

Oregon Solon Seeks Meet

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. Morse (D-Ore) repeated Thursday his call for a special session of Congress.

He said it should be convened at once "to check both President Eisenhower and Dulles in the exercise of their foreign policy of brinkmanship."

Morse issued the statement after the President and Secretary of State Dulles warned Red China of possible United States military action in defense of Formosa.

"It is time," said Morse, "for Eisenhower to get off the golf course and back into the White House and give full-time consideration to a crisis that is of vital importance to the peace of the world. He should call the congressional leaders to the White House immediately for a conference, and then call a special session of the Congress at the same time."

The President, said Morse, "should now lay the entire Formosa crisis before the United Nations."

Morse said he is "convinced that this crisis does threaten peace and under the United Nations charter it's the clear duty of belligerent nations to present to the United Nations the issues that threaten world peace."

"As to Quemoy and the Matsu, the United Nations had no international law rights to protect the Nationalist Chinese on those islands. If we do, we will be branded an aggressor nation and rightly so."

The Oregon senator referred to a statement on Formosa by Sen. Ronald M. Smoot, saying "it's a shocking thing that the American people are informed by a Navy admiral in regard to what our foreign policy is going to be in the Formosa straits."

"Under the constitution," Morse said, "the commander in chief happens to be the President of the United States and we have the right to look to him for a clear, unambiguous, unequivocal statement about our foreign policy in the Formosa straits."

Lumber Union Makes Threat

PORTLAND (AP)—The strike of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union against Northwest lumber operators will be extended, the union warned Thursday.

Earl Hartley, executive secretary of the union's Western council, said more plants will be hit "but we won't say which one at this time."

The union Thursday struck five Oregon and Washington lumber plants in support of demands for a 31-cent hourly package wage increase.

Negotiations ended Wednesday after the union had turned down an offer of an hourly pay boost ranging from 2 to 10 cents over a two-year period.

Hartley said the strike so far has affected some 2,000 of the 50,000 union members.

Meanwhile, the chief employers' negotiator, Walter Durham Jr., Portland, said his group has not decided whether to shut down all mills in retaliation for the union's strike against the five plants.

The other large union in the lumber industry, the International Woodworkers of America, said at the same time that it will resume talks with some operators next Tuesday.

Last May, the IWA decided to renew its contract for one year with a wage reopening this month.

Harvey Nelson, chairman of the IWA Northwest Policy Committee said that economic conditions in the lumber industry had improved to an extent where the union felt it was reasonable to seek a 25-cent hourly pay increase.

Assessor's Meeting Set

BURNS (AP)—The Oregon Assn. of County Assessors today discusses Portland's controversial assessment program.

That program calls for assessment at 100 per cent of true cash value.

The assessors also will discuss timber assessments as they consider their annual meeting here.

Delegates Thursday heard State Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D-Mil-waukee) ask for an end to disputes between county assessors and the Oregon Tax Commission.

Sweetland said the conflicts have "damaged the state's tax program and delayed by several years the operation of state-wide reappraisal in many Oregon counties."

Damage Action Filed By Tutor

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP)—Miss Jimmie C. Parker, a large schoolteacher, filed a \$35,000 damage suit in Circuit Court against Morton Plant Hospital and Dr. John D. Haggood.

The suit said Miss Parker entered the hospital for removal of an ingrown toenail and through negligence and carelessness she was placed in an operating room as Haggood entered to perform surgery in another case, and that the physician thereupon operated on Miss Parker's right breast.

Haggood and hospital authorities declined comment.

detect something phony in Red China's noise over the Chinese offshore islands.

If Peiping has taken it upon itself to raise a real threat of war in the Formosa Strait, the American response will give Communist China's allies, the Soviets, some food for serious thought.

There are aspects in the Far East developments indicating that the Red Chinese are just as interested in prodding the Soviets as they are in challenging the United States.

By drawing a line around the islands with their declaration of a 12-mile territorial sea limit, the Chinese have presented the Soviets with a problem. The Chinese purport to say that any American defense of the offshore islands is, in effect, invasion of Red China territory and direct aggression.

This sharply reminds the Soviets of their treaty commitments. Soviet propaganda has been saying Moscow is ready to spring to Peiping's aid "if" there is aggression. The Red Chinese now are saying American military help to Nationalist China actually is aggression.

It's highly doubtful that the U.S. with Peiping sitting in as a great S.R. wants to be dragged into a world war situation now. Peiping seems to be reminding the Kremlin that the Red Chinese have the power to bring this about.

Washington's response—that the United States is prepared to use timely and effective force, if necessary, to save islands essential to Formosa's defense—tells both the Soviets and the Red Chinese they run a risk of starting World War III.

In the long run, U.S. policy probably will be unable to save Formosa from being taken over by the Red Chinese. The political task becomes more difficult each day, and even Peiping itself seems to have reflected an awareness that Formosa someday will fall to the mainland Chinese without military force or the risk of war.

But perhaps the Red Chinese would like to hasten this process. Thus it is highly possible Red China is engaging in a bit of disguised blackmail—against the Soviets. The Red Chinese may hope the upshot of all this hullabaloo over the islands will be a summit conference, at Soviet insistence,

with Peiping sitting in as a great S.R. wants to be dragged into a world war situation now. Peiping seems to be reminding the Kremlin that the Red Chinese have the power to bring this about.

Peiping may see its attendance at a summit conference as a first step toward winning Formosa. The next logical step would be the ouster of Nationalist China from the United Nations and a stampede of diplomatic recognition for Peiping.

The Soviets, for all their loud propaganda, never seemed too anxious to have the Red Chinese free-wheeling in world councils and posing as the great power of Asia. They have dragged their feet in the business of pushing for a Peiping seat in the United Nations. The Red Chinese now may be giving them the shock treatment.

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
