

Sales Records Crumble In Livestock Purchases

TULELAKE—Livestock buyers from San Francisco to Klamath Falls last night bid a total of \$18,802.73 for 128 prime steers, fat hogs and fat lambs, to break any previous record for a 4-H and FFA junior livestock sale held in Tulelake.

Walker Brothers of Merrill also broke a per-pound price record here on fat lambs, when Robert R. Walker paid \$5.02 1/2 for each pound of the reserve 4-H grand champion of show wether entered, and sold by Carol Jackson of Newell.

The first-year 4-H Club member pocketed \$477.38 for her lamb. The grand champion of show fat lamb, shown by FFA Jim Bengard, Susanville, was disqualified for the auction since Jim was an exhibitor from outside the 10-A fair district.

Jeanne Pettigrew, Newell, entered the 4-H reserve champion lamb sold to the Tulelake Cold Storage Company for \$1.65 per pound, or \$173.25.

The grand champion of show steer, an 817-pound Aberdeen Angus, with Linda Crawford, Dorris, at halter, brought \$1 per pound, going to the Tulelake Cold Storage Company for \$817. Kenneth Steyskal, Tulelake, exhibitor of the FFA

reserve grand champion steer of show, took \$428.50 for his 857-pound Hereford from the Chuck Wagon Cafe, Klamath Falls.

John Parsons, exhibitor of the 4-H reserve grand champion in the 4-H division, sold his animal to the Floyd A. Boyd Company, Tulelake, for 45 cents per pound, a total of \$152.45. The FFA reserve champion in the FFA division, shown by Cliff Wooten, was sold to the California Oregon Power Company for 42 cents, a total of \$402.36.

In the swine division, Kay Parsons, Newell, exhibited both the grand champion and reserve grand champion fat hog of show. The top hog brought \$2.50 per pound or \$450 from Sunny State Produce, the second top animal, \$1.55 per pound or \$313.10 from the Enterprise Produce Company, Norbert Anthes, showing the FFA champion, took \$1.40 per pound, and a check for \$252 from Otto Haynes, Tulelake rancher.

Bidding was good until the last animal left the sales ring. The sale was cried by Bob Rhodes and Bill D. Owens, both of Klamath Falls, without commissions.

The Best Fertilizer Company was the San Francisco buyer of a fat steer.

Thirty-five head of steers, weighing 33,475 pounds, sold for \$11,901.05, an average of 35.5 cents per pound or \$340.03 per head. Twenty-three hogs, weighing 4,489 pounds, brought a total of \$3,324.16, an average of 74.5 per pound or \$144.53 per head. Sixty-eight head of fat lambs, weighing 6,310 pounds, sold for \$3,577.52, an average of 57 cents per pound or an average of \$52.61 per head.

The auction followed a barbecue dinner served to more than 1,000 persons by the Tulelake Rotary Club, sponsor of the annual livestock auction, held in connection with the Tulelake - Butte Valley Fair.

Fair attendance this year was 15,137 in comparison with 12,095 in 1957. The three-day fair opened September 6, closed last night.

Thousands of entries crammed the agriculture, commercial, and homemaking exhibit buildings and the livestock barns. More than 100 horses were exhibited this year.

The elm is a loose barked tree, therefore more readily open than other trees to fungus infections.



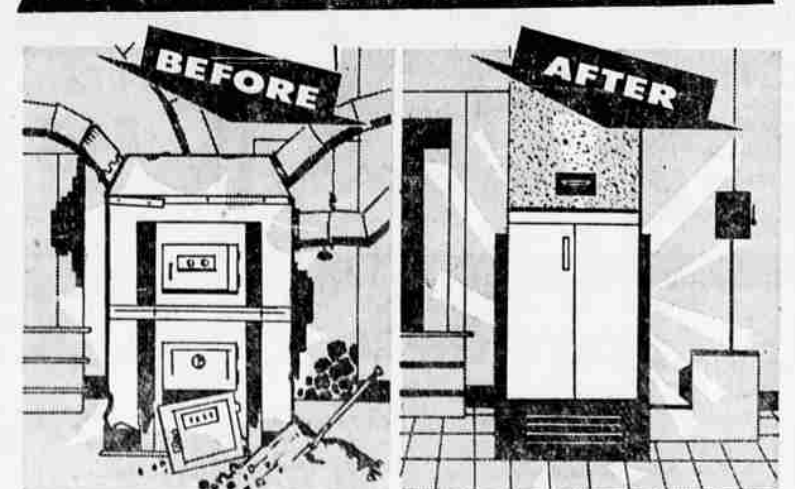
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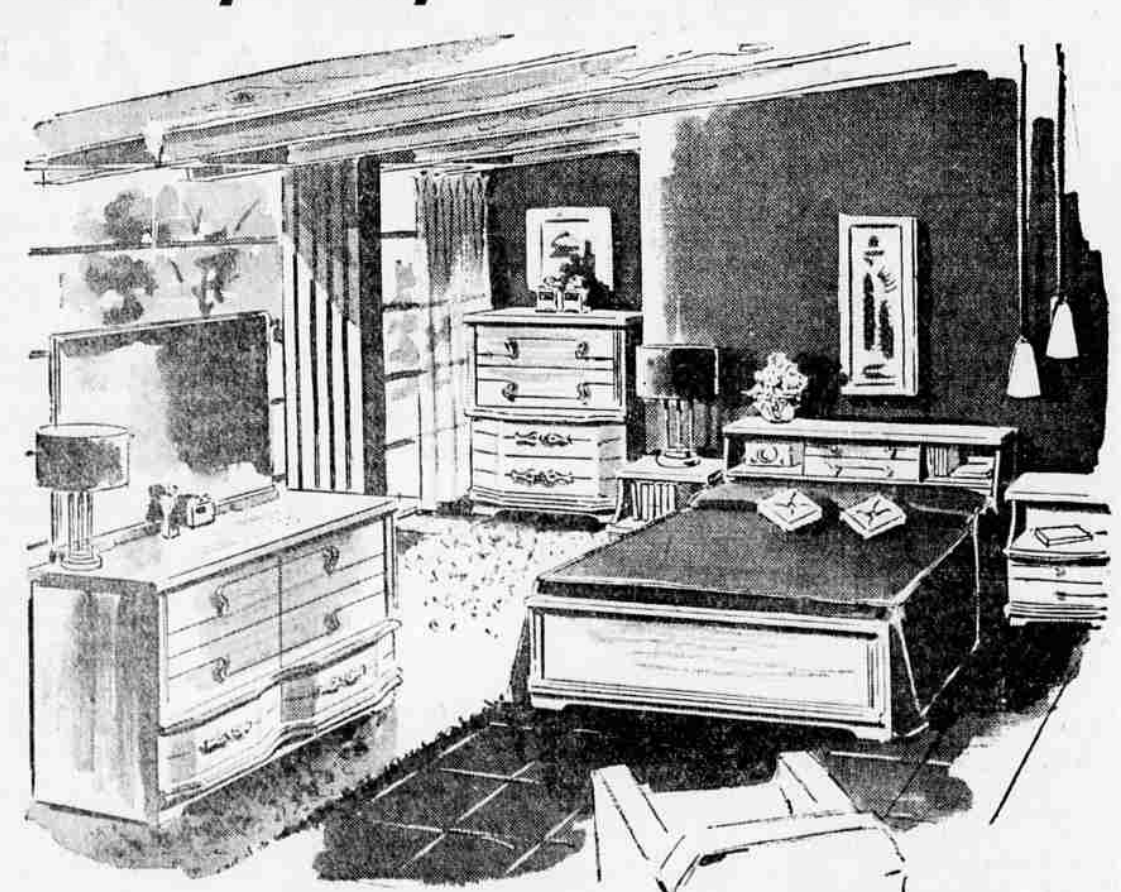
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
