Personnel Test Use Questioned

CHICAGO (UPI) — An authority on the hiring of executive personnel warns the nation's industry and business firms to beware of the widely used "Personnel Tests."

Leon D. Barton, president of Cadillac Associates, an executive procurement firm, said:

"So far as I know, no test has yet been devised which can give a potential employer the answer to the question 'Should I hire this man?' or to the far more important question, 'If I hire him, will he work?'"

Barton believes many business firms use the personnel tests because they are uncertain of their own judgment in selecting men.

With 30 years experience in the field, Barton asserts that personnel tests may reflect a man's aptitudes and interests, but he stresses they certainly cannot determine his personality, his mental attitudes, his drives or his ambitions.

Cattle Feed Tests Made

If feeding trials now being conducted by the University of California prove successful, livestock producers may be able to buy alfalfa hay on a guaranteed protein basis.

The tests are being conducted on pelleted alfalfa hay to determine if dairy cows can increase their efficiency enough to offset pelleting costs. If production of milk can be maintained or increased by using pellets, it appears a change in feeding dairy cows may result, and probably a similar change in beef feeding.

Pellets have several advantages over baled hay. Besides eliminating much of the labor involved in feeding the bulkier hay, there is less wasted feed and less storage space is needed for the pellets. There has also been less moisture observed in the corrals from feeding pellets.

'Voice' Warns Of Pedestrian Error

CLEVELAND (UPI) — A voice, seemingly out of nowhere, warns pedestrians in Cleveland to be careful crossing the street.

The voice is a tape recording mounted on a post near a busy intersection. It cautions pedestrians "to stay on the curb, cross only with the 'walk' signals, and beware of turning cars."

The tape can be moved from one intersection to another in 15 minutes. The device cost about \$200.

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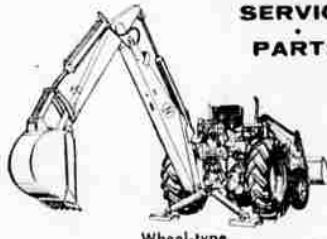
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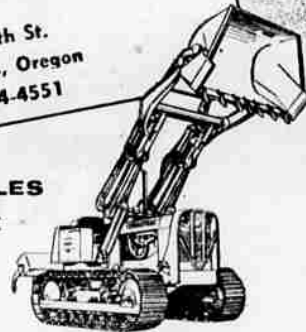
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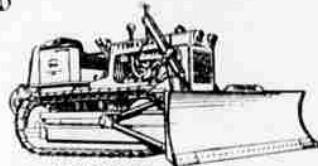
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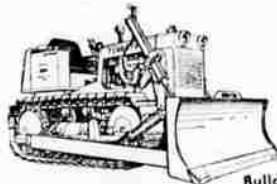
Wheel-type Backhoe-loaders



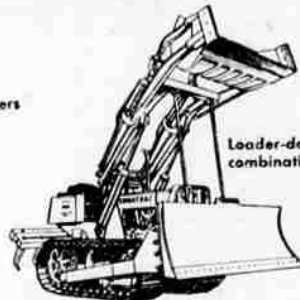
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USFS To Buy Cones Again

Forest Supervisor Yates announces that there is a fairly good cone crop on the Klamath National Forest this year and that the Forest Service is again buying cones in its program of reforesting its burned areas and clear cut blocks.

Yates stated that the Forest Service needs cones of Ponderosa pine, Jeffrey pine, and Douglas fir and that this year's prices are \$3.25 per sack for Ponderosa pine, \$3 for Jeffrey pine, and \$7.50 for Douglas fir.

Forest officers report that much of this year's Douglas fir cone crop is infested with seed damaging insects. They state, however, that the Forest Service will accept wormy cones from collectors providing that more than 50 per cent of the seed in the cones is good, as revealed by chopping and opening a cone lengthwise.

With the recent warm weather, cones are fast ripening in certain localities. Persons interested in collecting cones should first check with their local district ranger to see what amounts of cones are needed from that area and that the cones are ripe before any collecting is begun. Ranger stations that are buying cones are located at Mt. Hebron, Oak Knoll, Seiad, Happy Camp, Sawyers Bar, Callahan and Fort Jones.
