Two television entertainers are slated to appear at the Old Armory Saturday night. They are Lorie and Larry Collins, known to millions of TV viewers as the Collins Kids.

Despite the fact that Larry is only 13 years of age, and Lorie only 16, they have already appeared together on many TV and radio shows, including those of Steve Allen, Arthur Godfrey, Perry Como and Bob Crosby, as well as Circus Time, Grand Ole Opry and Red Foley's Country Music Jubilee. They have recorded a total of 18 songs, all of which they wrote themselves.

Lorie is a singer, dancer, pianist and mandolin player. Larry plays the guitar, bass fiddle, violin, mandolin, trumpet, piano and banjo; however, it is his dancing while playing that delights the audience most.

Baldy Evans, who is sponsoring the local appearance of Larry and Lorie, says that they will make several appearances Saturday night at the armory, and will also "sit in" with the band many times during the evening. They carry their own drummer, who was a featured member of Horace Heidt's show, with their act.

The dance music Saturday night will be furnished by Sunny Burgess and the pacers. This is the same band that furnished the fine dance music for Johnny Cash on his appearance here June 25.

The dance will take place from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.

The caravan will leave the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce at 7 a.m. and the south entrance to Crater Lake Park at 8:30 a.m., proceed to Castle Crest wild flower gardens, Vidua Falls, Kerr Notch and other viewpoints around Crater Lake, then to Diamond Lake, and return by way of the Rogue River, Union Creek and Fort Klamath.

Group leader will be Ken McLeod. The trek is open to all persons interested in nature. The only charge will be \$1 entrance fee into Crater Lake Park. Take lunch, field glasses and bird books.

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Cariboo Country Special Entrains Through Klamath

The 1958 Cariboo Country Special train passed through Klamath Falls Saturday night, 16 hours out of San Francisco on a rail "cruise" that will take it as far north as Prince Rupert, British Columbia, before it arrives back in the Bay Area on Labor Day.

Such "specials" are the only passenger trains that ever operate over the Great Northern through Klamath Falls.

Author Depicts President As Weak, Indecisive Chief

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower is portrayed by the author of a new book as a weak and indecisive chief executive who has failed to use his powers to deal with various problems.

Marquis Childs, Washington correspondent for the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and United Features Syndicate columnist, is sharply critical of the President in the book, "Eisenhower: Captive Hero."

The tenor of the book is indicated by its subtitle: "A critical study of the General and the President." Childs, who has covered the national scene for years, writes that Eisenhower "must be put down as a weak president... for his failure to use the powers of the office."

Eisenhower's handling of the Little Rock school integration, recession and post-Sputnik problems were credited with resulting in a national attitude of "unease and embarrassment even" toward the President and his administration.

PRISONER OF OFFICE

"He appeared more and more as a prisoner of his office, a captive of his own indecisiveness, a captive of the hero-worshipping public, a captive of the agonizing dilemma of an era of nuclear annihilation in which man's old savage instincts lay close to the fragile surface of law and order," Childs said.

Eisenhower's prestige "had all but vanished" in Western Europe where it meets the Great Northern.

Last year's was the first passenger train from the United States ever to operate over the scenic, newly-completed line of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, which serves the Province of British Columbia from Vancouver to Prince George, and is owned by the provincial government.

This year, the special's schedule has been extended to include a run from Prince George to Prince Rupert over the Canadian National Railway, with a side trip to the new city of Kitimat, built by the Aluminum Company of Canada and served by a 40-mile branch line of the Canadian National in northwestern British Columbia.

Thirteen cars, bearing 138 paying passengers, make up this train, designed for sightseeing "off the beaten track," which will have traveled 4,100 miles over the lines of six different companies before returning to San Francisco.

The train carries all types of Pullman accommodations, two next Sunday.

Composer Dies

LONDON (AP)—Ralph Vaughan-Williams, dean of British composers, died early today. He was 83.

Vaughan-Williams, one of the 20th century's leading composers, was writing music at his London home up to Monday.

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Car Worker Gets Whopping Big Jobless Check
