Lowe Boosts Oregon State Pigskin Stock

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Coach Tommy Prothro was almost embarrasingly rich in swift, deceptive backs. Then came Paul Lowe, a dazzling runner, unexpectedly back to school after a year's lay-out.

Prothro, a happy man indeed these fall days, will not openly endorse that. Winning the conference title—OSC did it two years ago and shared it with Oregon last year—takes a bit of luck, too, he says.

Moreover, he adds, there are some problems with the line. And there are also the problems of meeting UCLA and Washington State, which have about equally fine prospects.

But there are no apparent problems with the backfield. This is somewhat astonishing on a squad that lost the triple-threat expert, Joe Francis, by graduation.

It is true that no one has shown quite the all-around skill of Francis, but six men of above-average talents are all after the job he vacated at tailback in Prothro's single-wing offense.

Two of these can do the hundred in :09.9 on a straight course and can change direction in a flash. Lowe, moreover, goes past defenders with a bewildering change of pace.

"We've never before had such speed," says Prothro. "It was apparent last spring that the fall would bring some good news. In the final squad game then the first two units, playing against the best reserves OSC has had in years, turned in a nearly unbelievable 92-18 score."

As the squad shapes up now, Gary Lukehart, 6-foot, 173-pound senior, is calling signals from blocking back. Little Larry Sanchez, 162-pound junior, and Grimm Mason, a :09.0, 184-pound sophomore, are lining up as alternates to speedster Lowe at tailback.

Karnel Durden, another :09.9 sprinter, is at wingback and John Horrolo, a one-time fullback, has been alternating with him. Nub Beamer, 197 pounds, is a crashing type fullback and has a capable alternate in Jim Stinnette, 198.

Of these eight, seven are lettermen—and there are still more lettermen backs in reserve. Of the line, Prothro says "with Buzz Randall it would have been terrific. It still is good."

Randall is out, probably for the season, with anemia. In his place at center is Bruce Hake, the only non-letterman in the first unit.

Joe Wade might move up from the second unit to make it an all-letterman line. At the ends are Don Thiel and Jerry Doman, good defensive men but lacking in pass-catching skill. That suggests the pass will be an only-sometime weapon of the Beavers this fall.

Guards and tackles are the line—and the speed of it, too. Sonny Sanchez, 195, left guard, moves well. Jim Brackins, 193, right guard, does too. Ed Knochlaui, 193, center, is less agile but it is something of a chore to push his 225-pound, 6-3 frame out of his left tackle spot.

At right tackle is Ted Bates, 6-2, 210 pounds, the fastest man on the line and one of the finest linemen on the coast. And that's plenty for any club.

Greene and Jackson also warned the delegates to prepare for a coming upsurge in boxing activities, which they said would result indirectly from the advent of pay television.

"There are not enough boxers of note, ability and attractiveness to persuade the fight fan to pay for what he has been getting for nothing," they said. Crawford 6-5 Choice To Whip Tiger Jones

NEW YORK (UPI)—Welterweight Mickey Crawford is a 6-5 favorite to beat veteran middleweight Ralph "Tiger" Jones in their Wednesday night fight from Chicago Stadium to be televised over ABC.

Crawford, from Saginaw, Mich., is ninth-ranked in his division and has scored an impressive 22 victories in his 26 pro fights. A clever puncher, Crawford boasts wins over former lightweight champs Paddy DeMarco and Wallace (Bud) Smith, as well as decisions over

Pat Lowry, Chico Velaz, Gil Turner and Tex Gonzales. In his last fight, the 24-year-old commercial artist gained a highly-disputed draw with Gaspar Ortega, the No. 1 welterweight challenger.

JONES IS VETERAN Jones has been a pro boxer since 1950 and has won 43 of his 68 fights. The 30-year-old resident of Yonkers, N.Y., has scored his most impressive decisions over current middleweight champ Ray Robinson, Ernie Durando, Al Andrews and Charley Humez.

The bout, which will be the 400th in the series of "Wednesday Night Fights," is a scheduled 10-rounder. In Friday night's televised fight from Philadelphia, Len Matthews, the newest sensation of the lightweight class, is a 3-1 favorite over seasoned Tommy Tibbs.

Matthews, from Philadelphia, is just 19 years old and needed special permission from the commission to fight this 10-round bout. He is undefeated in 13 professional outings, with all but one coming on knockouts.

Tibbs is 25 years old and comes from Boston. Currently lightweight champion of New England, Tibbs has only a mediocre record, having won 43 bouts while dropping 46.

OTHER FIGHTS Thursday, ex-middleweight champ Gene Fullmer is favored over Spider Webb in their fight at Salt Lake City and on Monday, Howard King is given the nod over Art Swiden at Reno, where they will fight for the Nevada state heavyweight championship.

Track Record Okay Doubt

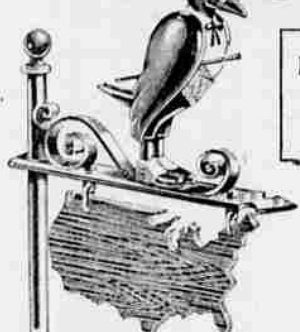
LINDAU, Germany (AP)—The 100 meters finally have been run in 10 seconds. That's like a four-minute mile. But there is some doubt if it'll get official recognition as a world record.

Armin Hary, a 21-year-old West German precision machinist, hit the 10 second figure Saturday at Friedrichshafen as he clipped one-fifth second off the listed world record set by American Willie Williams at Berlin Aug. 3, 1956 and tied on the same track the following day by another Yank, Ira Murchison. Williams did it again Aug. 5.

An unofficial measurement of the Friedrichshafen track showed it sloped slightly more than permitted under international track regulations. An official survey was to be made today.

Two timekeepers clocked Hary in 9.9 and a third in 10 flat. They also are to be officially checked.

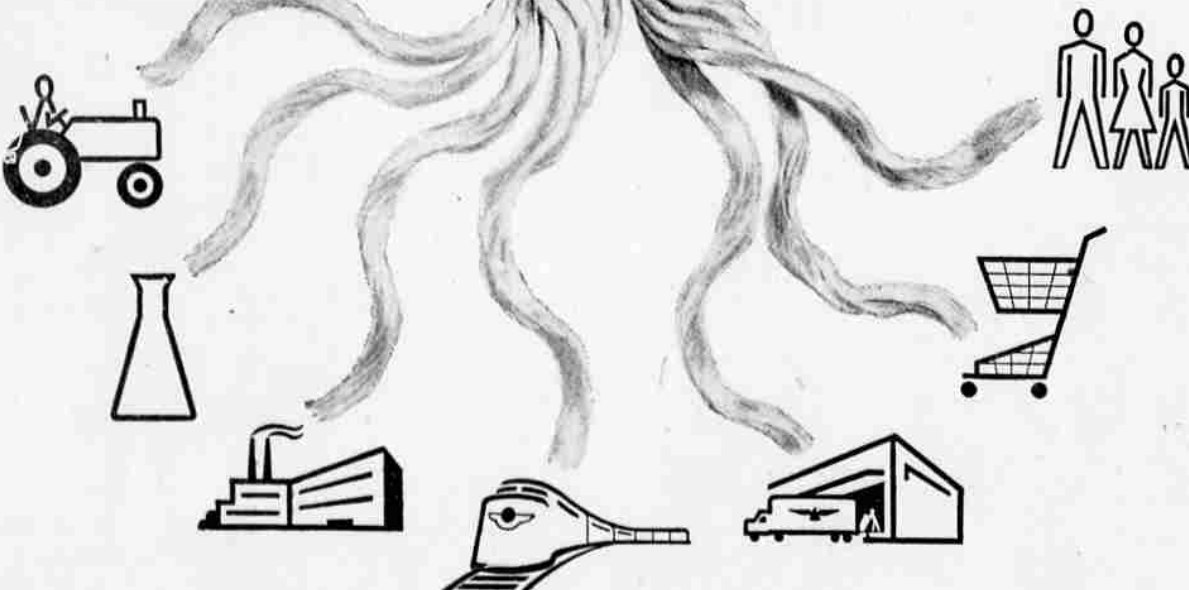
