movement started by her husband, the

late G. W. Ballard, Mt. Shasta, which forms a backdrop for the amphitheater, holds special significance for the I AM followers as Ballard's teachings were based on revelations made to him by St. Germain on the mountain's slopes. Mrs. Ballard describes Germain as a man of peace who sought unity in Europe during the French revolutionary days and has appeared in later years whenever mankind has faced a crisis.

The St. Germain foundation followers believe in the power of the I AM Ascended Master as a force for good in the world available to the individual through obedience, purity and love. Mrs. Ballard explains. The foundation purchased Shasta Springs, a famed resort just north of Dunsmuir, about 10 years ago and have since expanded their holdings in southern Siskiyou County.

Mrs. Ballard states there are I AM sanctuaries, as the meeting places are called, all over the United States and abroad. She spends August and September at the conclaves held here for the youth and senior members. She mentioned a large following in Chicago where she traditionally spends Christmas and in Santa Fe, New Mexico, the scene of special Easter observances. The remainder of the year she visits her followers and the sanctuaries.

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Air Agents Favor Strike

PORTLAND (AP)—West Coast Airlines Thursday said there is a chance its station agents may go on strike this weekend.

The line said the agents, members of the Air Line Agents Assn., have voted overwhelmingly to walk off their jobs.

Victor J. Herbert, president of the association, said in Chicago a 30-day "cooling off" period following the end of unsuccessful negotiations will end Saturday.

Members were notified by Herbert that a strike date will be selected shortly "to effect a peaceful withdrawal on or after the Saturday date in the event such action becomes necessary."

Housing Project To Be Built

PORTLAND (AP)—Fred Weber says he will build a two million dollar housing development on a 21-acre air field site in suburban Ardenwald.

Weber disclosed Thursday that he had purchased the Wells Air Field and that he will build about 100 homes there.

The purchase price was not disclosed. However, the field earlier had been offered for sale for about \$80,000.

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
