Captain Booth started his career 20 years ago as an officer on the Oakland Bay Bridge. He served as a staff instructor at the Highway Patrol Academy in Sacramento from 1954 through 1956. He has previously spent tours of duty in Santa Cruz, Orange and San Mateo counties. Booth served three years with the Army during World War II.

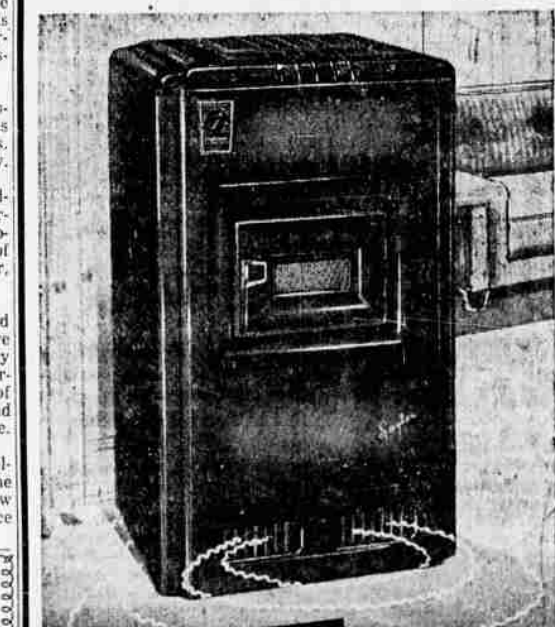
The Booths have a daughter, 23, and a grandson, residing in Seattle.

POOL OPEN

The municipal pool will be open for the next two weeks for swimming from 1 p.m. until 9 p.m., if the weather continues to be good. So far this season, there have been 68,543 swimmers registered, which tops the best year so far, 1955, which saw 68,482 at the end of the year. Ella Redkey, manager of the pool, states that 2,260 people took the swim lessons this summer. There were 12 weeks of lessons, each of 10 days duration.

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Coin, Stamp Meet Slated

The next meeting of the Klamath Stamp and Coin Club will be held Thursday, September 4, at 8 p.m. in the YMCA. Visitors are welcome. President of the club is Maurice Miller.

The last club meeting was August 20. Among the items on display was a set of "bingles" or tokens from the 49th state, Alaska. These tokens were issued by the United States for use by the settlers in the Matanuska Valley of Alaska, in 1935. The set consists of \$10 and \$5 in brass, and \$1, 50 cents, 25 cents, 10 cents, five cents and one cent in aluminum. They were ordered by, and minted for, the Matanuska Valley Colonization Project—ARRC (Alaska Rural Rehabilitation Corporation)—which represented the federal government in the unique colonization plan which settled the Matanuska Valley.

About 1,000 sets were issued and used about one year, then recalled. All but about 250 sets were then destroyed. Where the name "bingles" for these tokens came from is not known, but it is known that one of the foremost and best loved preachers in the valley at that time was named Bingle.
