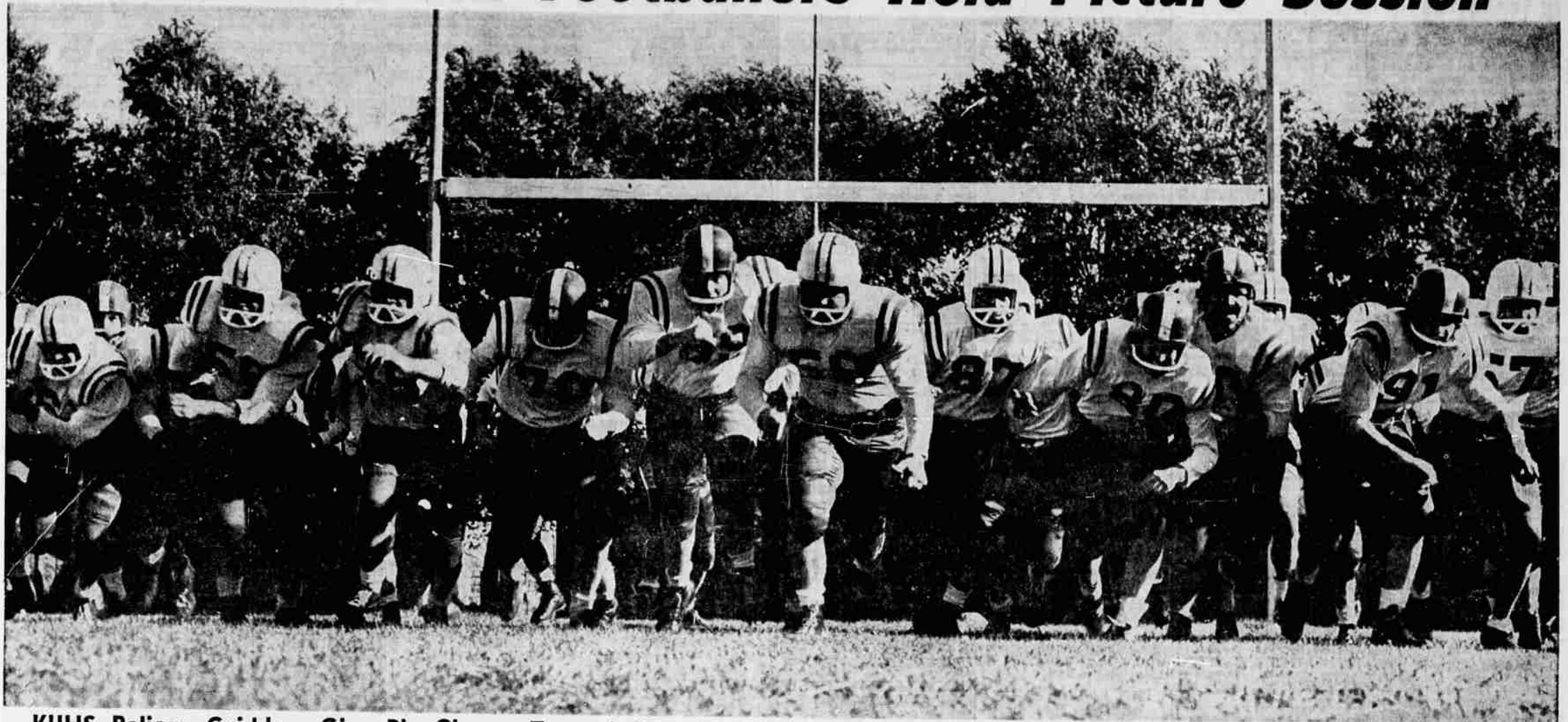
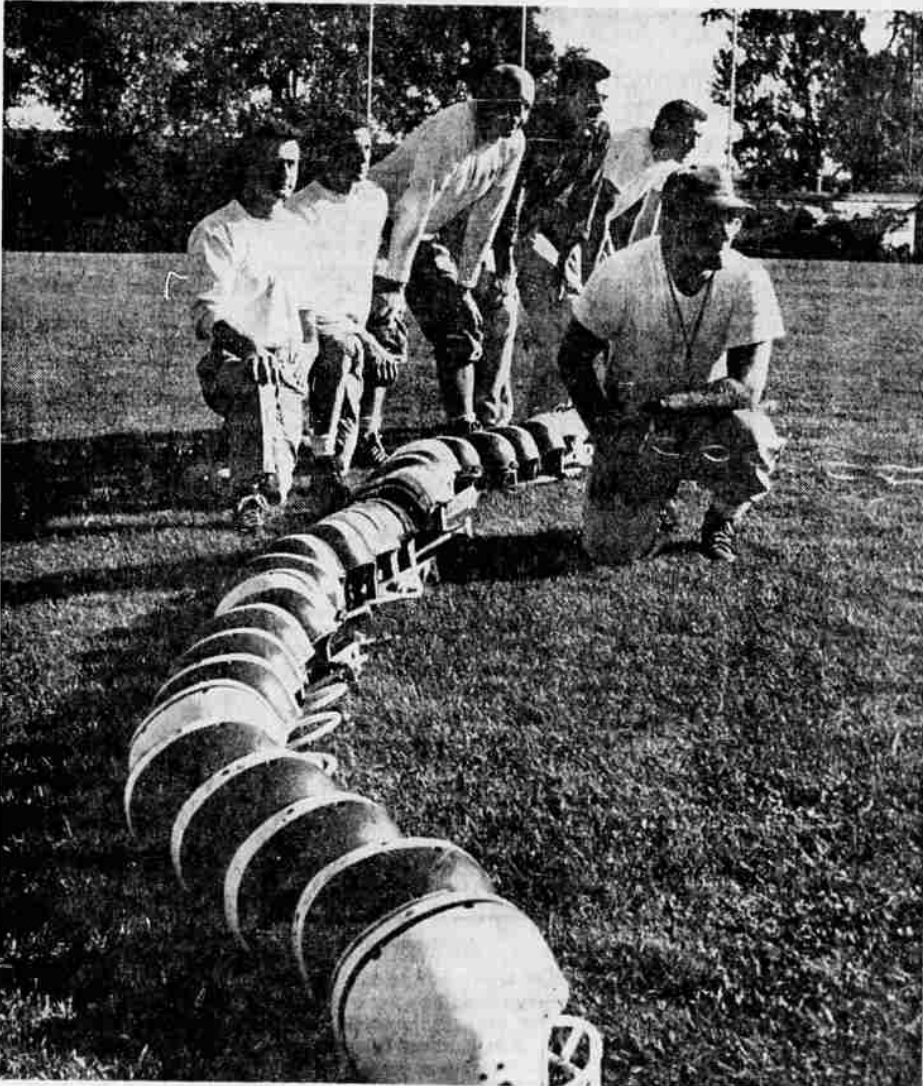


Klamath Union Footballers Hold Picture Session



KUHS Pelican Gridders Give Big Charge Toward 1958 Season Opening Game Next Friday Night Against Marshfield Pirates
