LOS ANGELES (AP)—"Sure I style attack and didn't let up until the eighth. Referee Tommy Hart pulled him from the battered Aragon at 127 corner threw in a towel, traditional symbol of ring defeat.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (AP)—"We're going to give them the works."

That's the bold warning of U. S. Davis Cup Capt. Perry Jones, who today had an official list of 12 players from which he could pick a team for the long flight to Australia.

It was also a terribly optimistic statement, for not a single American was on the court here Saturday in the semifinals of the National Championships. Never before have the semifinals been an all foreign affair.

What's worse, three of today's four finalists are Aussie Cup team members.

"We're conceding nothing," said the 26-year-old Los Angeles tennis executive. "Thank goodness for Ham Richardson, Barry MacKay, Alex Olmedo and Don Kierbow."

Here's the 12-man preliminary cup squad: Earl Buchholz Jr. St. Louis; Chris Crawford, Piedmont, Calif.; John Douglas, Santa Monica, Calif.; John Cranston, Beverly Hills, Calif.; Sam Giammalva, Houston, Tex.; MacKay, Dayton, Ohio; Budge Patty, Los Angeles; Richardson, Arlington, Va.; Bill Quillian, Seattle, Wash.; Kierbow, Beverly Hills; Olmedo, of Peru; and Herbie Flam, Beverly Hills.

The squad will play in the Pacific Southwest Championships at Los Angeles, Jones' private tourney, starting Sept. 11, and the Pacific Coast Championships at San Francisco the following week. The final squad will be named afterward.

County 'B' Football New Situation Faces Mustang Grid Open

"We aren't overly optimistic about our chances this year but then we aren't a bit discouraged either," stated Malin High School coach George Hanson as his Mustangs moved into their second week of practice while awaiting their season opener with Merrill on September 19.

"Both the club and myself are eager to get started so we can see just how we will stack up this year. We have a sort of 'brand-new' situation at Malin but it is also the first time that a large portion of our team will be playing ball as regulars," Hanson went on.

Hanson, who replaced Jack McGoldrick as the head man of Malin athletics, is stepping into his first coaching job. The four returning lettermen, all juniors, include: Stan Stasny, 185; tackle: Rick Miller, 275; guard: 6-1, 145 pounder, who will fill an end only loss of the 1957 season to the slot: Randy Miller, 6-11, 130 pounds.

United States Cities Make Bid

CHICAGO (AP)—The United States Olympic Executive Committee announced Saturday night which of four American cities will receive approval to bid for the 1964 Olympics.

Vying for the right were Los Angeles, Chicago, Detroit and Minneapolis. The site selection committee met Friday night but refused to make any announcement until Saturday night when a news conference was held.

Regardless of which city is certified, there is no assurance that the United States will get the games.

U. Of Nevada Faces Loss Of Grid Play

RENO, Nev. (UPI)—The University of Nevada, which sparked briefly as a football power in the late 1940's, is in danger of folding this season as a member of a minor conference.

Only 31 players turned out for the first practice called by coach Gordon McEachern, and athletic director Art Broten said the team may have to drop out of the Far West Conference unless more players turn out when classes begin Wednesday.

Broten said two faculty committees had been formed to look into the situation and suggest remedies for the folding football team.

The committees, he added, would talk to students, "players, student body officials, and potential players" in an effort to combat what he termed a "Severe shortage of man-power to field a team."

Shortly after the war, Nevada made its bid as major power under coaches Jim Aiken and Joe Sheeketski, a former Notre Dame great. The team reached its peak in 1947-48, producing All-American quarterback Stan Heath, setting several offensive records, and playing in the now-defunct Harbor Bowl in San Diego against Villanova.

However, "big time football" proved to be a financial failure at Nevada and the sport was dropped in 1951. The school tried again on a limited scale in 1952 and then joined the Far West Conference, which prohibits giving athletic scholarships or subsidies.

Defending U.S. Champion Hillman Robbins of Memphis and ex-champ Harvie Ward Jr. of San Francisco were shaky.

Robbins and Ward shot a best-ball 80 in the morning, losing to Mexico's Ignacio Lopez Jr. and Enrique Farias Jr. 2 and 1 but winning over Canadian's Castor and Eric Hanson 2 up.

Robbins didn't play in the singles. Ward lost to 19-year-old Canadian Gary Cowan 3 and 2. Cowan also beat Mexico's Rafael Quiroz 7 and 6.

Oklahoma City's Charlie Cox, Rex Baxter of Amarillo, Texas, and team Capt. Billy Joe Patton, of Morgantown, N.C., also came out two-point winners in the singles.

Cox defeated Gordon Ball of Canada 6 and 4 and dropped Mexico's Lopez 4 and 3. Baxter beat Doug Buas of Canada 2 up and Mauricio Urdaneta of Mexico 2 and 1.

Yakima started the scoring in the second when Maury Lerner tripled home Herman Lewis, who had singled. Lerner scored on Pete Gonzales's sacrifice fly.

The Bears tallied again in the fourth on back-to-back doubles by Gonzales and Herb Anderson. Ted Rhodes provided Lewiston's only run with a seventh inning homer.

Cal Dentist Leads Field In Cup Meet

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Dr. Frank Taylor, star of the opening day's play for the Americas Cup golf trophy, figures the two-day international competition may hurt his chances in next week's United States Amateur tournament.

"There's no question that stamina will be an important factor," said the 41-year-old Pomona, Calif. dentist. "And these two days will take a lot out of me."

"The Olympic Country Club's Lake course is fatiguing to play with its up and down terrain," Taylor led the United States to its commanding lead, 15 points to the Canada and 4 for Mexico, over the course where the Amateur championships start Monday.

Taylor teamed with Bill Hyndman to score two points. He and two more in singles, beating the amateur champions of both Canada and Mexico.

Amateur last year, fired a one-under-par 34 for the first nine holes of the 6,000-yard, par 35-55-70 course. He beat Canadian champion Bruce Castor and Mexico's titlist Juan Antonio Estrada 6 and 5 each.

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Eddie O'Brien To Hang Spikes

Hoping to get more deception into their attack, the UCLA Bruins will have two passers in their backfield this season.

UCLA has several promising tailbacks, headed by Don Long, but one of them, Kirk Wilson, has been converted into a fullback. Kirk not only is a good passer, but he does the punting, boots field goals and points after touchdown, kicks off, is a good plunger and a pretty fair blocker.

The coaches believe that with Wilson and Long in the backfield they can keep the defense honest, for either can throw the ball very well and Wilson will have opportunities to throw from the Bruins' spinner plays.

Oregon State held its first full-scale scrimmage Saturday in Corvallis. The scrimmage was held in semi-secrecy. Only faculty members and the Beaver Club were admitted.

Coach Tommy Prothro said guard Jim Brackins suffered a dislocated shoulder in Thursday's scrimmage and end Jerry Doman got a sprained ankle. Both are first-team members.

Deve Grosz is shaping up as Oregon's starting quarterback. He has been doing very well with his passes.

Sophomore halfbacks scored touchdowns in Friday's workout. Dave Grayson, a transfer from San Diego Junior College, made one, and the other was by Terry Caganaan, a transfer from Contra Costa Junior College.

Southern California staged a secret scrimmage Saturday with coach Don Clark promising all 40 squad members a chance for action. Halfback Angelo Coia was expected, Coia, a likely starter at left half, has been nursing an injured knee. Quarterbacks Tom Maudlin and Willie Wood were ordered to throw lots of passes.

Washington's Huskies also lined up Saturday for a full-scale scrimmage at Seattle. Coach Jim Owens said the workout tried to point up the passing game. He said he hopes to get a good line on his men for the Huskies' opening game Sept. 20 against San Jose State.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Fearless Fraley's facts and figures: There was a lot of pussy-footing Saturday, on the eve of selection of the U.S. Davis Cup squad, as lawn tennis officials tried to come up with a good reason why intercollegiate citizen Alex Olmedo of Peru should be named to the United States team.

There was no valid reason. Olmedo should not be named. He is a Peruvian, even though he attends the University of Southern California and has lived in Los Angeles the past five years.

That five-year residence was cited by the selection committee Friday when it included Olmedo in a 12-man group that will compete for berths on the U. S. team.

The Davis Cup is the Olympic Games of tennis. In the Olympic Games, athletes of other nations attending American colleges go home and compete for the land of their nativity.

But Olmedo has further disbarred himself by refusing to take American citizenship.

"If I became a citizen," he says, "I would have to serve in the Army and thereby lose a couple of years of tennis."

Maybe that's where all our good players are. But it's a disgrace if we name him to our team under such admitted conditions. Much better we lose the Davis Cup by a shutout.

For the past few seasons, the loser of the National Football League championship has gone had the next year—but not this time.

Herb Elliott To Take Six Months Rest

OSLO, Norway (UPI)—Australian Herb Elliott wound up the most amazing campaign in track history Saturday by announcing he is "too tired" to race any more for the next six months.

In his farewell appearance for the year, the Aussie marvel won the second fastest "metric mile" in history here Friday, covering the 1,500 meters in 3 minutes, 57.4 seconds—7-10 of a second under the listed world mark.

Elliott's time is topped only by his 3:36.0 clocking at Göteborg, Sweden, Aug. 28, which is awaiting record approval.

"That was my last race for six months," Elliott said after Friday's 10-yard victory over Murray Halberg of New Zealand. "Twelve wild horses couldn't make me run. I just want to relax."

All told during 1958 he eclipsed four minutes for the mile every time he ran the distance, a total of 10 times, including his world's fastest mile of 3:44.5 at Dublin on Aug. 6. Of the 10 fastest miles in history, he has run five. And now, he also has run the two fastest "metric miles."
