



Shakespearean Festival Slates Last Performances

ASHLAND—The final round of all four plays began Labor Day at the Oregon Shakespearean Festival in Ashland. "Troilus and Cressida" was given its farewell performance on Monday, September 1. On Tuesday "Much Ado About Nothing" concludes its run, and on Wednesday "King Lear" ends, and on Thursday, September 4, "The Merchant of Venice"—and the 1953 season at America's First Elizabethan Theater—reaches its finale.

Fair Queen Is Crowned

A glittering, golden crown was placed atop the tresses of Susan Perry, 1953 queen of the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fair which officially opens at the Tulelake Fairgrounds Friday night, September 5.

Susan, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Perry, Coppock Bay homesteaders, was sponsored by the Newell Grain Growers. She is 16 years old, a junior at Tulelake High School and this year's cheer leader. She is active in the Tulelake Assembly, Order of the Rainbow for Girls, and has been active also in 4-H Club work for four years. She is a member of the Tulelake Horsemen's Association and was basketball queen in her freshman year.

The new monarch, named during the Labor Day Dance sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Tulelake Post, which sponsors the queen contest each year, was crowned by another Queen Susan, Susan Sura, the 1952 monarch.

The new crown, encrusted with rhinestones and other jewels, was made by Mrs. Emil Roder, sister of Mrs. Max Rozum, president of the auxiliary of the Tulelake VFW.

West Oregon Set For Rain

There's a touch of fall in the air. It was freezing early this morning in some scattered Eastern Oregon areas.

Rain is heading for Western Oregon.

The Weather Bureau in Portland said a weak high "pressure ridge" is moving over Washington and Oregon, bringing generally fair weather. Right behind it, though, is a vigorous storm moving eastward out of the Gulf of Alaska. This storm will bring rain to Oregon's coast by noon Wednesday and into the northwest interior by afternoon.

Bend reported the state's lowest temperature, 30 degrees, this morning.

It was the first time this fall that any station had reported a below-freezing temperature.

Everywhere in the state, temperatures dropped off from the high marks of recent days. Grants Pass, where it had been 95 Sunday, had a top of 84 Monday.

Although there have been bits of rain here and there recently, none has been substantial. Since June 30, Portland's total has been only .03 of an inch.

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Police Report Arms Charge Jails Suspect

City police are now holding on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, a man whom they have long suspected of carrying a gun—but a man whom they never before have been able to accuse.

The suspect is Raymond Hoover, 26, 1937 Wantland Street, now in the city jail. The police officer who arrested him is Floyd Pierce.

Pierce said he found a car double parked in front of the Tavern on South Seventh Street at 2:25 a.m. Saturday. Two men were on the street talking with the driver. Pierce said he focused his spotlight on the car, the men backed away, and the car drove off.

From that point, according to Pierce's report, this happened:

The men identified themselves as Felipe Carrillo Martinez and Hipolito Ramos, both of Weyerhaeuser Camp No. 9 at Beatty. They said the driver of the car held a gun on them while accusing them of giving a girl in the car a "bad time."

Pierce called two other police cars and started after the suspect's car, which he stopped in front of Basin Motors, 424 South Sixth Street.

In the car were Hoover, the driver, and four passengers who identified themselves as Patsy Hoover, Mrs. Charles Hood Jr., Irvin Weiser Jr. and Randolph Tupper.

Pierce ordered them out of the car. All moved but Patsy Hoover. Pierce again ordered her out, and found the .38 revolver on the seat where she was sitting.

Hoover was charged with carrying a concealed weapon and Weiser was charged with vagrancy, both scheduled for hearing in municipal court Tuesday.

Errant Check Seeks Owner
Anybody seen a check for \$250 looking for its owner?

There is such a thing, city police reported Tuesday. It's one of the problems police were confronted with over the long holiday weekend.

Mrs. Helen Skok of Tempe, Arizona, told officers she had lost her purse containing the check and \$15 in currency somewhere in Klamath Falls Sunday morning.

She and her husband were driving through town, stopped for gasoline, breakfast, and church, and discovered the loss before leaving the city.

Katherine Antonette Sigovich reported hitting a water hydrant at Ninth and Main streets at 11:15 p.m. Sunday, apparently after a brake failure. No citations were issued in either accident.

At 10:30 p.m. Friday Jean Coleman told police that a friend, Joy Tyler, 234 North Third Street, was bitten by a dog owned by Judge D. R. Vandenberg, 237 Washington Street, half an hour earlier that evening. Police called David Vandenberg Jr., who locked the dog in the basement. His parents were out of town, he said.

Star Takes Pill Overdose
NEW YORK (AP) — Actress Suzy Parker was detained at a hospital for several hours last night suffering from what police said was an overdose of a sedative.

Miss Parker entered the Hospital for Special Surgery under the name of Cecilia Ford.

Her condition was not regarded as serious and she left early today with her husband for their East Side apartment.

Paul O'Dwyer, the actress' lawyer, said she must have taken the pills by mistake. Her medicine cabinet, he explained, is stocked with assorted pills as a result of her recent accident.

Youth Injured During Practice
September's most unlikely accident seems already to have occurred, judging from a state police report on the accidental shooting of Larry Lee Horstman, 18, 1021 Mitchell Street.

Larry told police that he and two companions were practicing shooting at targets in the hills near OTI Monday afternoon.

Police said that Larry told them that when he had finished shooting from a seated position, he remained seated and, putting his .22 revolver on safety, set it on a rock. The gun then went off and shot Larry in the right foot.

Larry was reportedly "doing fine" at Klamath Valley Hospital Tuesday morning.

The revolver was loaded with bird shot; just a cartridge, not a crock.

Miller and his wife own a home in Mount Hebron, but maintained an apartment in Weed while employed there. Crew members presented him with a fishing reel when he stepped off the Weed switch engine on his last run August 20.

Identity of the person perpetrating the latest desecration is known, and Mrs. Gale reports that any further damage to the grave will result in immediate prosecution.

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The California State Fair, at the half-way point in its 12-day run, paid tribute today to the state's wine industry.

The tribute took the form of a Wine Institute luncheon, where California's leading vintners were to dine together and sample their competitors' wares.

A vintage queen was to receive a crown of grapes and grape leaves at the luncheon from Mrs. Virginia Knight, wife of the governor.

Modesto, San Jose and Trinity County also had the day set aside in their honor today at the fair.

A total of 85,346 visitors went through the turnstiles Monday, a drop of 12,280 from last year's Labor Day crowd. Fair officials said attendance at the midway point was 140 persons above that of 1952.

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Dog Fanciers Hold Biggest Show To Date

The Klamath Dog Fanciers' ninth annual all-breed, American Kennel Club licensed dog show was their largest show to date, according to Kathy McDonald, president of the local dog club.

Only two dogs of the 407 entered by the August 18 deadline failed to show and there were several new classifications this year.

Best of show went to the Scottish Terrier entered by Carnation Farms, the Albers Milling Company kennels at Carnation, Washington. He is an English, Canadian and American champion and was handled by Bob Bartos, manager of the kennels. The dog's registered name is Westpark Derriford Baffie and he has taken best of show 32 times out of the 46 times he has been entered in American dog shows.

Best of local went to Mrs. Tom Grigsby's miniature Schnauzer, Pan Peter Petard, who was shown by Mrs. Grigsby this year for the first time.

Trophies were awarded in all classes, but the ribbons which had been ordered for the show went down in a plane crash in California and new ribbons could not be secured in time for Saturday's show. Betty Allen, secretary of Klamath Dog Fanciers, Inc., will mail ribbons to all winners as soon as the ribbons are received.

Woman Saved In Keno Fire
Good luck brought helpful assistance to a 78-year-old invalid Saturday morning, when the one story frame house in which she lived alone caught fire and burned to the ground in a matter of minutes.

Josephine S. Snowgoose, 78, was cooking in her home on the Keno Road, when the fire was started by the kitchen stove, probably due to a defective flue.

Mrs. Snowgoose went in her wheelchair to the telephone and attempted to phone the fire department. However, she could not get the phone to work, and had to choose but to try to leave the house.

Meanwhile, five persons had noticed the fire. These included three sons of Mr. and Mrs. Merle W. Anderson, Keno. The Andersons, Don, 22, Kenny, 12, and Davy, 10, knew Mrs. Snowgoose well, and sometimes ran errands for her. When the fire started, they were working in a field in full view of the house.

Also in a position to see the fire were Lane A. Smith, Keno, and his grown son, Lane Jr., of 2800 Green Springs Drive, the latter a volunteer member of the Stewart Lenox Fire Department. They were cutting wood near the Klamath River, and were thus able to see the back of the house, where the fire began.

Both the Andersons and the Smiths reached the house. They were not only able to help Mrs. Snowgoose out, but were also able to save a few of her belongings.

The elderly woman was unhurt. The house was gone before the county fire engine arrived on the scene. A water tanker from Lincon and Borrell, logging contractors, helped put out the embers, but a machine from the OTI Fire Department was not needed.

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Irate Neighbor Shoots Canine

G. M. Grant of 1521 McClellan Drive owns a dog — a valuable German dog called a Weimaraner. One of Grant's neighbors accused the dog of digging up his yard.

The neighbor was angry. The digging continued, and so did the neighbor's wrath. Until one day last week the neighbor, an archer by avocation, took bow and arrow in hand and shot the dog in the side, Grants said.

The dog was wounded, but not killed. Grant said it was at a veterinary hospital and was expected to live.

Injured Youth Returned Home
WEED—Jerry Lane, 13-year-old Concord youth, whose bicycle collided with a pickup truck August 22, was returned to the home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Cedro Serna, this week from the Mount Shasta Community Hospital where he was treated for his injuries.

The collision occurred at the intersection of Morris and Pine streets in Angel Valley. The bicycle was traveling west on Pine and the pickup truck driven by Fred Chiment, Mount Shasta, was traveling north on Morris. The truck struck the cyclist head on and threw the boy approximately 20 feet and he wrapped around a three-foot high fire standard along the roadside as he landed.

The truck driver was cited by Weed Police Chief David Dawson for failure to yield the right of way and for speeding in a 15 mile zone. The truck's speed was estimated at approximately 35 mph.
