

Brewer, Boston Win; Senators Nip Yanks

Tom Brewer, one of the pitchers Boston hoped would provide a chance at the American League pennant, finally has come around to perk up the Red Sox' closing shot for second place.

The lean right-hander, just turned 27, didn't get started until after the All-Star game, when the Red Sox were already a dozen games behind first place New York. After winning 35 games in

1936-37, Brewer had won only three of 10 decisions for the first three months of the season.

Now, with the Sox running only a game and a half behind second place Chicago, Brewer has won six straight and seven of his last eight decisions.

Brewer padded his record to 11-10 Friday night, setting down Baltimore on four singles as Boston belted the Birds 10-2.

Washington blew a 3-0 lead, but beat the Yankees 6-3, the White Sox got past Cleveland 4-3 and Detroit rapped Kansas City 4-1 in the other AL games.

In the National League, rookie George Witt allowed but five hits as Pittsburgh defeated first place Milwaukee 1-0 in 10 innings. Los Angeles defeated St. Louis 2-1 and Cincinnati beat Philadelphia 8-4. San Francisco and the Chicago Cubs were rained out.

The Red Sox socked 14 hits while beating Jack Harshman (11-12). Pete Runnels, who regained the AL batting lead a .324, drove in three runs with a double and a single.

There might be a familiar name in the Oregon Tech football lineup this fall.

Don Frost, a 200-plus 6-4 tackle from Oregon City High School, has informed Rex Hunsaker he will be on hand when the Owls issue equipment Sunday afternoon and hold the first practice of the year Monday morning.

Frost is the younger brother of former Oregon Tech basketball star Bob Frost, another ex-Oregon City prep star.

Another standout name in the state's prep ranks is also expected to be on hand this afternoon for the first meeting of the OTI football squad. Troy Kooztz, a Brownsville High graduate, is among the prospects to greet Hunsaker.

Kooztz was a star football fullback at Brownsville besides being a stellar basketball and baseball player. Troy was moved to center in the recent class "B" shrine game and turned in a very creditable job. Troy stands just over the 6-foot mark and weighs 175 pounds.

While the local attention is focused on football, Oregon Tech basketball coach Wally Palmberg is looking for some basketball games.

The Owl mentor is looking for a weekend series at home December 12 and 13. Palmberg would also like to fill in a couple of games on the road December 19 and 20.

Wally has been attempting to lure some Northwest Conference schools into contract, but they have shied away from the Owls. And it hasn't been because of completed schedules since he tried last year and two years ago. It might be that Palmberg has put OTI "on the map" by winning two straight Oregon Collegiate Conference championships and this winter's outlook could even be better than in the past—and these other Northwest schools aren't interested in meeting Palmberg's club.

Pirate Youth Wins Second From Braves

PITTSBURGH (AP)—"I like to win them as they come," says right-handed pitcher George Witt of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

And when Milwaukee comes to town, he wins them. He beat the Braves 1-0 in 10 innings Friday night on the strength of Bill Virdon's ninth home run of the year. The victory moved the Pirates back into a second place tie with the San Francisco Giants. Both teams now trail the Braves by 8½ games.

Witt came off the bench after 10 days of inactivity to pitch his second straight shutout in his only two performances against the league-leading Braves. The victory also marked his sixth in a row this year.

Friday night's outing was the first for Witt since he suffered an inflammation of his right elbow Aug. 26.

Since then he has been taking heat pack treatments and was forced to miss two turns on the mound.

Witt's performance was typical for him against the Braves. He now has pitched 19 consecutive scoreless innings and given up only seven hits to the world champions.

Braves Blanked By Bucs

The Milwaukee Braves may have run away with the National League pennant, but they're getting no where fast against rookie right-hander George Witt of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The champs have had two runs with the kid from Laguna Beach, Calif., and haven't scored a run off him yet.

Witt, 24, became the first to hang two shutouts on the Braves this season, by beating Milwaukee 1-0 last night with a five-hitter and Bill Virdon's leadoff home run in the 10th inning.

Witt's only other work against the Braves was a two-hit, 10-0 shutout August 12.

By out-scraping Carl Willey, Witt hoisted the Bucs back into a second place tie with San Francisco, 8½ games behind the Braves. The Giants were idled by rain at Chicago.

Cincinnati rapped Philadelphia 8-4, and Los Angeles, held to three hits, defeated St. Louis 2-1 in the other NL games.

In the American League, Washington defeated first place New York 6-3; the Chicago White Sox beat Cleveland 4-3, Boston clobbered Baltimore 10-2 and Detroit knocked off Kansas City 4-1.
