## Braves Twirler Homers

Yep, it's almost fall and World Series time. There's the smell of burning leaves. There's football practice. And there's Lew Burdette, pitching the big shutout again.

It's been a long summer for the big right-hander who pitched the Milwaukee Braves to the world championship last October. At the All-Star Game in July he had only a 6-7 record. Those winter banquets that toasted his three victories and two shutouts over the New York Yankees in the Series were as much to blame as anything.

But since the All-Star break he's won 8 of 10. He beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-0 last night with a four-hitter.

It was only his second shutout of the season. He didn't walk a man, struck out five and didn't allow a base runner after Gil Hodges, who had two of the Dodgers' hits, singled with two out in the fourth inning.

Burdette also hit his third home run of the season—all at the Coliseum—as the Braves regained a 6 1/2-game lead in the National League race after losing three in a row to the Dodgers.

Cincinnati broke loose for an 8-1 victory over second-place San Francisco, and the Chicago Cubs, with Ernie Banks hitting his 39th and 40th home runs, beat third-place Pittsburgh 5-3. St. Louis plunked Philadelphia back into the cellar 2-1.

Hank Aaron's 27th home run opened a four-run fourth for the Braves against losing southpaw Sandy Koufax (9-7). Duke Snider's error, Andy Pafko's double and Burdette's homer wrapped it up. Head coach Andy Knudsen and aids Jim Inglesby and Jack Peterson don't seem a bit dismayed about what they have seen during the Klamath Park and Recreation Department's summer touch football program. And, of course, there isn't the slightest doubt that the summer play will help . . . the weight-lifting classes that started last spring have also added strength.

No. . . . It appears that we may expect some good football on Modoc Field.

Back to the tickets. . . . If, by any chance, Pelican fans have neglected to pick up season ducats . . . there is still time. Johnson informs us that there are a few good seats left between the forty-yard stripes. He emphasized the word "few"—so it behoves one to get moving. Remember the first home game will be played September 19, when Eugene pays a visit.

The season tickets cost \$6 and cover all the home games. An easy way to pick up yours is to call Johnson at his office — 4-7595 — and make the arrangements. If he happens to be out, anyone answering you can help.

The teletype wires have been strangely silent concerning the Babe Ruth World Series now in progress at Vancouver, B.C. . . . Seems odd; the interest in Klamath Falls was high when the regionals were played and most of us felt safe in assuming that as play progressed into the World Series that the interest would widen.

American Legion, Little League and National Baseball Congress national tournaments have been covered by the wire services the past few days but to our knowledge not a word has been said about Babe Ruth play. And it is the one being played closest to our area.

Through an inquiry Thursday we did manage to find out that the powerful Washington state team, South King County, was dropped into the consolation bracket by El Paso, Texas.

Washington won the regional crown in Klamath by virtue of superior pitching. . . . they used only four pitchers in disposing of the opposition here. . . . it came as a shock to learn that they had run into one just a little better. A Texan lefthander, Ed Wilson, allowed only two hits and struck out 13 of the potent Washington batters while his club wallpiped the Washingtonians 6-1. The loser, Les Kerr, was tagged for nine hits. Kerr will be remembered by Klamath fans as a darn good hurler and equally good rightfielder.

Grover Gentry of Kiwanis Park who won the title in tether ball for boys 14 and over in addition to grabbing the runnerup spot to Bishop in ping pong; Mary Taggart, Roosevelt, who nabbed the checker championship for girls under 12 and also was the top girl tether ball player; and Bob Burnett who was the top boy checker player.

Also gaining wins were, in checkers, Charles Cocker, of Stukel Park; and Laura Houston, Roosevelt, both of whom competed in the 10 and under bracket. Dave Denney walked off with the checker honors for 12-year-old boys.

Gene Webb of Kiwanis was the winner in the under-14 class in ping pong, while David Denning and Ronald Patsch, both of Stukel, were the best in the 10 and 12-year-old ping pong divisions.
