Mayzell Rejoins OTI Club

Hunsaker announced Mayzell called him and said he would be here for the first day of football practice September 8.

Hunsaker had not expected Mayzell to return since he graduated from OTI's surveying school last spring. But the Owl football veteran has decided to enroll in highway technology this fall to bolster his surveying education.

Mayzell, who stands 5-11 and weighs 195 pounds, gives Hunsaker and Owl line coach George Miller 10 returning linemen with previous experience. Mayzell is the second letterman center slated to be back this fall, joining sophomore Ralph Norgaard.

The other OTI line vets will include all-conference guards Allan Jones and Frank Wilson, tackles Jack Bitzer, Ralph Jones and Dick Hill, ends Dale McCulloch and Norman Hooper and guard Gary Wirth.

Hunsaker was also pleased to hear that with Mayzell will probably be three or four highly sought-after Pennsylvania prep standouts. Mayzell is from Clifton, Pa. Another Clifton grad, who will be returning to the Owl campus this fall is halfback Al "Tiger" Everson.

Rodgers Has PCL Bat Lead

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Andre Rodgers of Phoenix skidded 22 points last week but retained his leadership in the Pacific Coast League batting race with a 3.65 average.

Portland's George Freese, although held to one home run over that span, raised his total to 30 and moved one ahead of Rodgers in the battle for that honor.

Dusty Rhodes, Rodgers' teammate, stayed on top for most runs batted in with 94 while Salt Lake's Carlos Bernier led in hits. The Puerto Rican has rapped out 163 through Aug. 24.

George Bamberg, the veteran right-hander at Vancouver, led the pitchers both in wins and earned run averages.

The New York Giant of a decade ago had a 13-9 record to go with a line 2.36 earned run mark which stamped him as the class of the circuit.

should expand to 10 teams with Toronto, Montreal, Houston and Minneapolis being possible additions.

"If a team must move, it should move," said Veeck. "But if I took over at Cleveland, I'd do everything within my power to keep the team there. Those people were too good to me to be deserted."

Veeck said that when he was president of the Indians they drew 2,620,627 for a major league attendance record in 1948. The next year with a fourth-place club they drew over 2,300,000 and once with a seventh-place club they drew over 1,100,000.

"Those people must still be there," said Veeck. "I can't believe they cannot be brought back."

Veeck and his associates made a bid for the Indians last spring but were turned down. Cleveland drew only 722,256 last year and will probably finish with less this year.

When rumors circulated that the Cleveland franchise might be shifted, Veeck again appeared on the scene. "We didn't make a bid this time," he said, "but that does not mean we're not interested."

Cleveland Board Chairman William R. Daley has stated the Indians are not for sale. He also has said he wants to keep the team in Ohio — if the fans support it.

Top Tennis Stars Slated For HN Meet

Bill Rose, the University of Portland flash, is the only player so far to have been seeded. Rose is the No. 1 man, being the defending champion.

Doyle is the state junior champion while Miss Peterson teamed with Rose last year to win the mixed doubles crown.

LL Champions Pay Visit To Campanella

NEW YORK (UPI)—Baseball's Little League champions from Monterey, Mexico, aren't likely to forget their visit with one of Monterey's all-time sports heroes — Roy Campanella.

Years ago the fathers of the kids from "south of the border" roared with delight when Campanella slugged homers for the Monterey team in a Mexican league back in the days before Campy joined the Brooklyn Dodgers and became one of the most famous catchers of all time.

So the kids knew all about Campy from the stories their fathers told, and were looking forward to visiting him.

Campy met them at the NYU-Bellevue Medical Center where he is waging his battle to overcome the paralysis that has gripped much of his body since he suffered a broken neck in an auto accident last January. He was sitting in a wheelchair.

Campanella, who learned to speak Spanish in his Mexican league days, talked with the boys in their own language. He asked them about all the homers they hit and he told pitcher Hector Torres he remembered playing ball with his father — "He could have made the major leagues."

The kids left quietly when the visit was over. They were just as impressed by Campy as their dads were — but for a different reason.

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Cardinals Whip Pirates

Braves Dump Giants, 6-1

So the Milwaukee Braves can't beat the also-ran Los Angeles Dodgers, but then whipped the Giants in the opener of a "show-down" five-game series at San Francisco 8-5 in 10 innings Sunday. Last night they did it again, rapping the Giants 6-1 behind Warren Spahn, who shrugged off a sore throat and won his 17th of the year — first on the West Coast.

The Dodgers have belittled the Braves and left them looking as though they could be had. Instead, they've spanked the second-place Giants and romped off with eight-game leads in the National League pennant chase.

Just last week they dropped four of five to the fourth-place Dodgers, but then whipped the Giants in the opener of a "show-down" five-game series at San Francisco 8-5 in 10 innings Sunday. Last night they did it again, rapping the Giants 6-1 behind Warren Spahn, who shrugged off a sore throat and won his 17th of the year — first on the West Coast.

The Dodgers retained fourth, coming from behind for a 4-2 victory over Cincinnati, and St. Louis whipped Pittsburgh 7-1 in the only other NL games scheduled.

In the American League, the New York Yankees retained a 12½-game spread as Baltimore defeated the second-place Chicago White Sox 6-5. Washington clipped Cleveland 5-4.

The Braves, who have won only 7 of 20 from the Dodgers, now stand 13½ over the Giants. Spahn backed up by a five-run second inning, tossed a five-hitter. He had a one-hit shutout until the fifth

while matching Pittsburgh's Bob Friend as the NL's top winner. The Giants scored on Willie Mays' infield single after a single by Daryl Spencer and two walks had loaded the bases.

The Braves sent nine men to the plate in the big second against loser Mike McCormick (9-7) and reliever Gordon Jones. Hank Aaron, Felix Mantilla, Andy Palao, Red Schoendienst and Ed Mathews singled and Joe Adcock doubled in the spurt, while the Giants clipped in an error.

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Baltimore Surge Puts Club In Reach Of Second Place

A week ago it figured that the Baltimore Orioles might have a shot at the first division in the American League standings. Now the Birds might even roost in second place.

The Orioles under Manager Paul Richards have won 15 of their last 19 games.

They wrestled Detroit for a share of fourth place by taking two of three from the Tigers. Then they beat Chicago 6-5 last night for a sweep of the two-game set with the second-place White Sox.

That left the Birds within three games of third place Boston and just four games shy of the White Sox while padding the edge over Detroit to a full game.

Washington defeated Cleveland 5-4 in the only other AL game scheduled yesterday.

In the National League, Milwaukee stretched its lead to eight games once more as the Braves rapped second place San Francisco 6-1. St. Louis defeated Pittsburgh 7-1 and Los Angeles beat Cincinnati 4-2.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — The food is good, discipline strict and hopes high as the Green Bay Packers prepare for the National Football League season under new head coach Ray (Scooter) McLean.

The Packers finished last in the NFL's Western Conference with a 3-9 record in 1957. The finish brought McLean, an assistant since 1951, out of the wings onto center stage as the fourth coach in the 40-year history of the team.

His assignment is to restore the lustre missing since the Packers won their last title in 1944. He said today it can be done.

McLean discounted a 3-0 exhibition loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers in a game played in a driving rain and thick mud in Milwaukee.

"I couldn't even see who the players were," he said. "It was a lousy night."

One of McLean's first orders were instructions for his linemen to learn to go both ways.

Among defensive specialists hearing down on offensive line assignments are linebackers Tom Bettis and Bill Forester and ends Jim Temp and Carlton Massey.

The strongest packer position is linebacker, Sam Palumbo and Ernie Danjean are available, along with three rookies, including Dan Currie of Michigan State.

The Orioles won the hard way last night, blowing a 5-1 lead before cracking a 5-all tie on Al Pihlak's pinch single in the sixth inning. They had built the early bulge in three innings against Sox starter Ray Moore on four walks and but four hits, including a two-run single by Brooks Robinson.

Rookie Milt Pappas (8-7) was the winner in relief after losing four in a row, but it was the mop-up relief of George Zaverink, ex-Indian Hoyt Wilhelm and Billy Loes — who combined for a two-hit shutout over the last three innings that put it away.

It was the fourth defeat in five games for the White Sox since they put together a seven-game winning string. Bob Shaw (5-3) lost this one, his first defeat in five decisions since going to Chicago in a June 13 trade with Detroit.
