Dean Named At Ore-Tech

New dean of women at Oregon Technical Institute is Shirley Ann Brusoe, according to announcement by Winston D. Purvine, OTI director.

Miss Brusoe calls Washington, D.C. her home and joined the Oregon Tech staff on August 22 to succeed Virginia Kempston, who resigned at the end of the 1958 school year.

Miss Brusoe holds a B.S. degree in education from Oshkosh State College, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, and comes to Oregon Tech from Canyonville High School where she acted as counselor for girls in addition to teaching English, history and physical education. Prior to her arrival in Oregon, she taught in Colorado public schools.

The new staff member will supervise the women's dormitory housemother, serve as adviser to the Associated Women Students, to various other student organizations and groups on the campus and will do general student counseling in the area of personal, school or social problems.

Ad Campaign Is Outlined

DUNSMUIR—"There is only one way to attract business and that is to advertise," Jim Noverr, Mount Shasta advertising man, told the Dunsmuir Chamber of Commerce at its last meeting.

Noverr outlined a direct mail and advertising campaign publicizing the recreational advantages of southern Siskiyou County. He told the chamber it will reach 10,000 people outside the region now served by local newspapers and radio stations. The chamber gave a vote of confidence to this project which will have to be financed through advertising solicitation of businessmen in the area.

Skip Schafer, advertising manager of the Dunsmuir News, told plans to distribute 3,500 publicity brochures using the Railroad Days layout minus the program features. The Dunsmuir fish map and other local tourist data will be incorporated in this brochure. A Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl brochure will also be released this month, Schafer said.

Impetus to plans to move the retired SP locomotive was discussed. About \$100 of the necessary \$800 for this project has been raised.

The chamber has been holding summer meetings in the city hall. Resumption of dinner meetings starting September 24 was approved. These will be held alternately at the Dunsmuir Hotel and the Travelers Hotel.

A recent study conducted by Dr. George Gallup, of the American Institute of Public Opinion, asked people what one section or feature of their newspaper they found most useful. Advertising headed the list.

MAJIN—The Order of the Arrow, a national Boy Scout camping society, will hold its annual area conference at Silver Creek Falls near Salem from September 5 to 7. "Brothers in Service—Leaders in Camping" will be the theme as approximately 150 scouts follow a three day program of Indian crafts, discussions and strenuous outdoor sports.

Don Stacey of Majin, lodge chief of the Makaula Lodge, will be in charge of the opening and closing ceremonies for this event. Supporting him will be approximately 20 scouts and Explorers from the Modoc Area Council.

"The conference, which will draw delegates from all of Oregon and Northern California, is expected to be one of the largest held in the state," asserts Dick Wyatt, Makaula Lodge adviser.

Featured speaker at the closing session will be Mark Hatfield, secretary of state.

The order was founded in 1915 at the Philadelphia scout camp, Treasure Island. In 1948 it was nationally integrated into the Boy Scouts of America. There are approximately 502 lodges active in the United States, with a total membership of around 100,000. Each one of these groups of honor campers is based upon the principles of brotherhood and cheerful service. Today the order acts as a service organization in every Oregon city.

Lumbermen Form Merger

WEED—Lumber and Sawmill Workers Unions of Yreka, Hilt and Weed Locals No. 2774, 2732 and 2907, respectively, have merged under one business head and will now negotiate as Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union Local 2907, with N. H. Blankenship, Weed, named chief executive officer and Lloyd Lea, Grenada, assistant.

In all, 1,400 members are affected by the consolidation and will strengthen their efforts in future negotiations.

Formerly the Yreka Local 2774 members included International Paper Company Long-Bell Division loggers, Fruit Growers Lumber Company loggers, all operations of Sharp Lumber Company, Yreka, Happy Camp Lumber Company, Happy Camp, and Associated Box and Dorris Lumber and Moulding of Dorris.

The Weed Local No. 2907 was workers of the IP Long-Bell Division Weed plant operations, and Hilt No. 2732 membership was the Fruit Growers Lumber Company plant operations at Hilt.

A 26-man executive board, seven Weed members and two each from the other merged contracts, will direct the new organization setup.

Blankenship did not comment on immediate future plans of widening the consolidation to include other contracts, but did state that there were several unorganized operations in Siskiyou County.

Enrollment Figures Up

TULELAKE—Enrollment in both the Tulelake high school and the Tulelake elementary school are up slightly over the 1957 figures. E. L. Coyner, high school principal, beginning his 11th year in the local school system, announces 181 students on the opening day, September 2.

Among new members of the faculty is Duane Payne, Alsea, Oregon, who coached the recent 1958 Shrine game at Pendleton. Payne will serve as head coach and will instruct in driver education.

Robert Williams, University of Nevada graduate, teacher last year at Sutter High School, Sacramento is the second new member of the staff. He will teach the social sciences.

Holdover faculty members and the subjects they teach include: LaVern Allen, music; Carroll Brown, English, Spanish; Verne Henstreet, math, shop and general science; Mrs. Dortha Brough, homemaking; Virginia Lindsay, social sciences and girls' physical ed; William Quinn, commercial; Bruce Ruffner, sciences; Leland Ruth, vocational agriculture and Dorothy Schupp, math.

New courses in advanced biology and senior math will be offered this year.

In the elementary building, kindergarten through the eighth grade, 368 students are enrolled, a gain of 67 over last year.

Arnold Torrigno, principal, announced one new teacher, James Monroe, Sacramento, added to the 11-member staff. An overflow class will be taught during the harvest season later in the fall.

County Court Makes Move To Cleanse Air Of Dust

Dust and dirt that filters through some sections of the South Suburban District these days has made its way, vicariously, into the chambers of the Klamath County Court.

So the court called in engineers of the South Suburban Sanitary District "to clear the air," as County Judge Charlie Mack put it. The court has been getting many complaints about dust, piles of dirt, removed road gravel and other inconveniences since the sanitary district began constructing sewer lines.

The engineers, District Secretary M. D. Gunderson and Job Superintendent Kenneth Nelson, said they've been getting complaints, too.

Gunderson and Nelson explained that construction means inconvenience—there is no way out of it. But, they assured, there will be an end to it.

Moreover, any damage done now, and damage is being held to a minimum, will be repaired. "People are going to have to put up with a certain amount of hardship during construction," Nelson said. "That's the way it is. But any damages will be taken care of."

Dust won't last forever, the court acknowledged, but how about complaints that gravel which residents bought themselves to place on public roads, but which the contractors removed to lay sewer lines?

"Gravel will be replaced—in many cases it has been replaced by the contractors," Gunderson said. And if it can't be replaced by the contractors, the sanitary district will do it.

How about wetting down some streets to settle dust? "Water won't settle it," Gunderson said. "Ten minutes later it would be dust again."

"We have an agreement with the court to replace, in as good or better condition as we found them, any public street whether it's a county road or not," Gunderson said.

He added that the district probably has worked most of the areas which would be most seriously affected—"not entirely, but largely."

Even so, the court agreed, there will be more complaints. In support of their statement that they "don't want to work a hardship on anybody permanently," Gunderson and Nelson said all complaints should go to them. They even volunteered the number. It is TU 2-5744.

Nelson, asked how long construction would continue, said it depended on the weather. "We're making every effort to get the job done as soon as possible. If we can, we'll work all winter."
