

Judging Plan Set For Show

The program of judging for the AKC licensed all-breed dog show will be held on Saturday at Klamath County Fairgrounds in an announced today by Kathy McDonald, president of Klamath Dog Fanciers, Inc., sponsoring organization.

The doors will open at 8 a.m. Judging will start at 9 a.m. in Ring No. 2, with Vincent Perry judging 28 boxers, nine bulldogs, 10 Boston terriers, three great danes, eight samoyeds and three sheltland sheepdogs.

At the same time, in Ring No. 3, Lewis H. Starkey will decide on the competitive merits, per breed, of nine basenjis, six basenjis, eight dachshunds, 17 dachshunds and nine Norwegian elkhounds. In his ring also there will be one whippet, one greyhound and one Rhodesian ridgeback.

At 11 a.m. in Ring No. 1, Kyle Onstott will judge four airedale terriers, two Bedlington terriers, one wire fox terrier, eight Kerry blue terriers, eight Scottish terriers, two West Highland white terriers, one Staffordshire terrier and nine miniature schnauzers.

Judging will resume at 1 p.m. with Ring No. 2 presenting three collies, five smooth collies, 10 doberman pinschers, 27 German shepherds, one Alaskan malamute, one standard schnauzer, three St. Bernards, nine miniature poodles, one chow, one Keeshond, one standard poodle, 11 Lhasa apsos and seven Dalmatians.

In Ring No. 3, there will be 11 Afghan hounds, three long coated Chihuahuas, five Chihuahuas, one Brussels griffon, five maltese, 19 pekingese, nine miniature pinschers, 13 pomeranians, 13 toy poodles, six pugs, two toy Manchester terriers and four Yorkshire terriers.

At 1:30 p.m. in Ring No. 1 judging will start on five pointers, eight German short-haired pointers, two Chesapeake Bay retrievers, six golden retrievers, six Labrador retrievers, one English setter, seven Irish setters, nine black cockers, seven Ascoch cockers, eight parti-colored cockers, seven springer spaniels and 13 weimaraners.

Variety groups will follow immediately after the conclusion of the breed judging.

Safety Check Slows Trucks

DUNSMUIR — Some 50 trucks were sidelined during a five-day truck check conducted just north of here by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

An around-the-clock inspection of all southbound trucks was held from Monday through Friday of last week. Those with serious mechanical defects were sidelined with ICC stickers until repaired. Minor infractions of safety requirements were given citations by the California Highway Patrol.

Howard O. Gaston, ICC district supervisor, who directed the check said there has been noticeable improvement in safety standards of trucks since the last time a safety check was held in Dunsmuir last fall.

"These safety checks are beneficial to the carriers as well as to the public," Gaston said. Six ICC men, supervisors and a safety engineer from two districts covering six western states, participated in the check. A specially assigned team of nine CHP men assisted them.

Truck traffic was light because of the truck strike but approximately 150 trucks were checked each day. These were primarily independent operators and strike-exempt carriers, Gaston said.

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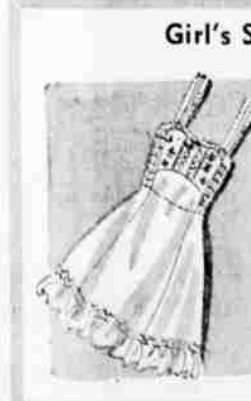
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
