

Pittsburgh Splits With Milwaukee; Chicago Cubs Sweep Two From SF

The 10 telling days are over for the Pittsburgh Pirates. But if the Cubs missed a storybook finish in that span, they do not less than stamp themselves baseball's surprise team of 1958 and make Danny Murtaugh a top choice as the National League Manager of the year.

In a 10-day showdown, the Pirates faced their final seven games with the first place Milwaukee Braves. They trailed by 7½ games when it started, lost two of three at Milwaukee and were third, 9½ games back, going into the final four at Pittsburgh Friday night.

They came out with a 3-1 edge in the series, holding the world champions to an 11-11 standoff for

the season with a doubleheader split in the finale yesterday. They won 4-1 after Warren "The Wonder" Spahn had taken the opener 3-1 for the Braves, his 19th victory.

It was the last chance anybody had of catching the Braves, who lead by 7½ with 16 games to play. But the Pirates, who have finished last or next to last for the past eight years, went a long way toward nailing down second place, taking a two-game lead over third place San Francisco.

The Chicago Cubs swept a pair from the Giants 5-4 and 4-1. Los Angeles hammered St. Louis 7-5 and Cincinnati grabbed a 2½ game lead on fourth place by taking two at Philadelphia 6-4 and 9-2.

In the American League, New York and Washington split shutouts. The Yankees won 7-0 after a 1-0 defeat and reduced their pennant clinching magic number to six. Cleveland defeated second place Chicago 4-3. Boston beat Baltimore 8-5 in 10 innings, and Kansas City dumped Detroit 3-2.

Braves 3-1, Cubs 1-4

Spahn's 243rd victory in the majors put him within one of his ninth 20-victory season—a record for southpaws in the big time.

Spahn battled in a tie with Ron Kline (12-14) until Wes Covington, who singled home a run in the first, rapped a two-run double in the eighth.

Vern Law (12-11) then blanked

the Braves, who chopped their magic number to 10, on four hits before needing relief in the ninth. Low Burdette (16-10) was the loser.

Walt Maryn's 23rd and 24th homers were good for three runs and Lee Walls' 24th, a three-run shot in the eighth, then wrapped up the opener for the Cubs and rookie Bob Anderson (2-1). Dick Drott (7-11) followed with a three-hit backed up by Ernie Banks' 44th homer and clinching two-run eighth-inning double.

Banks' home run, off loser Ruben Gomez (8-12), ended a shutout duel in the seventh and matched his major league record for shortstops, set in 1956. Mike McCormick (11-8) lost the opener.

Alex Olmedo's Nomination To Davis Team Raises Questions

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (UPI)

—The naming of Peru's Alex Olmedo to the U. S. Davis Cup squad had created an international furor today with the main question "What price victory?"

Olmedo, the intercollegiate of Southern California, was named on the basis he has resided in Los Angeles for five years. But he refuses to apply for citizenship because he doesn't want to serve in the Army.

Everybody in attendance at the U. S. amateur tennis championships labeled it a "disgrace" — except the 25 members of the Davis Cup selection committee who named Olmedo on a 12-man squad from which four must be selected before Nov. 1.

The Australian delegation was

the most outspoken, looking forward to the time when the Americans will arrive in Australia to try to win back the big silver bowl.

"We couldn't care less on the surface," said one. "That is, unless by some 'fluke' you Yanks should win the cup. Then, naturally, we would claim that the cup had been taken from us by two countries—not one."

"It seems rather surprising — and unsportsmanlike — to us that a country with 170 million people can't come up with four players of its own and keep this thing on the up and up."

"I wonder how this looks to Russians," said another Aussie. "You people must realize that they make great political capital out of sports. Imagine the song they'll sing to the rest of the world about how the great capitalistic United States needs the help of a tiny nation like Peru to come up with four players."

The agitation seemed to be having little effect on Davis Cup captain Perry Jones of Los Angeles, the guiding power behind selection of the team. Jones re-

placed Bill Talbert of New York this year as captain with the shifting of tennis authority from the East to the West Coast. The general feeling is the West Coast brass hats will stop at little to achieve victory and make themselves look good.

This, in part, explained the naming to the squad of Don Kierbow, a 22-year-old who works in Jones' office and has had no national experience. He is labeled facetiously a "secret weapon" and the Aussies are laughing gleefully.

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Pete Ramos Blanks Yanks; Indians Whip White Sox
