VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—Four golfers — two of them Canadians — shared the lead as the \$42,000 British Columbia Centennial golf tournament entered its second round Friday.

The international quartet sharing the honors after Thursday's 18 holes was composed of Jerry Magee and Al Bolding of Toronto, Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Tex., and Koichi Ono from Yokohama, Japan.

Some of the big names in tournament golf were breathing down the leaders' necks. Among the 11 who posted 69s Thursday were Dow Finsterwald, Gene Littler, Mike Fetcheck, Jim Ferree, Doug Sanders, Porky Oliver, Frank Stranahan, Howie Johnson, Mike Souchak, Art Wall and Don Whit.

Ten golfers were two strokes back at 70 and 13 had 71 going into Friday's second round. In all, 50 of the starting field of 116 broke or equalled the 72 par on the 6,565-yard Point Gray Course.

Seven thousand persons watched the tournament Thursday. Those following Hawkins had a real thrill on the eighth and ninth holes when the Texan got himself out of seemingly impossible situations by switching to left-handed golf.

Discovery, who made his mark as a racer and stallion, was put to death Thursday after a lingering illness. He was 27 years old — an age comparable to about 100 years with humans.

Purchased for \$25,000 by Vanderbilt as a two-year-old in 1933, Discovery set two world records during his racing career. He won 27 of 63 starts and finished out of the money only 16 times.

Detroit On Prowl For Victim

The Lions, 1947 champions, meet the New York Giants, 1956 titleholders, at Detroit in one of the three scheduled night games.

Although they lost to Philadelphia and tied the Chicago Cards, the Colts have rolled up 59 points, only 10-less than the Rams.

The Chicago Bears, also winner of two, meet the Steelers at Pittsburgh Saturday and the 49ers entertain the Chicago Cards at San Francisco Sunday to round out the weekend schedule.

Favorites Win, Lose In Valley

MEDFORD (AP)—Upsets featured the opening of match play Thursday at the 30th annual Southern Oregon Golf Tournament, but other favorites continued into the second round today.

At Santa Maria de Chico, Calif., surprised Dr. Robert Buck, the co-medalist from Medford, in the men's championship bracket. The match went to Santa Maria by a 1-up margin.

Alan Holmes, another Medford golfer and co-holder of the men's medal, managed to defeat Chuck Hunter of Tacoma, 3 and 2, in another upset. Hunter, 19, is a member of this year's Hudson Cup amateur team.

Still another surprise victim was Shirley Siegmund, the 19-year-old University of Oregon student who won the women's medal and was one of the favorites, Mrs. Maxine Hammond of Medford took an early lead and then held on to defeat Miss Siegmund, 2 and 1.

In the senior's division, Mary Clark of Grants Pass remained the heavy favorite by tripping Frank Corsetti, Napa, Calif., 4 and 3. Clark is the senior medalist and defending champion.

The other defending men's champion is Phil Getchell of Medford, a divinity student just returned from missionary work in Central America.

Getchell, whose game was a mite rusty in an earlier round at Portland, showed his old form in beating Carl Bennett of Grants Pass, 6 and 5.

One of the best Thursday rounds belonged to Jerry Cundari, 18-year-old Portlander who qualified recently for the National Amateur tournament. Cundari shot one-under-par golf in defeating Bob Phillips of Medford, 7 and 6.

Other women favorites escaped Miss Siegmund's fate and won their opening matches. Sue DeVoe of Medford defeated Freda Peters, Arcata, Calif., 2 and 1, and Miss Porritt downed Elsa Spence, Arcata, 5 and 4.
