TULELAKE — Father John A. Donahue, S.J., Loyola University, Los Angeles, a cousin of the bride, officiated at the nuptial ceremony in Holy Cross Church, Tulelake, when vows were exchanged between Helen Elizabeth Kelleher of Tulelake, and Richard Thomas Pieser of Klamath Falls.

The double-ring ceremony was read at 11 a.m. Saturday, August 16, before 200 relatives and friends of the young couple.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Keelleher, longtime residents of the California community. The bridegroom is the son of Mrs. Stanley A. Pieser and the late Mr. Pieser, Klamath Falls.

Mary Kay Walsh, Seattle, cousin of the bride, played incidental music at the organ before entry of the wedding party and the traditional wedding marches.

Gail Nersteth, Klamath Falls, sang "Ave Maria," before the ceremony, and later, during the ceremony, "On This Day, O Beautiful Mother," "Lord, Who At Cana's Wedding Feast," and "Pansies Angelicus."

Baskets of white gladioli, blue carnations, Bells of Ireland and masses of ferns were at the altar. White satin bows marked the pews for immediate relatives and close friends. The path to the altar was covered with a white aisle cloth.

The dark-haired bride was escorted by her father to take her vows.

Her gown of lustrous, unadorned white tulle, was made on classic lines. The empire bodice was accented with a doublefold of

taffeta. The very full skirt that fell into soft pleats from the dropped waistline swept into a full train. A long, looped bow and streamers were caught at the back of the bodice. Sleeves were long and pointed at the wrists.

Her finger tip veil of Brussels lace was brought from Europe by her sister, Mary Ann Kelleher on a recent trip abroad. A pearl encrusted crown held it in place. She carried an arrangement of white roses and stephanotis in a cascade effect.

Her sister, Mary Ann, was maid of honor. Bridesmaids were Judith Pieser, Klamath Falls, sister of the bridegroom, and Mavis Thompson, Bend, Helen's roommate in Concord, California, where the two laught last year.
