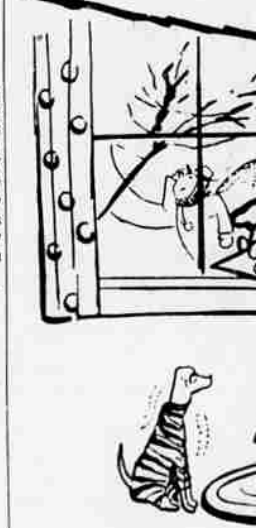
Pakistan Chief, Nehru Talks Set

Grange Master Tells Farm Woes

PORTLAND (AP)—Herschel Newsom, master of the National Grange, said here Monday a shotgun approach to produce marketing systems won't satisfy farmers.

He said they want the individual studied and met on an individual basis for each commodity. Newsom, here to confer with Northwest Grange officials, attributed higher beef prices to the long drought and the holding back of marketable cattle. He predicted the prices will drop soon. Newsom said an expected fall in the pork market shortly would influence the beef situation.

The Grange chief said the number of hogs being grown for meat has jumped 17 per cent and this will result in lower meat prices by next summer.
