Tough Schedule Looms As Owls Face 'Good' Season

Officials in the Pacific Coast southland are doing a good job of hushing up the recent UCLA vs. University of California battle royal over illegal recruiting. But before the door was completely closed on the matter, a few southern sports writers, who for the past few years have been feasting on the Northwest schools, got in a couple of good licks.

UCLA's head football coach George Dickerson roared into the office of Cal coach Pete Elliott a couple of weeks ago charging the Berkeley campus with trying to lure away a prospective Uclan. This unscheduled meeting brought about charges and counter-charges that rocked the Pacific Coast with a real fine "family fight."

Hank Hollingworth and Bob Kelley of the Long Beach Press Telegram broke out this week with some pointed remarks directed at Dickerson, who had the head coaching job at UCLA less than a week after the death of Red Sanders when the trouble brewed.

Says Hollingworth in his column "Sports Merry-Go-Round": "His (Dickerson) ridiculous storming of the California garrison at Berkeley—wherein he took apart the Golden Bear recruiting agency for a practice that UCLA and every other major university has been doing for years—is an unprecedented action."

Hollingworth goes on: "The crazy part of this whole tangle is that Dickerson has been a head football coach only a few days. What right has such a neophyte leader to vent his wrath upon another university—especially when the so-called nefarious practices of which he accuses that university have been part and parcel of his own school's football resurgence?"

From Kelley's "Bob Kelley Says": "I can't believe Dickerson cooked up the entire 'Invasion Elliott' himself. He is a sounder man than to pull a trick so far beneath the dignity of a head football coach."

"It is my guess that Sam the Bruin Publicity Man poured a little coal on the fire. Sam is a perennial UCLA sophomore, whose zeal for his alma mater usually outweighs his good judgment."

Kelley also raps Dickerson's public relation education after George took one newsman with him on his trip, and left six others at home. "I like George Dickerson," Kelley says, "but for his own good."

'Red-White' Battle Ends In 13-13 Knot

Klamath Falls football fans got a preview of things to come during the 1958 Klamath Union High football schedule as the Pelicans, split into two teams, battled to a 13-13 tie in the annual Red and White game on Modoc Field Saturday night.

The Whites, coached by Jim Inglesby, broke the scoring ice in the first period as sophomore quarterback Jack Riley counted from the five on a sneak and John Hancock, newly converted to a fullback, booted the try for point.

The Reds, under the direction of Jack Peterson, narrowed the gap in the second quarter as the strong right arm of quarterback Blake Griggs fired a pair of consecutive strikes that were good for a total of 55 yards and culminated in a touchdown as Estin Kiger hauled down the last one in the end zone.

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Pirates Nip Milwaukee; Chicago Trims S.F. Giants

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Johnny Powers' pinch home run in the eighth inning earned the Pittsburgh Pirates their second straight victory over the Milwaukee Braves 7-6 Saturday.

The victory narrowed the Braves' National League lead over the second place Pirates to 7 1/2 games.

Bob Friend, shooting for his 20th victory, and Bob Buhl, looking for his sixth, were shelled from the mound in the fifth inning when both teams counted three runs.

Johnny Logan and Eddie Mathews got back-to-back homers in the fifth, giving the Braves a temporary 5-3 lead. Del Rice's homer knotted the score at 6-6 in the eighth.

It marked the second day in a row that a homer provided the margin of victory, Billy Virdon's blast in the 10th inning gave the Pirates a 1-0 triumph Friday night. Powers shot Saturday was only his second of the year.

National Record Set At KF Trial

The Shasta-Cascade Retriever Club's annual fall trial took on a national recognition here Saturday when a new all-time record for derby dogs was established by Meg's Patty O'Rourke, a female Chesapeake owned and handled by Dr. F. A. Dashnaw of Santa Clara, California.

Dashnaw's young and brilliant female captured first place in the Derby Stake—for dogs under two years of age. And in doing so became the highest derby dog in the history of national field trials with 58 points for the year. The old record, set last year, was 55.

Meg's entered this trial with 53 points and needed a first or second to break the record and a third to tie. Saturday morning Dashnaw completed the Derby Stake competition ahead of the field of 15 other dogs. So far this year, Dashnaw's Chesapeake has entered in 18 trials, placed among the first four in 17 of these and out of this number has won eight.

Following Meg's in the final derby standings was a Portland Lab, Far Baby's Little Sweet Stuff, owned by K. L. Carpenter and handled by Ed Minogio, also of Portland. Third place winner was Margaret's Candy of Swinowish, a Lab owned by Margaret Duke of Fossil, Oregon and handled by Klamath Falls pro Pat Montgomery. Fourth place awards went to a Lab, Runaway's Sasage-wa, owned by J. S. Swearingen of Santa Rosa, California, and handled by Bob Sevenants.

Two judges "CMs" were presented to Medlin's Texas Right, a Lab owned and handled by C. Allan Fischer of Hillsborough, California, and Beau Jack of Honey Lake, another Lab owned and handled by Ed Bailey of Redding.

In the Amateur Stake, which finished Friday afternoon, a Medford retriever man, C. Weldon Kline, directed his Lab, Bracken's Flash, to first place. In the last three trials, Flash has placed first, third and fourth. It was

Kline's first "big" win at one of the local trials after many tries. Flash was second in the local trial's derby class a few years ago.

Second in the amateur was Bracken's High Flyer, George Duke's Lab. Lucinda of Crater Lake, another Lab finished third and was handled by owner Roland Watt of Redding. Fourth place went to Carr-Lab Hilltop, Glenn Bump's Lab from Stockton. A certificate of merit went to Hal's Spi-Wise Zeke, a Lab owned and handled by Hal Shidler of Klamath Falls.

A young Redding dog handler, Dan Bailey, guided his Lab, Ace of Orchard Estates to first place in Saturday's running of the Qualifying Stake. It was the second big victory for Bailey's dog at a local trial. Last spring, the Redding youth finished first in the derby.

Second in the qualifying was Shasta June, a Lab owned and handled by Robert Morris of Central Point. Third spot went to a female Lab, Hot Toddy's Mindy, owned by former Klamath Falls resident James Johnson now living in Sacramento. Mindy was handled by Tom Rickard of Medford. Fourth place award went to Skookum's Star, a Labrador owned by John Brader of Flossmoor, Illinois and handled by pro Carl Newell. A "CM" went to a Klamath Falls Golden, Kent's Rigel, owned and handled by Earl Kent.

Sunday's action will find the competition of the Open All-Age Stake starting at 8 o'clock and running through the better half of the afternoon. The trials being conducted on the Oregon State Game Commission's Management land 10 miles south of Klamath Falls off U.S. Highway 97 on the Miller Island Road.

The public is invited to attend. There is no charge. A snack bar will be in operation serving sandwiches and refreshments all day.
