

Idaho Man Claims Bride From Yreka, Couple Moves To Burley To Make Home

YREKA—Baskets of mixed blue and white flowers flanking a decorated archway created the setting for the double-ring ceremony, which united Norma Lee Urbach and Jack Kinyon in marriage.

Norma Lee, daughter of Mrs. George Wacker of Yreka, and Lloyd Urbach of Culver, Oregon, and Jack, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Kinyon of Castleford, Idaho, repeated their nuptial vows with the Rev. Warren H. McConnell of the First Methodist Church of Buhl, Idaho, officiating. The rites took place in the garden of the home of the bridegroom's parents on Sunday morning, August 10.

The bride, given in marriage by her stepfather, George Wacker of Yreka, wore an original gown of white silk organza, fashioned with a sweetheart neckline of Chantilly lace, embroidered with iridescent sequins and seed pearls. The design was repeated in the center front of the floor-length bouffant skirt. A tiara of iridescent sequins and seed pearls held her fingertip length veil of French illusion in place. Her jewelry was a love-drop pearl necklace, a gift from the bridegroom. She carried a white prayerbook, centered with a cascade arrangement of salmon colored gladioli with pearl trimmed leaves, tied with white satin streamers.

Matron of honor, Mrs. J. Wray Hodgen, and bridesmaids, Dorothy Smith and Marilyn Siriani, all of Yreka, wore identical gowns of blue embroidered organza, styled with ballerina length skirts, with accordion pleated center front net over taffeta in the full skirts. Completing the table appointments were white spiral tapers in crystal holders, set in circles of blue net; a crystal punch bowl and a silver coffee service.

Serving the cake, coffee and punch, were three aunts of the bridegroom, Mrs. Bob Kinyon, Mrs. B. P. Johnson and Mrs. Guy Kinyon. Assisting with the serving was Kay Conrade, a cousin of the bridegroom. Presiding at the guest book was Grace Kinyon, another cousin of the bridegroom.
